Selectboard asks for BPW liaison to Marine Resources

Fairhaven Selectboard members had a testy exchange with members of the Marine Resources Committee at the Selectboard meeting on 7/10, on an issue that has been brewing beneath the surface for months, and has heated up in the last few weeks.

At issue is that Robert "Hoppy" Hobson, a member of the Board of Public Works, is also on the Marine Resources Committee (formerly known as the Hoppy's Landing Committee).

For years, the issue of a BPW member being on another board has been a bone of contention with various members. The special legislation that created the BPW, according to town officials, prohibits a member from being on another board.

Marine Resources chairperson Frank Coelho, however, said he has never seen the wording of the law and has asked for it repeatedly.

Town Administrator Mark Rees handed Mr. Coelho a copy that evening, as Mr. Coelho noted that he had not received it, despite repeated requests for it.

Selectboard member Daniel Freitas said that the issue came up when Keith Silvia was appointed to the BPW and had to resign from the Zoning Board of Appeals. He noted at the time that Mr. Hobson was on two boards. Mr. Freitas said he asked for Town Counsel to make a ruling on it.

The whole thing started in November of 2016, but disappeared into never-never-land until recently.

Mr. Hobson has said to anyone who will listen that it all came about

when he spoke against hiring Mr. Freitas's daughter for a summer BPW job.

Mr. Freitas said, at the 7/10 meeting, that he would not have his name "dragged through the mud" on TV, "by Mr. Hobson, of all people."

Mr. Freitas and Mr. Hobson served on the BPW together for awhile, before Mr. Freitas was elected to the Selectboard.

Mr. Rees said there was a "clear prohibition," with an exception for a BPW liaison. He said the Selectboard had to ask the BPW if they wanted to appoint a liaison to the Marine

letter he received, only to be interrupted by Mr. Freitas and stopped by Mr. Espindola.

With the men all talking over each other, Mr. Coelho got drowned out.

Mr. Freitas won the day, saying he had "no problem" with the BPW having a liaison on the Marine Resources Committee and would make the motion himself for a "full voting member" of the MRC.

Selectboard member Charles Murphy managed to get his two cents in and said he had "no issue," with the BPW having a liaison on the MRC.

Chairperson Bob Espindola also agreed.

"I've been trying to do this since last November," said Mr. Coelho.

Mr. Hobson told the board that when he first got on the BPW, the chair at the time told him he could not be on any other boards. He said it was not long before he noticed that others were on more than one board.

"So I said, 'if they can be on another board, why can't I,'" said Mr. Hobson.

"I'm just trying to say, if you want, I'll resign...just have everyone else resign," he said.

Mr. Espindola admitted that the town needed to "do a better job" of keeping track of who is on boards. The Selectboard is the appointing authority for all non-elected boards.

"Some things in the town of Fairhaven are good for some people, and ain't good for others," said Mr. Hobson. "What goes around comes around."

Mr. Freitas made the motion and it passed unanimously. The next step is for the BPW to vote to accept having a liaison to the MRC, and then to vote for a BPW member to fill the slot.

Resources Committee. Then the BPW can opt to do that and vote in whomever they want, not necessarily Mr. Hobson.

According to Mr. Coelho the Marine Resources Committee received the letter with town counsel's recommendations in late June, although the letter was written back in January.

Mr. Coelho tried to present his case, with a list of dates that he tried to run through, to show the suspicious nature of the

Recipe of the Week

Italian Fish & Veggie Packets

- 1 lemon, zested
- 1½ tps salt (more for seasoning)
- 1/2 tsp freshly ground black pepper (more for seasoning)
- 1½ lbs sugar snap peas, stemmed
- 1 yellow bell pepper, sliced
- 1 orange bell pepper, sliced
- 1/2 cup white wine
- 1/4 cup lemon juice
- 4 teaspoons olive oil
- Four 4-oz trout fillets, skinned (or other fish, about 1/2" thick)
- 8 thin slices lemon
- 1/4 cup fresh chopped mint
- Preheat the oven to 350°F.

Mix together lemon zest, salt and pepper. Set aside. Lay out 4 sheets of aluminum foil. Place 1/4 of the sugar snap peas, 1/4 of the yellow bell peppers and 1/4 of the orange bell peppers on each sheet of foil. Over each pile of vegetables, drizzle 2 tbsps of white wine, 1 tbsp of lemon juice and 1 tsp of olive oil. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and gently toss.

Top each pile of vegetables with a piece of fish. Sprinkle fish with some of the reserved lemon zest mixture. Top each fish with 2 slices of lemon.

Fold up the foil into an airtight packet. Place the foil packets in the oven and bake for 15 to 18 minutes depending on the thickness of the fish. Sprinkle fish with mint just before serving.

Huttleston Motel demolished

The Huttleston Motel is gone.

A judge ruled in December that the motel had to stop renting to the public due to unsafe conditions,

including a sagging roof, deterioration of the walls and a host of other problems and building code violations. The town had taken the owners to court to condemn the building, which was built around 1947.

The property is owned by Gingera LLC, which was dismissed from the lawsuit.

On June 27, demolition crews started tearing down the building. In a few days, it was gone.



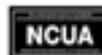

Acushnet LNG project on hold; town gets electric car

Acushnet Selectboard members were happy to announce at their meeting on 7/18, that the LNG expansion project has been withdrawn.

Access Northeast, a project proposed by Eversource, National Grid and Spectra Energy, sought to construct two 3.4 Bcf (billion cubic feet) tanks with an outside diameter of 270 feet at the base and a height of 170 feet each at the existing Peckham Road facility. The project faced fierce opposition from residents and some town officials, as well as resistance from other towns along the pipeline route.

The company withdrew its application on June 30. In a letter* to town officials, Algonquin Gas Transmission cited New England's lack of a "uniform energy policy and the authority necessary for regional support of natural gas infrastructure for electric generation."

The letter also states that New England energy consumers "continue to face serious and well-documented electric reliability and price challenges," a claim disputed by opponents of the project.

"It may come back, but it's off the table as of now," Chairperson Kevin Gaspar said. "The project is dead."

"I'm happy to see it gone," said Selectboard member Roger Cabral, a strong opponent of the project who beat out incumbent Garry Rawcliffe in

April in an election that featured the LNG project front and center. Mr. Rawcliffe would not openly oppose or support the project during the campaign

In another matter, Town Administrator, Brian Noble stated that one of the first things he was charged with as Town Administrator was to reduce the town's insurance cost, and he has done just that by nearly \$85,000.

He said in some areas the town was over insured and in others, under insured. He said that he and town accountant Julie Hebert have worked diligently on the Town insurance and he is celebrating the one victory in reducing the costs for the Town.

Mr. Gaspar commended Mr. Noble and Ms. Hebert, saying they have done a "phenomenal job in a short amount of time."

The board also took a detour outside to view an electric car. The Town has received a grant to buy up to three electric cars and is still shopping around. The cars will be used by Inspectional Services, the Board of Health, and the Council on Aging.

Guy Ledeau, from Nissan Milford was on hand to give a quick review of a vehicle,

which Mr. Cabral and Mr. Cioper took for a quick spin.

Mr. Ledeau said the vehicle is pure electric, with no gas, and no diesel.

He told the board that the car has a top speed more than 90 mph and is comparable to a good V6 engine. He said he has worked with different towns in the area to obtain the vehicles; 17 are driven in Fall River and 24 in New Bedford.

A charging station has already been installed at the Acushnet Town Hall parking lot. Mr. Ledeau said it can recharge to 80% in 30 minutes. He said the total obligation from the Town will result in less than \$1,000



Volunteers mark Little Black Rock for navigation

Little Black Rock...you know it, really you do, even if you don't have a boat. It's the one you see at low tide when you stand at the point of Hoppy's Landing and look out towards the Elizabeth Islands. You can see it from West Island, Wilbur Point, and any number of spots along the shore on Causeway Road and Goulart Memorial Drive: At low tide anyway.

When high tide comes, it's still there, but boaters can't see it. And that makes it a bit of a problem.

Locals know it's there, but newbies to Hoppy's Landing probably do not.

It is on the charts, said Fairhaven Harbormaster Tim Cox, but because it disappears at high tide, it is a hazard.

So, a few volunteers decided to mark it...again.

Father and son team, Frank and Scott Coelho, with tools courtesy of Mike Cordeiro, and a generator from the Harbormaster department, took their boat out and drilled two holes in the rock. In the hole went a pipe and

then a "high flyer" marker that boaters will be able to see even at high tide.

The second hole is an extra, just in case. Mr. Cox said that Little Black Rock has been marked before, but the poles snapped in the weather. The metal has gotten stuck in the holes,

blocking them up.

If it happens again, the old rock will be ready for a new one.

"It's just to mark the rock," said Mr. Cox, no symbols or secret messages. "It just lets people know the rock is there."

Dr Hinohara, who helped save Whitfield home, dies at 105

Dr. Shigeaki Hinohara of Japan, who was instrumental in saving the home of Captain William Whitfield in Fairhaven, has died at the age of 105.

Dr. Hinohara spearheaded a fund-raising drive that restored the house once lived in by Manjiro Nakahama, the first Japanese person to live in America.

"It is with great sadness that we wish to report the passing of Dr. Shigeaki Hinohara of Tokyo, Japan. It was the incredible fund-raising ability of Dr. Hinohara that saved the home

of Capt. William Whitfield on Cherry Street, Fairhaven and renovated it into the Whitfield-Manjiro Friendship House. Museum. Thus, the connection with Manjiro's home town of Tosashimizu is preserved in his name for the future," wrote Gerald P. Rooney, President & CEO of the Whitfield-Manjiro Friendship Society, in an email.

According to a report in the Japan Times, Dr. Hinohara died from respiratory failure on Tuesday, 7/18. He was hospitalized in March, but died at home after being released. He was unable to eat, but, according to


