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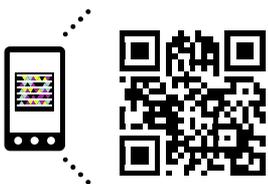

## Need a ride?



Aqua colored bikes like these at Hoppy's Landing are owned by VeoRide and have been dispersed throughout Fairhaven. The bike-share program allows people to use the bikes for 50 cents per 15 minutes. The bikes are locked at the back tire and are released when the rider pays using an app on a smart phone, so a specific docking station is not necessary. The Selectboard approved use of VeoRide in Fairhaven a couple of months ago, and the town administrator signed the contract recently. See page 16 for story. *Photo by Beth David.*

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# Father's Day Road Race, Huttleston Marketplace this weekend

Father's Day weekend is the time for several events that mark the summer season. Here are a few. **Also, check out our Happenings pages on 5, 6, and 7.**

## Father's Day Road Race

The 43rd Father's Day 10K and 5K Road Races, Sunday, June 17. Begins and ends at Hastings Middle School, 30 School Street, Fairhaven. Start time, 9:00 a.m.

The annual running of a 10K, TAC sanctioned course through the lovely, historical Fairhaven streets features some of New England's top runners. There is also a shorter 5K race.

## Huttleston Marketplace Opens on Saturday, 6/16

There will be arts and crafts, including woodworking, jewelry, knitted goods, photo note cards, prints, and calendars with local scenes. There will be unique bird houses, hand woven items, t-shirts, and repurposed household decor. There will be farm fresh produce, organic eggs, honey, two bakeries, and fresh made guacamole. There will be antiques and collectibles. There

will be soaps, balms, lotion, and herbs. There will be henna and jagua temporary tattoos and face painting.

Close to 30 booths should be set up when Fairhaven's new outdoor Huttleston Marketplace opens on Saturday, June 16, at 10:00 a.m. The marketplace will held on the lawn of the Fairhaven Visitors Center, 141 Main Street, at the intersection of Route 6, directly next door to Fairhaven High School. The hours are 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and there's free parking in the high school lots. It will continue to operate, rain or shine, every Saturday through September 1 (except for June 30).

"This is intended to be a vibrant outdoor shopping spot — part arts, crafts, and collectibles fair, part farmers market — that happens weekly through the summer months," says Fairhaven tourism director Chris Richard, who is organizing the market. "Besides being a great place to shop, it will provide very affordable space for crafters, artists, and other compatible merchants to set up shop, so to speak."

Overall there are more than 40 vendors signed up, though not all of them will be at the market every week. The vendors will vary, so there are lots of reasons to stop by every Saturday.

"The public coming here each week will see select, unique things for sale. There won't be any new mass-manufactured goods, multi-level marketing products, or garage and rummage sale items," says Mr.

Richard. "Shoppers will be supporting creative artisans from our own region."

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# ZBA has full agenda, mixed yeas and nays

The Fairhaven Zoning Board of Appeals discussed 10 hearings at its meeting on Tuesday, 6/5, resulting in four approvals, four denials, one continuance, and one withdrawal.

After a bit of discussion and arguments against by several neighbors, William Alphonse was denied a variance to build a house at 1 Mina Street. The undersized lot is home to a barn now. Mr. Alphonse's representative told the board that the lot was small, but noted that 28 of the 52 lots were undersized, and five were smaller than 1 Mina Street. He said building a house there would not change the neighborhood.

He said he believed the lot was exempt from the newer regulations because Mr. Alphonse's father owned it and passed it on to his son in 2004.

Several neighbors spoke against it, one saying that he was denied a request to build in the same neighborhood and it would not be fair to allow it. He said the building inspector told him not even to try, it would be a waste of time. He said he was not

against the new house, but, "Let everybody else build, too."

Mr. Alphonse's rep said the two lots and situations were not the same: 1 Mina Street is not vacant, and the owner has been paying a sewer betterment fee for something that he cannot use.

"It strikes me as patently unfair," he said. "You have to rectify it."

ZBA Chairperson Peter DeTerra took issue with that characterization.

"You bought a nonconforming lot," he said. "And I've gotta rectify it?"

In the end, the board denied the petition.

Kate Markey and David Cope did not fare well either in their bid to get six chickens at 333 Huttleston Avenue. A special permit is required to raise livestock on less than five acres.

A neighbor wrote a letter to the board complaining about "incessant barking" by the couple's dog. She said if they cannot "attend to their dog," she did not believe they would be any more attentive to livestock.

The board was split, 3-3, on the vote, falling short of the four votes necessary to approve the petition.

One petition that elicited a lot of discussion, and some testy exchanges also ended in a denial. George and Sharon Mendonca sought a variance to build a 42x30-foot house on an undersized lot on Frederick Avenue, an unpaved "paper" street. Mr. Mendonca, who has owned the property for 31 years, told the board that the property has been in his family for three generations and he really just wanted to get rid of it. He said the neighbors were not interested in buying it, he has been paying taxes on it, his father before him and his grandfather all paid taxes for decades on the property.

Alan Ewing of Ewing Engineering told the board that the house will meet all the setback requirements and will be 30 feet from all abutters. The frontage, however, is 40 feet short of the 140' required, and the lot coverage is over by 20,000 sf of the 30,000 sf required, and building coverage is over by 2% of the 15% maximum.

ZBA member Francis Cox, Jr., read a letter from building inspector



### *Did You Know?*

The Emancipation Proclamation was signed January 1863, but the executive order was not a successful public notice. On June 19, 1865, Union General Gordon Granger led thousands of federal troops to Galveston, Texas to announce that the Civil War had ended, and slaves had been freed. Approximately 250,000 Texan slaves had no idea that their freedom had been secured by the government. Today, recognizing this historic event has increased in

participation as a time of celebration, reflection and healing.

As stewards of the first free home of Frederick Douglass, the New Bedford Historical Society is dedicated to documenting and celebrating the history, legacy and presence of African Americans, Cape Verdeans, Native Americans, West Indians and other people of color in New Bedford.

## Meditate in Park

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## Recipe of the Week

### Stuffed Quahogs

12 quahogs, washed well  
 1/4 cup white wine (or water)  
 2 tablespoons olive oil  
 1/2 lb. Italian sausage (sweet or hot), crumbled  
 4 cups coarsely chopped stale bread (crusts removed)  
 1/2 cup minced onion  
 1/2 cup minced fennel  
 1/4 cup minced sweet red pepper  
 1/4 cup minced green pepper  
 1/4 cup minced celery  
 3 tablespoons fresh parsley  
 1 teaspoon dried thyme  
 1 teaspoon crushed red pepper  
 Salt and pepper, to taste

Preheat oven to 350°. Combine quahogs and wine in a large pot, bring to boil, cover and cook until clams are just open. Cool, drain, reserving broth. Remove clams from shells, saving 12 shell halves. Chop clams coarsely and set aside. Strain broth through coffee filter and set aside.

Heat the olive oil in a saute pan and brown sausage. In a food processor, combine the clams, broth, and sausage with remaining ingredients and process until well blended. Taste to check seasonings. Divide mixture and scoop into the 12 shell halves. Bake for approximately 30 minutes.

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

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# And just like that...they're everywhere

The Fairhaven Selectboard approved the idea of a bike-share program in town a couple of months ago and approved VeoRide, a company that provides bicycles to members of the public on a pay-as-you-go basis. Town Administrator Mark Rees signed the contract on 5/29, and the bikes started showing up on Fairhaven streets this week. The contract is at no cost to the town, VeoRide makes its money through rentals.

The company will start out with 30 bikes in Fairhaven and 30 bikes in Mattapoisett, which is in the same boundary area as Fairhaven.

The bright, aqua-colored bikes are easy to spot. On Tuesday, they were at the Town Hall, near the bike path at the end of David Drown Boulevard and South Street, at the Recreation/Senior Center, Fort Phoenix, Pease Park, Civil War Park, and Hoppy's Landing. But, the specific locations do not really matter, because once the bikes are being used, they will get dropped off at different places.

To use the bikes, riders need to download the app and scan the QR code on the bike. Don't worry if you don't know what a QR code is. It's marked on the bike. You'll need a credit card. The app will put money into your account, and you use that to rent the bike. It costs 50 cents per 15 minutes. You can also get a

monthly subscription for \$28.99, a yearly one for \$99.99, or a day pass for \$6.99. Subscriptions allow you to have unlimited half-hour-rides. Anything over a half-hour is billed at the pay-as-you-go rate. There is no problem, though, with stopping, locking the bike for a few seconds, and then restarting the session.

Once you scan the code, the lock on the back wheel pops open, and you are ready to go. You can use the bike anywhere you want, but you must return it to a spot in Fairhaven or Mattapoisett. Almost any bike rack will do. Be aware of no parking zones on the app, though. If you leave a bike there, it might lock, but you will continue to be charged for use.

The app shows the locations of available bikes in real time. A rider can locate a bike using the app and reserve it for 10 minutes. People without smart phones, though, are out of luck. You need the app.

When you're done riding, you can leave the bike at any bike rack, or other logical spot. The dockless system means it is easy to ride between loca-



tions and not have to worry about a place to leave it or what to do with it while at a restaurant or shopping etc.

That Mattapoisett and Fairhaven are in the same boundary area, is also very convenient, because Fairhaven's Phoenix Bike Trail and Mattapoisett's Rail Trail connect to each other. So a rider can start out in Mattapoisett, ride to Fairhaven for lunch, and stop the meter while eating.

Of course, someone else might snag your bike while it's offline, but that's where the app's location function comes in.

The bike is user friendly in a number of ways: The seat adjusts for a variety of heights; the chain has a guard to keep your pants clean; the lights are solar powered; it has run-flat tires; it has a sturdy basket for your grocery shopping (or your dog); and it has no bar across the top so you can swing your leg in easily; it has fenders to keep dirt and mud from flying up; and it has three speeds.

One anonymous person did complain about the location of the brightly colored bikes in front of town hall, saying that they were not in keeping with the historic look of the block.

On Tuesday, as the *Neigh News* drove around looking for bikes and riders, we only found one person who said he used it just for a quick test ride. Another man said he had trouble with the app. The bikes had, however, only been around for a day or two at that point.



Greetings.

The H.H. Rogers Walking Tours started out in a big way last week with a group of about 30 from the Cape coming on Tuesday. It was the Chatham Walkers who came to enjoy a walk before going to lunch at one of our nearby restaurants. They were joined by a few other members of the general public on a beautiful late spring day. On Thursday, there was a smaller group, but it was another fine morning for walking.

The Rogers tours will continue every Tuesday and Thursday morning through the end of September. They start outside the Town Hall, 40 Center Street, at 10:00 a.m. Under usual circumstances Bob Foster guides the Tuesday morning tours and I guide the Thursday ones. If it's rainy the tours are cancelled. They are free of charge and there is no need to register in advance (though the Chatham Walkers did call ahead, because they are a larger group).

Also last Thursday a group of vintage car owners were here for a tour of the center. You may have seen their cars in the morning. Jumping in at the last moment, volunteer Gail Costello was on hand outside the Town Hall to hand out Visitors Guides and point out the local attractions. Thank you Gail!

Another volunteer has been preparing to guide Riverside Cemetery walking tours. Joanne Zych has been a Visitors Center volunteer on Friday mornings. In addition, she has volunteered to guide some of the evening cemetery tours. Last Saturday, I walked through Riverside with Joanne to hear her version of the tour. It's a bit different than my own tour, but full of information about the most prominent burial sites in the cemetery. Joanne will be guiding her tour for the public on Wednesday, June 20, at 6:00 p.m. The tour starts near the white house/office just inside the main gates of Riverside. This tour includes hills and uneven ground; be sure to wear comfortable walking shoes. Also note there are no public restrooms at Riverside Cemetery.

The Pirates and Privateers presentations at Fort Phoenix are now underway. They are held every Friday

morning, weather permitting, near the fort cannons. Abby Black, Andrew the Powder Monkey and Greybeard put on a family friendly show about pirates and Revolutionary War privateers along with Fort Phoenix history. There are stories, demonstrations and the firing of a small swivel cannon to end things with a bang. All ages enjoy this presentation.

On Friday, June 15, all the Acushnet third graders will see it, and next Monday all the 5th graders from Mattapoisett's Old Hammondtown School will visit the fort. We'll also be putting on one program for the Rec Center's Kool Kids summer program. It's free, so stop by for some history-tainment!

After many months of planning, the Huttleston Marketplace will begin on Saturday, June 16, running from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on the lawn of the Visitors Center, 141 Main Street, directly next to Fairhaven High



School. I first started developing this idea last October with a poll on Facebook about what people would like to see happening on Saturdays. The top vote getters were "arts & crafts" and "antiques and collectibles." So the market will have all of those, along with farm fresh produce, eggs, honey, locally produced food products, baked goods and more. On opening day we should have 30 booths set up.

(I'm not going to editorialize about the Town Administrator's decision to cancel the market that day, but he did say

Wayne Fostin, who was not at the meeting, saying that the lot was not grandfathered in (exempt from newer requirements).

Many neighbors spoke against the project, saying the lot was a refuge for wildlife, and extolling the beauty of the spot.

"What do I do with it?" asked Mr. Mendonca. "I tried everything. I don't know what to do."

As the neighbors expanded on their complaints about the size of the lot and praised the birds, and Mr. Mendonca tried to respond, Mr. DeTerra got a bit testy with him, holding him to the rules of only one rebuttal, which Mr. Ewing gave.

He said there would be no change to the grade, in response to a worry about flooding.

The board denied the petition.

Another hearing had a large contingent of neighbors attend, but they ended up not speaking on it at all.

Hans Doherty, 121 Farmfield Street, opened the hearing by saying there was a "misconception and confusion" about his petition. He said the characterization of his proposal as a Bed & Breakfast (B&B) was wrong. He

only wanted to rent his house, he said.

Various board members expressed confusion, because he would not need a special permit simply to rent out his house, even on a regular basis.

Mr. Doherty said he wanted to rent to "upscale tenants" who would pay about \$4,000 a week for the peace and serenity of the private beach. He noted that tenants would spend money locally, and insisted it was not a B&B.

Then why is he here, asked the board members.

Mr. Doherty said that Mr. Fostin said he needed a special permit.

Board members said they thought it was for a B&B.

Mr. Doherty said he was "disheartened" at the level of opposition from the neighbors.

He tried to get the board to sign off on the petition, even though the wording said "Bed & Breakfast," and he insisted it was not.

Board members held their ground, saying they would not, because he did not need it for what he was describing, however, if the special permit said B&B, then that is what the neighborhood would end up with.

In the end, it was continued for clarification. The neighbors were not allowed to speak on the petition.

The board did approve four hearings.

Michael Cardoso, 54 Gilbert Street, received a variance to build a new 30x40-foot garage, replacing a smaller one.

Doug Medeiros,

131 Shaw Road, received approval for a variance to build a garage 308 square feet over the 700 sf maximum for an accessory building, and short 12' of the required 30' side yard. Mr. Medeiros told the board his basement gets water so he needs storage and place to do his woodworking. He said he has no close neighbors because he is surrounded by the large Normandy Farm and conservation area.

Also approved for his project, was David Small, 16 Widemarsh Road, in a continued hearing. He received a variance for being two feet short of the required 30-foot setback for a deck. Mr. Small told the board he needed to repair his deck and wanted to add a couple of feet to it.

The property is at the end of the road, he said, and the road running by the deck is actually a paper street, not paved, and not used by anyone, because his is the last house. There was no public comment.

Petitioner Matthew Brodo, speaking for the owners of 76 Farmfield St., received a variance for being short 7' of the required 20' front setback. The project will add a master suite and a two-car garage. Mr. Brodo said the lot was a triangular shape creating the need for a variance.

Christopher Ingrande was denied his request for a variance to build an accessory building 580 square feet over the 700 sf maximum and short of the setback requirements at 689 Sonticut Neck Road. Mr. Ingrande did not attend the meeting, nor did a representative.

Richard Tavares withdrew his petition, without prejudice, for a special permit to build a mother-in-law apartment at 33 Charity Stevens Lane. •••

Our community Master Plan is complete! After a year of hard work, public meetings and input, multiple drafts and final revisions, the Town of Fairhaven Master Plan "FAIRHAVEN 2040" is ready for printing and distribution.

The Master Plan is a policy document used by Town staff, the Planning Board, and other local boards and committees to make decisions about:

- What new development looks like and where it happens
- How to protect environmentally sensitive and historically significant areas
- Priorities for future public investments in community services, including recreational facilities, public safety, and utilities

Its most important goal is to protect and enhance the things in Fairhaven that make it a great place to live, both for today's residents and for future generations.

"Fairhaven is unique in that our rich history is also our rich future," said Wayne Hayward, Chair of the Planning Board.

Over the course of 2017, the Town of Fairhaven worked to update the Master Plan under the guidance of the Planning Board. With the help of former Planning Director Bill Roth, other municipal staff, and project consultant VHB, the Planning Board launched an ambitious public engagement effort that included events that were attended by groups of very knowledgeable residents and motivated stakeholders.

The product of this community engagement was used to create a document that articulates the values shared by Fairhaven residents and business owners.

People talked about what they feel are the most treasured places in the community, the most pressing challenges, and hundreds of ideas of how to keep the Town such a special community.

"The culmination of the plan," according to Gloria McPherson, current Planning Director, "is the implementation actions section, which will be used over the next 20 years to guide investment, make public improvements, and protect natural and cultural resources."

Hard copies of Fairhaven 2040 will be distributed to all Town Departments and Boards that are integral to the implementation of the plan. Copies of the plan will also be available for public review at the Millicent Library and in the Planning & Economic Development office in Town Hall.


The tour visits the final resting places of some of the town's most prominent people. You'll also see lovely examples of early tombstone art as you walk along the beautifully landscaped paths.

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

# New Bedford Harbor Superfund Site Community Update on Site Activities — June 2018

## **Lower Harbor CAD Cell Disposal**

Dredging of PCB contaminated sediments below low tide elevations (subtidal) are now substantially complete south of Coggeshall Street. PCB levels measured in the remediated areas after the dredging was complete averaged about 10 ppm, well below required levels. Dredging followed by CAD Cell disposal continues just north of the Coggeshall Street Bridge through mid-June.

## **Shoreline Cleanups**

### **Marsh Island Update; North Street Salt Marsh and “Between the Bridges” (Fairhaven)**

Some replanting of vegetation and other maintenance activities of areas addressed by EPA in 2017 at Marsh Island will continue in 2018.

The next shoreline cleanup is underway at the saltmarsh at the end of North Street in Fairhaven. Approximately 2000 cubic yards of contaminated sediment has been excavated from this area, to be followed by topsoil placement and replanting and restoration of the saltmarsh. Following the North Street saltmarsh cleanup, remediation of the shoreline area between the Coggeshall Street and Route 195 bridges in Fairhaven will commence this summer/fall.

## **Upper Harbor Wetlands Update (Acushnet)**

Brush clearing and access road construction in the shoreline area furthest north in the upper harbor in Acushnet near the former Ball Plant One is scheduled for this summer. Excavation of PCB-contaminated soil/sediment in this area's intertidal zone is scheduled to then begin in fall 2018, followed by clean topsoil placement and replanting of the saltmarsh.

## **Interim Sediment Cap Near the Aerovox Site**

Approximately 3 acres of highly contaminated shoreline and river sediment will be placed under an “Interim Cap” this Spring near the former Aerovox Mill Site so that dredging of the adjacent river sediments can proceed in sequence with EPA's cleanup.

## **Dredging and Disposal of Highly Contaminated Sediment from the Upper Harbor**

Dredging of the Cable Crossing area in the Upper Harbor began in October 2017, and is now substantially complete. PCB sediment levels in this area have dropped dramatically. Once dredging is fully complete in the Cable Crossing, the cleanup will proceed in a northerly direction towards the Wood Street Bridge


