# Tall ship Eagle to visit NB; USCG band to play in Fairhaven Ctr

## Public invited to tour "America's Tall Ship" in NB

Coast Guard Cutter Eagle, "America's Tall Ship," is scheduled to visit New Bedford, Aug. 10-13. The 295-foot Barque Eagle is set to dock at the State Pier Friday, Aug. 10, and will have the following free and public tour schedule:

Friday, Aug. 10, 1-4 p.m.

Saturday, Aug. 11, 10 a.m.-7 p.m.

Sunday, Aug. 12, 1-5 p.m.

The Coast Guard Band will perform a series of pop-up concerts on Friday throughout the towns of New Bedford and Fairhaven.

A permanent crew of eight officers and 57 enlisted personnel maintain the Eagle and guide Coast Guard Academy cadets through an underway and in-port training schedule, dedicated to learning the skills of navigation, damage control, watchstanding, engineering, and deck seamanship.

At 295-feet in length, Eagle is the largest tall ship in United States government service. Constructed in 1936 by the Blohm and Voss Shipyard in Hamburg, Germany, and originally commissioned as the Horst Wessel by the German Navy, Eagle was a war reparation for the United States following World War II.

The majestic sailing ship provides USCG Academy cadets and officer candidates with their first taste of sea

and salt air. Eagle has served as a classroom-at-sea to future Coast Guard officers since 1946, offering an at-sea leadership and professional development experience as part of the USCG Academy curriculum. The Eagle is a three-masted barque with more than 22,300 square feet of sail and six miles of rigging.

Eagle's homeport is Baltimore, MD. In Summer 2019 its homeport will shift to New London, CT. For more information about the ship, please visit <http://www.cga.edu/eagle/>

## Free US Coast Guard Band Concert in Fairhaven

The United States Coast Guard Band will perform patriotic music on Saturday, August 11 at the Fairhaven Town Hall. Music will begin at 6 p.m. Come early, it's sure to be a popular event. Lawn seating only, audience members should bring chairs or blankets. No tickets required. Seating is on Center Street and the lawns of the Town Hall and Library. In the event of rain, the concert will be performed at Hastings Middle School on School Street.

The Coast Guard Band is made up of 55 musicians and located at the Coast Guard Academy in New London, Connecticut. It is the premier

band representing the USCG and the Department of Homeland Security. The ensemble has performed at some of the most prestigious venues in the nation, including the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, Lincoln Center, and Carnegie Hall. The Band also has a rich history of performing internationally.

The USCG Band was organized in March 1925. In 1965, President Lyndon B. Johnson signed congressional legislation resulting in the Coast Guard Band becoming the permanent, official musical representative of the nation's oldest continuous seagoing service. This event also established the Coast Guard Band as one of our nation's premier service bands.

# \$30K grant helping Fairhaven improve recycling

The Fairhaven Board of Health received \$30,000 from the state to implement the "IQ Kit," designed to improve recycling rates. The goal is to reduce contamination in the recycling bins. Residents have been using the 95-gallon recycle carts, with orange covers; and the 65-gallon trash carts, with blue covers, since March of 2015 in Fairhaven.

In the last few weeks, four people have been checking carts in Fairhaven to educate residents about what, exactly, is allowed in the recycling bins and what is not.

The BOH mailed out postcards to every mailing address in Fairhaven, ran ads in local press, added information to the BOH page on the town website, and created a video that will soon be available online.

Fairhaven Health Agent Mary Freire-Kellogg said that things have changed in the recycling world and the town will pay a hefty price if people do not get educated about those changes, and modify their behavior.

"The list of things that can go in your recycle bin has gotten very small," says Ms. Freire-Kellogg on the video.

In the past, almost everything that was plastic, glass, or cardboard, was acceptable in the recycle bin. But changes in the world market mean that many of those items are no longer accepted curbside. The biggest problem is grocery bags, the second is "tanglers," such as extension cords.

"A lot of things can be recycled, just not in these bins," says Health Department Intern Dan Shea on the video.

For people who are especially conscious of recycling, it is important for them to understand how mistakes can backfire, big time.

ABC collects the recycling from the bins and takes it to Howland Disposal Services. If a load is contaminated, the whole load gets rejected.

Ms. Freire-Kellogg said that Howland is rejected 10 truckloads of recycling every day because of contaminants. They send that to a landfill, including all the items that are recyclable. So the whole point of recycling or re-using backfires.

It is actually worse for Fairhaven residents who want to be environmentally conscious, because our trash goes to SEMASS, the waste-to-energy plant, where it is burned to make electricity. And the plastics from a rejected load could end up in a landfill, forever.

All hope is not lost, though, for those items that cannot go into the bin. The recycling center on Arsene Street accepts most of the other items.

Items that should go into the recycle bin include bottles, plastic jugs, newspaper, cardboard (flattened).

What should not go into the bins includes plastic wraps of any kind, small packaging, such as candy wrappers.

Anything that had food in it should be rinsed and the caps replaced before placing in the bins. Those are reused. If you do not have the cap, you can still put the bottle or jug in the bin. Do not put the caps in separately, they should just go in the trash if they are not properly matched up to a bottle.

The crew checking bins will mark the bin with an "oops" and turn it so that the truck will not pick it up,

## Many items can be recycled, just not in these bins

**Reason:** It is all in how the bin is processed. The equipment that handles bottles, cans and paper, cannot handle thin plastic, cords and other items.

Recycling programs are available for these other items

**Bagged:** Items cannot be separated from bag at facility and newspapers tied with string cannot be separated from string as items go down conveyer belt

**Thin Plastic:** The wrapping from water bottle boxes, as well as many other products and bags get stuck in machine. These items can be brought to the bin at the grocery store, they accept all thin plastic.

**Tanglers:** Hoses, Cords, String, and Ties get tangled in machine.

**Yuck:** We know containers won't be spotless but make sure they are empty and do not contain easily removable residue. Paper plates and pizza boxes are good, just not with the pizza still in the box or food residue on the plates, the same goes for paper towels, What is on them can taint the load and cause the entire truck to have to go to the landfill.

Plastic is able to go in bin if it is crushable, if it would break by crushing, it is too rigid to go in the bin and will be best recycled through other programs.

The BOH will announce soon a hazardous material collection day for paint cans and chemical bottles

**Yard Waste:** BOH has compost bins available

**Fabric** cannot go in these bins but can be brought to the white bins at the Council on Aging, Fire Station or Oxford School. The fabric can be torn just not excessively dirty (spots are okay), and funds raised by the collection go toward hoarding remediation services in the town.

leaving the homeowner with a whole month between pick-ups, since Fairhaven collects recycling every two weeks. Some residents have complained angrily about their bins being rejected.

Ms. Freire-Kellogg said that the program is not meant to be punitive. There will not be any fines. A bin is only rejected if it has at least four prohibited items.

One big change of an item not accepted is colored take-out

Despite the stifling heat, the 104th Feast of the Blessed Sacrament delighted thousands this weekend, from Thursday, 8/2 to Sunday, 8/5/18, at Madeira Field in New Bedford. It is the largest Portuguese feast in the world, and features children's activities, music for adults and children, dancing, Portuguese food, a place for people to make their own carne d'espeto (shish kebab), and much more. # Recipe of the Week

## Southwest Egg and Cheese Boats

2 oval sandwich rolls  
4 eggs  
3 tablespoons whole milk  
1 (4 ounce) can chopped green chile peppers  
1 cup shredded sharp cheddar cheese  
1/2 cup shredded Pepper Jack cheese  
1/2 teaspoon smoked paprika  
1/4 tsp salt

Preheat oven to 350°. Line a rimmed baking sheet with parchment paper.

Make a V-shaped cut in each roll, leaving the ends intact. Lift out V-shaped wedge. Hollow out rolls gently to make shallow bread bowls, being careful not to cut through the bottom or sides. Place bread bowls on the prepared baking sheet.

Whisk eggs in a bowl. Add milk; whisk until well blended. Stir in green chile peppers, Cheddar cheese, Pepper Jack cheese, paprika, and salt. Pour mixture slowly into the prepared rolls, spreading evenly with a spoon.

Bake in the preheated oven until egg mixture is completely set and cheese is lightly browned, about 30 mins. Cool for 3 mins before serving.





containers. Although marked as recyclable, they are not allowed in the bin, only clear ones are accepted. The colored containers can be taken to Arsene Street.

All "rigid plastic," such as toys, lawn furniture and buckets, can go to Arsene Street.

The number one concern is plastic bags. They are recyclable, but should not be put in the bins. They can go to the grocery store, where all plastic is accepted.

There is a market for the bags, they make decking from it, said Ms. Freire-Kellogg, so it is a worthwhile effort to get the bags to the grocery store. If you put them in the bin, the whole load could end up in a landfill.

One misconception is that all paper is acceptable. All kinds of paper are, but not if shredded. Ms. Freire-Kellogg suggests using it in the garden for weed control.

Paper and cardboard should be loose in the bins, not tied up.

The second big concern is tangleurs, such as extension cords, rope, twine, belts, etc. They get wrapped around the machines and cause a lot of problems. So if one is spotted, then the whole load is rejected.

It may also surprise people to know that prescription bottles are considered hazardous waste, since

they contain residue from the medication in them. Those can go to the police station which accepts unwanted medication for proper disposal.

One *Neigh News* reader complained that his bin was rejected because he had a plastic straw in it. Ms. Freire-Kellogg said that the plastic cups from fast-food restaurants are accepted, but the covers and straws are not because they get stuck in the machines.

"So remember, cup 'yes,' straw and cover 'no,'" she says on the video.

Clothes and other textiles, such as clean rags and stuffed animals are also items that are recyclable, but not accepted in the bins. The town has three drop-off locations for textiles: the Senior Center/Council on Aging, the Fire Station on Washington Street, and the North Fairhaven Improvement Association building in Benoit Square.

The town gets paid \$100 per ton for those items. That money is then used for hoarding remediation in Fairhaven, to help hoarders get decluttered.

"And the strangest thing of all, and

I don't understand this," says Ms. Freire-Kellogg on the video, "but we have seen so many diapers, dirty diapers, in the recycle bin. That clearly is yuck, and that has no business being in anybody's recycle bin. That is trash."



# Police nab three in Stop & Shop theft, car chase
