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Anne O'Brien chosen as Fairhaven's first HR Director

The Fairhaven Selectboard voted to approve the appointment of Assistant Town Administrator Anne O'Brien to the newly created position of Human Resources Director. Town Administrator Mark Rees made the appointment and announced it at the Selectboard meeting on Monday, 9/12. The board needed to approve it.

Ms. O'Brien recently achieved her Certificate in Local Government Leadership and Management, Public Administration from Suffolk University. She has worked in the Selectboard office for six years.

All three Selectboard members and Mr. Rees voiced confidence in her ability to handle her new duties, but also said they did not want to see her go.

"You just can't go," said Selectboard member Daniel Freitas.

Ms. O'Brien reminded them that she was not going far. And, she would

be doing both jobs for awhile, until her position was filled. She thanked the board for the last six years.

Ms. O'Brien said the move was "bittersweet," and that most people leave a job because they do not like it.

"I'm leaving a job I like," she said. "I'm going to miss it tremendously. But my career calls, and the town needs me, and it's an important position."

One of Ms. O'Brien's first duties

The remainder of Jack's Cove will be open to quahogging as of Thursday, 9/21. The area by the marina has been closed, although the rest of the cove has been open. The section by the marina was transplanted with tainted quahogs from the Taunton River last year. The bivalves have had enough time to clean themselves out and have been tested by the state. The tests show they are safe for harvesting.

Cultural Council

Each year, the Fairhaven Cultural Council, a local organization supported by the Massachusetts Cultural Council, awards Local Cultural Council (LCC) grants to support arts and cultural projects that directly benefit our community. Grant monies are distributed from both state and local funds designated specifically for this purpose.

For the 2018 Grant Council Fairhaven will participating in a **new pilot program** eliminating the requirement that awards made using the Mass Cultural Council allocation be reimbursementbased. During this pilot program, grant money will be available in full to grantees once their projects are approved. If you are awarded a grant, you will be required to submit a final report to the Local Cultural Council upon completion of your program verifying that your project was completed and grant monies were used as outlined in your application.

The Fairhaven Cultural Council accepts online applications only. Online applications are available from the MCC for LCC applicants via www.mass-culture.org. With this new system, applicants will complete their forms entirely online and upload any required supplemental materials by the October 16, 2017 deadline.

For this grant cycle, applicants' projects or events must take place between January through December 2018. The Fairhaven Cultural Council prioritizes projects that take place in Fairhaven and most directly benefit Fairhaven residents, as well as first-time applicants and new projects. Please refer to Fairhaven's official MCC page for full local guidelines and council funding priorities.


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Poker Run is VROOM VROOM on the water

5 large Granny Smith apples, peeled, cored, and thinly sliced 1/2 cup white sugar 1 tablespoon all-purpose flour 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon 1 tablespoon lemon juice 1/4 cup water Crumble:

1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour 1 cup brown sugar 1 cup quick cooking oats 1 cup butter, softened Caramel Sauce:

1 (14 oz) package individually wrapped caramels, unwrapped 1 (5 ounce) can evaporated milk

Preheat oven to 350. In a med. bowl, toss apples with sugar, flour, cinnamon, lemon juice, and water; spread evenly into 8x8" pan. In another bowl, mix together flour, brown sugar, oats, and butter; spoon mixture evenly over apples.

In heavy sauce pan over low heat, melt caramels with the evaporated milk, stirring frequently, until mixture has a smooth consistency. Drizzle the caramel sauce over the top of the crumble.

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
Apple-Peach Festival sees big crowds, perfect weather

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From our readers: Neighbor takes issue with ACO account

Let's Talk Turkey

I am writing to offer another point of view regarding the "Don't Feed TheTurkeys!" story in the 8/17 issue of this esteemed publication. I am without question the subject of the accusations of trying to kill the turkeys as reported by the Animal Control Officer. I have been scolded by a few of my neighbors for what they believe is my trying to hurt the two dangerously aggressive Toms that have been terrorizing the adults, children and pets in my area for the past year. Some of my daily experiences with the birds include:

- 1. The Toms charging at my car as I was driving on Adams Street on a rainy day while another car was tailgating me preventing me from braking in order to not hit them. They also chase vehicles driving on our neighborhood streets.
- 2. The Toms attacking when I'm trying to enter or exit my car.
- 3. The Toms attacking as I am walking or riding my bike.
- 4. The Toms charging at my dog that is half their size.

What's worse is I often have a toddler with me when I encounter the fowl. YES, I carry one of my baseball bats when outdoors or driving (there's one on my front porch, my back deck and in my car). I have used them to intimidate the Toms each and every time they try to dominate me in the pecking order. YES, I use my car to intimidate them when they charge at it when I'm driving or when I'm trying to get out of my car. I've used my bats to scare the turkeys away from kids trying to get to and from school.

I am not the only person to encounter the Toms' dangerous, aggressive behavior. As I canvassed my area with flyers describing the Toms' behaviors and ways to protect yourself and your property, dozens of people reported to me similar incidences on a regular basis.

The nasty Toms have spread their intimidating, dangerous behavior far further than my immediate neighborhood. I live at 86 Francis Street and have gone north to Jarvis, and south to Linden, east to Birchfield, and west to Castle — the stories are the same.

The other danger that has affected this area is the increased presence of predatory animals such as coyote, fox and fishercat.

Mass Wildlife's website states (http://www.mass.gov/eea/agencies/dfg/dfw/fish-wildlife-plants/wild-turkey-faq.html): "Predators of poults and adults include red fox, coyote, fisher, bobcat, great horned owl, goshawk, red-tailed hawk, and other avian predators."

Wild animals in great numbers increase the threat of disease, like rabies. Outside of the danger to humans there is also the cruel reality of pets being prey. In my three block area six cats disappeared in six weeks.

I've been asked,"Why are there tons of rabbits and squirrels if indeed there has been increased numbers of predators?"

The answer is in the percentages. The three blocks are bordered by Adams & Green (east & west) and Mayflower & Elm (north & south) contains approximately 40 houses and let's say half of them have a cat. Six of twenty is a noticeable 30% of pets that have gone missing.

Now do the same math on a low

estimate of 100 squirrels and rabbits in the same area and it's a hardly noticeable 6%.

There had been a few people in my area who thought is was OK to feed the turkeys but when the numbers increased most of them stopped months ago. The fact that the turkeys are still around after people stopped feeding them is due to available natural food sources.

Again from the above website: "In studies in 4 Northeastern states, acorns, grapes, corn, fern heads, barberries, multiflora rose hips, and beech and maple buds ranked as important winter foods. Grass and sedge leaves, nut crops, tubers, flowers, and seeds were valued in spring and summer. Beechnuts, acorns, grasses, cultivated grains, dogwood, grapes, and animal food were predominant fall foods. A 10year New York study found acorns, beechnuts, black cherry fruits, ash and ironwood seeds, and hawthorne fruits to be major turkey foods in fall, winter, and spring. In summer, grass seeds and animal foods were also important.'

I've done the research and feel entirely justified in my aggressive behavior toward the foul fowl because I pay for my property and taxes to the Town....the Toms don't.

Because our ACO and the MA Dept of Fish and Game have not been successful in dealing with this, I've recently contacted Selectman Dan Freitas because I'm done trying to do this on my own.

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
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

will be to recruit for her old position in the Selectboard office. Mr. Rees has hiring authority for that position.

The position of Human Resources Director was recently created as part of the town government's reorganization from an Executive Secretary type to a Town Administrator type. The HR job was created at town meeting May of this year at a salary of around \$80,000 per year.

In other business, the board approved a permit for EJ's to hold a third party event on September 28 for a business group.

Owner Cathy Melanson told the board that she would be present at the meeting.

On August 30, the board voted to take EJ's license, forcing them to get permission for each event they hold.

An incident in July resulted in a crowd in the parking lot and allegations of underage drinking and other offenses.

The board wanted to rescind EJ's license, but the restaurant has been, effectively, closed for reorganization. Local business owner Drew Tillett, who has also served on a variety of

town boards, told the Selectboard on 8/30 that he plans to lease the building and take over the liquor license in the coming weeks.

In another matter, the board approved the date of November 23, Thanksgiving Day, for the annual Turkey Trot road race. New organizers from the New Bedford Track Club and from Union Running attended the meeting to introduce themselves and explain that they were taking over the race from the original organizers. Gerry Payette, director of the Shepherd's Pantry also attended the meeting to let the board know that the pantry will still be the beneficiary of the race.

A public hearing that had been listed on the agenda was not held because it was not necessary, according to Mr. Rees. A change of officers/directors for 99 Restaurant and Pub was at the board of directors level and not something that required a public hearing.

In his report, Town Administrator Mark Rees told the board that the Oxford School Residences project had not received the historical tax credits necessary for the project to go forward. The Mass. Historical Commission cited the need to save the 1950s addition, as well as the original Oxford building.

The developer, Stratford Capital Group, and the town will work to resubmit the application with more information about the structural deficiencies of the addition. Mr. Rees also said it was not entirely surprising that the early rounds of grant requests would be rejected for the type of project proposed.

Mr. Rees also reported that Mass. DEP refused to hold a public hearing on the air quality permit for Fairhaven Shipyard. Mr. Rees said the town would meet with Mass. DEP to get some answers about the permit. He also said the town reserved the right to request a public hearing.

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ZBA rejects one, continues one

In a matter that has been kicking around in one form or another for months, the Fairhaven Zoning Board of Appeals continued a hearing at its 9/5 meeting for Robert and Judith Tubbs who are seeking to sell their property at 294 Huttleston Avenue (Route 6) so eight rental units can be built. The property is the former site of Dan Good Auto Sales, which burned down in 2006. The property was rezoned apartment/ to multifamily at the last town meeting.

The neighbors again showed up in force to oppose the measure.

The proposal was originally listed as being 70 feet short of the 200 feet of frontage required, 72,233 square feet short of the 100,000 sf required, 42,233 sf short of 70,000 sf required contiguous upland, 5 feet short of the required 50-foot rear setback, and 19% over the maximum lot coverage of 50%.

At the 9/5 meeting, Town Planner and Economic Development Director Bill Roth told the board he disagreed with some of the conclusions of building inspector Wayne Fostin, who is also the enforcement officer.

Mr. Roth said he believed the project was not in violation of the rear setback. He also said the parking plan was more than sufficient for the intended use, and that the lot coverage percentage could be brought into compliance by eliminating some asphalt.

He told the board that they would have to decide if a total of eight units was too much for the site and the neighborhood.

He said the plan was "far more appropriate" than some other uses proposed for the site.

Mr. Roth also said, however, that the plan was not detailed enough for the Planning Board, which would also have to approve the project. He said it looked like the developer simply recycled a plan for a fuel company that wanted to buy the site.

Board members discussed the matter, bouncing around among the issues of parking, setbacks, and density.

In the end, the board continued the hearing to send their questions to Town Counsel, mainly, if the 100,000 minimum lot size applies to the pre-existing lot. Mr. Roth said he believed that the lot should be exempt from the requirement and that the 100,000 minimum applies only to new developments.

The continuance also gives Ms. Tubbs time to get more detailed plans created.

The board voted, almost unanimously, to send the matter to TC. ZBA member Kenneth Kendall voted "no," stating: "I'm against the whole thing."

The neighbors clapped.

Ms. Tubbs has threatened to file a 40B project if her proposal is rejected. Chapter 40B allows developers to bypass zoning regulations if a certain percentage of units is reserved for low income residents.

In another matter, the board voted "no" on a petition by David Tomasia, 15 Grinnell Street, who was seeking to build a 24x36-foot, two-story garage. The project required two variances, one for being 1,028 square feet over the 700 sf maximum for an accessory structure, and one for the height of the building being five feet over the 20-foot maximum allowed for an accessory building.

Mr. Tomasia did not attend, but

some of his neighbors did.

Beth Oliver told the board she was concerned about the height of the building and its affect on her privacy.

The board voted against both variances.

In a matter not on the agenda, Barbara Dean asked the board if they had fixed their problem with notifications to abutters not going out on time. She said there was a petition in her neighborhood in May. During that ZBA meeting on May 2 (see *Neighb News* issue, 5/18/17), abutters from two separate hearings said they never received notices, or received them late.

Mr. Fostin said, at that meeting, that the notices had gone out and the problem must have been with the post office.

At the 9/5 meeting Ms. Dean said she planned on following up on the matter.


"I would like to know that something has been done, or something is being done in the future," said Ms. Dean. "I just feel it's really wrong."

ZBA Chairperson Peter DeTerra said that he believed Mr. Fostin was "working on it" with the post office.

"I will follow up on it again," promised Ms. Dean, after the meeting.

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
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
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
