Early voting available through Friday 11/2 in Mass.

Early voting in Massachusetts ends on Friday, 11/2, so if you can't make it to the polls on election day, which is Tuesday, 11/6, you have a little more time to mark your choices. Early voting began on October 22.

In Fairhaven, early voters can go to the Fire Station, 146 Washington Street, to cast their votes, from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on both of the remaining days.

In Acushnet, voters can go to the Town Hall Annex (Parting Ways Build-

ing), 130 Main Street, from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Thursday, and from 8 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. on Friday.

This is the second state election that has offered early voting to Massachusetts voters. Press time came a little too early to make an accurate comparison, but it looked like both towns were

running a bit behind the numbers from the last election.

In Acushnet, about 1800 people voted early in 2016, according to Town Clerk Pamela Labonte. In Fairhaven, it was around 1700, said Acting Town Clerk Carolyn Hurley.

As of Wednesday, which includes Tuesday voting, not Wednesday's numbers, Fair-

haven had a little more than 800 early voters; Acushnet had about 600.

The numbers have grown with each day, in Fairhaven from 78 on day one of early voting to 167 on Tuesday.

Linda Fredette, Fairhaven Town Clerk Office Assistant, said that it was still quite possible for Fairhaven to reach the same numbers as in 2016. She said more than 600 people voted

Hoppy's Dock Out



Lopes-Schultz holds her own in UK races

Last week we told you about Heather Lopes-Schultz, the Fairhaven woman who competes in obstacle course racing (OCRs). She competed in the OCR World Championships in Brentwood, UK, last week, from 10/19-21, which had competitors from 60 nations.

Ms. Lopes-Schultz was happy with her performance, writing in an email that she finished the 3K in less than an hour, and finished the 15K before the four-hour cut-off.

The 3K had 24 obstacles and the 15K had 100 obstacles.

"The 15k was insane! It had a four-hour time limit and 100 obstacles!" wrote Ms. Lopes-Schultz in an email. My goal was to finish before the cut off time and I did! I wasn't able to



complete all 100 due to exhaustion and losing my grip [because] of being covered in mud."

She said that many of the obstacles were new to her. She said even her mind got exhausted as she faced so many obstacles. She walked at one point, and realized she would never make it to the finish by the cut-off time if she did not keep running.

"I was wet, covered in mud, sore, bruised and my legs felt like led, but I made myself run and get to the end!" wrote Ms. Lopes-Schultz. "The feeling of hearing them announce my name and country, as I approached the finish line, was amazing! It brought tears to my eyes. I ran for me, my family, friends and country. It was an incredible experience and one I'll

A Plastic Ocean

The New Bedford Whaling Museum will present a free screening of the documentary film *A Plastic Ocean*, Thurs., 11/8, at 6 p.m., 18 Johnny Cake Hill, New Bedford.

Every year, 8 million tons of plastic are dumped in our oceans. *A Plastic Ocean*, written and directed by Craig Leeson and produced by Jo Ruxton, documents an expedition to the center of the South Pacific Ocean Gyre, a rotating ocean current, where researchers found more plastic than plankton. In *A Plastic Ocean* journalist Leeson and world-champion freediver Tanya Streeter highlight the newest science in a crisis with global stakes, revealing how plastics, once they enter the oceans, break up into small particulates that enter the food chain where they attract toxins like a magnet. These toxins are stored in seafood's fatty tissues, and are eventually consumed by humans.

Neuroscientist Aminda O'Hare will tell us how the practice of mindfulness actually causes changes in the brain by increasing gray matter and white matter (or the number and strength of neural connections in the brain). Her research has shown that the attention network in the frontal and parietal lobes of the brain increase in size because of mindful meditation, altering the way we perceive and experience emotions such as compassion.

1/4 c. butter, melted

3 1/2 c. whole or chopped pecans

Preheat oven to 350° and line a 9-x-13 baking pan with parchment paper and spray with cooking spray. Prepare brownies according to box instructions. Pour into prepared pan and bake 25 minutes. Remove from oven.

Meanwhile, make pecan filling. In a medium bowl, whisk together maple syrup, brown sugar, eggs, vanilla, melted butter, and salt until smooth. Fold in pecans, stirring until fully coated.

Top baked brownies with pecan topping, spreading evenly. Return to oven and bake until pecan mixture is set, 25 to 30 minutes more.

International Charity Fraud Awareness Week

Attorney General Maura Healey has joined with the National Association of State Charities Officials (NASCO), state charity regulators, and the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) to participate in the first International Charity Fraud Awareness Week (Oct .22-26).

The FTC, which developed this initiative, has released information and videos in English (<https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=KIPMiai9ILo&feature=youtu.be>) and Spanish (<https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=3miY-zS0i8c&feature=youtu.be>) to help consumers recognize charitable solicitation fraud and identify legitimate charities.

"Many of the strongest and most innovative charities in the country are located right here in Massachusetts," said AG Healey. "It's important that consumers have the tools to make informed decisions and give wisely to nonprofit organizations, wherever they may be located, that make a positive impact in our communities."

AG Healey's Office encourages potential donors, regardless of where or how they choose to donate, to learn how to spot fraudulent and deceptive solicitations and make sure their contributions benefit the charitable causes they want to support. When donating to a charity,

the AG's Office advises consumers:

- If you are contributing over the internet, make sure that the website you are visiting belongs to a legitimate and established charity.
- Remember that most crowdfunding sites are not charities and many typically take a percentage of your donation as a fee.
- Ask lots of questions. How much of the money goes to the charity and how much to a professional fundraiser? Ask if your contribution is tax deductible and what the charity intends to do with any excess contributions that might remain after the victims' needs are addressed.
- Beware of social media posts or emails soliciting donations to copycat organizations or fake websites.
- Do not give your personal or financial information to anyone soliciting money.
- Never pay by cash. Pay by check or credit card and make a check out directly to the charity, not the fundraiser or any other indi-

vidual. Specify, on the check and in writing, whenever possible, the purpose of your donation.

on the last day of early voting in that election.

Ms. Hurley said she was happy with the way things were going so far, with everything running smoothly.

"This is great," she said. "People are coming out."

Voters who want to vote early will be greeted by poll workers who will take their names and check them in, much like on election day, although the two towns have slightly different procedures for handling the lists and checkout.

Each early voter will get an envelope and a ballot. He or she will go into a private booth and mark the ballot, and place it into the envelope. The envelope will need to be filled out with the voter's name, address, and must be signed by the voter, similar to absentee voting.

In Fairhaven and Acushnet, the process differs a little from this point, but all ballots in both towns will go into ballot boxes that lock. Ballot boxes are never left unattended until put away for the night.

At the end of each day, the names are inputted into a database that is sent to the state, so that early voters are noted as having voted when election day rolls around.

There are two or three opportunities along the way for the check-in, check-out numbers to be verified. And, again, each town has slight variations on how they handle that, within the guidelines set by the state. But on election day, anyone who has voted early will already be checked in and out to prevent anyone from voting twice.

Each afternoon, after voting is over

and the information has been sent to the state, the ballot boxes are locked away in a secure place.

"We're coming in early, we're working late," said Ms. Hurley.

The ballots themselves will actually put into the voting machines to be counted on election day by poll workers throughout the course of the voting day.
