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Fairhaven unveils its brand new ladder truck, hires Vets agent

The Fairhaven Selectboard welcomed the town's new Veterans Agent, and inspected the town's new ladder truck at its meeting on Monday, 1/14/19. After opening up the meeting, the board took a quick recess to go outside and inspect the new Ladder 1 (see story on page 12), which boasts the latest technology.

The board also approved the appointment of Bradford Fish of Acushnet as the town's new Veterans Agent. The town has been operating without an agent for several months, with the work falling on Administrative Secretary Jane Bettencourt.

The board presented Ms. Bettencourt with a bouquet of flowers to let her know that they appreciated her extra effort.

Mr. Fish was hired by Town Administrator Mark Rees, subject to approval by the Board, after a search committee picked him as their first choice.

He is currently Veteran's Service Officer for the town of Westport. He served as a Marine and the Army National Guard. He also worked for the Department of Defense and the US Post Office.

"I love what I do. I love what I do for a living," Mr. Fish told the board.

He has four grown children, and lives in Acushnet with his wife Carol. Mr. Fish should be able to start in a couple of weeks.

In another matter, Mr. Rees reviewed the report from HKT Architects, which studied town buildings and made recommendations for repairs and maintenance. The total cost of renovations is more than \$100 million. The firm created a prioritized list of nine projects for the town to plan on.

The number one recommendation was for a new public safety facility for the police and fire departments, Harbormaster, and a new animal shelter, estimated at \$40.6 million if constructed in 2021. The town does not own the 4.5 to 4.75 acres needed for the project, so the cost includes some money to buy land.

Mr. Rees told the board that he and the chiefs have a few sites in mind. but they need to send out a Request for Proposal (RFP) first.

Racial slur on fence prompts hate crimes investigation

Fairhaven police are investigating as a hate crime the vandalism on a fence on Castle Avenue, behind Fairhaven High School.

A racial slur was painted on the stockade fence in front of the home of a Cape Verdean family. "Kill a N___a" it reads, "Like a care package."

Lt. Kevin Kobza, Fairhaven Police Department spokesperson, said the incident is being investigated as a hate crime, which includes the required reporting to the appropriate agencies.

"To have such a disgusting display of horrible racism rear its ugly head within our community is as infuriating as it is hearbreaking," said Lt. Kobza. "This absolutely does not define who we are as a town, and it certainly is not reflective of who we

are as a people. Whoever is responsible for this atrocity will be charged to the fullest extent of the law."

He said there have been no other incidents of this nature in Fairhaven and the department is vigorously investigating it.

There was some graffiti vandalism to the high school on 11/30/18, but there were no racist overtones in that incident.

The resident had previously reported to police that her house had had eggs thrown at it on New Year's Day. Police do not know if the incidents are related.

In an update, just before press time, Lt. Kobza said that the ongoing investigation revealed that the sentence written on the fence is from a rap song, leading police to believe it may be more of a random act than a hate crime aimed at the family.

The area is at a dead end "paper street" that is used by the neighbors as a short cut.

"Due to these circumstances, and in speaking with the resident further, police believe that the act was random and that the graffiti was likely done by someone using the trail behind the victim's home," said Lt. Kobza in a press release.

Police are still investigating the incident as an act of vandalism and defacement of personal property.

"If further information is developed that indicates that a hate crime was indeed committed, the Department will pursue the case as such," reads the statement.

Vendors Wanted

The Huttleston Marketplace in Fairhaven, MA, will be starting its second season on Saturday, June 1, 2019, after a successful run last summer. Application forms for vendors are now available at a link shown below.

The marketplace, operated by the Fairhaven Office of Tourism, is held on Saturdays on the lawn of the Fairhaven Visitors Center, 141 Main Street at the intersection of Route 6, next to Fairhaven High School. In 2019 it will run from June 1 through September 14. The following Saturday, September 21, the seventh annual Harvest Fun Day will be held at the same location. Huttleston Marketplace vendors have the option of adding Harvest Fun Day to their schedule.

Categories for Huttleston Market-place vendors are: • arts, crafts, photography (crafts must be handmade) • local authors • antiques, vintage collectibles, used books • whole fresh farm produce, plants • prepared food (requires food vendor permit from BOH) • the Huttleston Marketplace does not accept representatives/consultants for commercially produced, direct sales products.

Vendors may sign up for single Saturdays of their choice at \$20 for an 11'x11' space. There is a nine-week discount rate of \$100 for any nine weeks, and a full season discount of \$150 for the 16-week season. (Plus another \$20 can be tacked on for Harvest Fun Day.)

Some vendors sign up for one or two Saturdays at the beginning of the season and then add on dates at \$20 each as the summer goes on. One does not need to choose all of the weeks at the beginning of the season.

The cost of the space is a donation to the Tourism Gift Account and that money is used to promote the market-place, purchase related supplies, and to hire local musicians to perform during the day.

Last season a total of 65 vendors participated during the course of the

season. Each Saturday there were about 30 to 35 booths set up. The majority of vendors are eager to return in 2019, and we expect the marketplace will grow in its second season.

The scholarship, to be presented for the first time in 2019 and annually thereafter, honors Enrique Goytizolo's dedication to preserving the history of the Town of Fairhaven and his vital and long-time leadership role with the Fairhaven Historical Society. The Fairhaven Historical Society is a 501C3 organization.

Deadline for scholarship applications is January 31, 2019.

In addition to the application, students must submit an essay of no more than 400 words focusing on Fairhaven history, what it means to the applicant, and how that has impacted the applicant's interest in the further study of history. Three references as specified on the application are also required.

Applications and essays must be submitted via email to historicalsocietyfairhaven@gmail.com. The scholarship award recipient will be notified via email on or before April 1, 2019.

Recognition of receipt of the scholarship will be made at graduation and at the Annual Fairhaven Historical Society Annual Meeting and Dinner in June. The one-time award of \$1000 will be presented to the recipient upon proof of successful completion of semester one classes.

A minimum of three hours of volunteer time at the Fairhaven Historical Society Museum or Fairhaven Historical Society events/activities within one year of scholarship award notification is required of each annual scholarship recipient.

DW White is apparent low bidder in bike path project

Press Release

The Massachusetts Department of Transportation (MassDOT) has announced that DW White is the apparent low bidder for its upcoming project to build a shared-use path in Mattapoisett. The path will accommodate bicyclists and pedestrians and will extend from Mattapoisett Neck Road to Depot Street.

The Mattapoisett Rail Trail connects to Fairhaven's Phoenix Bike Trail just east of Shaw Road at the Shaw Farm Trail.

This new path will be the next phase of the connection that currently exists heading west through Mattapoisett and Fairhaven, terminating at the Fairhaven/New Bedford Harbor. Bids from ten contractors for this project were opened on Tuesday, January 8, with the lowest bid from DW White being \$6,645,395.44. As per policy, MassDOT will now review the bid prior to issuing the Notice to Proceed for work.

"We are pleased to see this multimodal infrastructure project continuing to move forward," said Highway Administrator Jonathan Gulliver. "I would like to thank the stakeholders that have transformed this idea into a reality, such as the Town of Mattapoisett, the local elected officials, and the

Mattapoisett Bike Path Committee and their Friends Committee. We look forward to continuing to work together to this deliver important project."

Since 2015, the Baker-Polito Administration has constructed funded 150 miles of paved trails, adding to the current statewide inventory of 565 miles of paved trails. Over 30 miles of trails

spanning over a dozen projects were completed across the Commonwealth in 2018.

"I am excited to see the project reach another important milestone for a connected bike path through Mattapoisett; this next phase of construction is the culmination of years of planning work undertaken by community members and professionals many of whom have volunteered their time," said Representative Bill

Straus. "I want to thank Governor Baker for making the project a priority, and I want to offer special thanks to all of the local advocates and members of town meeting who continue to support the path."

In 2017, Governor Baker established an Interagency Trails Team which is led by the Governor's office and is comprised of staff from MassDOT, the Executive Office of Energy and Environmental Affairs and the Department Conservation and Recreation (DCR). The purpose of the team is to help develop a unified vision for a trails network and translate that into strategic investments, policy innovation to facilitate the development of trails, an enhanced relationship with municipal partners.

The Baker-Polito Administration in fall 2018 also announced MassTrails Program, an interagency initiative that will provide funding and resources to municipal and public entities in order to expand and connect networks of off-road, shareduse pathways and recreational trails for all users across Massachusetts.

The MassTrails Program will provide a total of approximately \$5 million in matching grants through the first round of funding in Fiscal Year 2020 and will also offer technical assistance and resources to individuals, municipalities, non-profits, and other public entities to design, construct, and maintain high-quality Massachusetts trails. The grant application for the MassTrails Program is now available and more information can now be found on the new public website: https://www. mass.gov/welcome-to-masstrails.

MassDOT's 5-year Investment Plan (CIP) sets aside \$180 million for multi-use pathways as well as \$60 million for high-priority projects through the statewide Pedestrian and Bicycle Plans that are currently being completed.

Anyone who has ever been diagnosed with cancer and their caregivers are encouraged to join the celebration. As the survivors walk, other participants will cheer them on in a demon-


stration of support and celebration. The survivor lap will be led by three lead survivors – Ana Costa, Lauren Andrade Hoey, and Giselle Velez.

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Fairhaven's new ladder truck is state of the art

Fairhaven's new ladder truck is a state-of-the art piece of equipment that the Fairhaven Fire Department helped to design. Fairhaven Fire Chief Timothy Francis and Deputy Fire Chief Todd Correia displayed the new vehicle outside Town Hall on Monday, 1/14, during the Selectboard meeting. Selectboard members, Town Administrator Mark Rees, and members of the public were able to take a good gander at the new truck and ask questions.

The new truck will consolidate two pieces, wrote Mr. Correia in an email: The heavy rescue which is 23 years old, and the old ladder which is 35 years old. The new truck is expected to last 25 years.

The ladder is 110 feet, the same as the old one, but the new ladder has the hose permanently fixed to it. This means that firefighters do not have to haul the hose up the ladder. It can also be turned on from below.

The new truck has a 20 kw generator and a "full cascade system," which means it can resupply air tanks for firefighters. It seats four firefighters and will also be used as the technical rescue vehicle.

"This vehicle will make us more efficient with our responses," wrote

Mr. Correia.

The truck contains all the current technology, including LEDs, battery operated equipment. In addition to the aerial ladder, it has eight other ladders from 10 feet to 35 feet long.

"All hose connections are interoperable with our neighboring communities, so the truck will adapt to other town equipment," wrote Mr. Correia.

Each firefighter has had at least 12–15 hours of initial training by the in house training lieutenant and the manufacturer. They will continue to train for the remainder of the year to obtain proficiency in the operations.

The truck took nine months to build, plus two months to customize it to the specifications of the town, including the use of Fairhaven blue on the ladder lights. It was designed by the Apparatus Study Committee, whose members include: Chairperson John Rogers (citizen member); Charlie Murphy, Selectboard member; Timothy Francis, Fire Chief; Todd Correia, Deputy Chief; Robert Lincoln, EMS/Training Lieutenant: Brian Messier. FD Lt.; Joshua Benoit, Firefighter Paramedic; G. Bourne Knowes, Lieutenant and Tree Warden; Todd Cox, Firefighter; Donn Fletcher, retired Deputy Fire Chief (citizen member).

Cost of the truck was just over



\$903K and \$21K+ on equipment, for a total of about \$925,000.

At the Selectboard meeting, the chief and deputy fire chief thanked the board and Town Meeting for supporting the project.

the projects done would be with debt exclusions, which means an override on the tax cap that Proposition 1 1/2 imposes on municipalities in Mass.

Costs are estimated based on the year a project would likely be done, since it is not feasible to do all the projects in one year. The firm provided the town with an escalated cost table out to 10 years

Second on the list was relocating he school administration offices to the old Tripp School, 56 Bridge Street, with renovations, and also using it for other high school needs, and possibly town offices. Work to the building includes gutting the interior, some structural and exterior work, and some HVAC work. Total is estimated at about \$7.4 million if the work is done in 2022.

Third on the list is the Senior Center and Recreation Center building, with recommendations for additions and renovations. Work at that site would include exterior maintenance that has been deferred, electrical and plumbing work. The recommendation also includes an additional 990 square feet of for the recreation side and some renovations to allow more office space. Total for those recommendations is about \$5.4 million in 2022.

Number four on the list is improving wheelchair accessibility in town hall, exterior renovations and mechanical and electrical upgrades totalling about \$383K if done in 2021.

Number five on the list is renovations to the LL Wood and East Fairhaven Elementary schools to correct accessibility issues and miscellaneous issues with the mechanical systems, totalling about \$2 million, but with state grants, the town's portion would be less, around \$1.16 million if done in 2022.

The BPW is six on the list, with a recommendation for a new vehicle storage building and interior renovations, at a cost of \$5.59 million if done in 2023.

Number seven on the list is

Hastings Middle School improvewhich ments, include roof replacement, demolishing the modular classroom, HVAC upgrades, other exterior and interior work. Cost is estimated at \$11.5 million if done in 2023, with 40% reimbursed by the state.

Fairhaven High School is eight on the list, with improvements to h e a t i n g , p l u m b i n g , electrical, and masonry work slated to be done in 2024 for \$25.5 million, but with

some reimbursement, about 40% from the state.

The Millicent Library made the high priorities list at number nine, for upgrades to the ventilation and air conditioning systems, electrical and plumbing. Cost of the project is estimated at \$2.4 million in 2024, with a variety of funding sources to take some of the sting out of it, leaving about \$1.2 million to come from the general fund.

The study also breaks out costs for renovating the animal shelter as a separate project, or demolishing the emergency management building on Sconticut Neck Road, and for renovating the School Administration building on Washington Street.

In another matter, the board was supposed to meet with Hatem El Rifai, the owner of Fairhaven Getty, to make changes to his license, but they did not meet with him. The board extended his temporary license until the next meeting, 1/28, to give him and the town time to work out some

differences, Mr. Rees told the board.

The motion passed, 2-1, with Chairperson Daniel Freitas voting against the extension. He said he visited the station's website and saw more cars for sale than the permit allows.

"So I don't know how serious he's taking this," said Mr. Freitas.

Selectboard member Charles Murphy said he believed some cars were at Mr. El Rifai's Wareham site.

But Mr. Freitas said he would hold off until he was sure.

In other business, Mr. Rees told the board that the Zoning Board of Appeals approved the modifications to the project at the Oxford School. The project has been downsized

The town also finalized the host community agreement with BASK, which is seeking to open a recreational marijuana facility in Fairhaven. The company already operates a medical marijuana dispensary in town. The recreational shop would be at the same location.

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Acushnet faces continuing repairs to water and sewer system

Woodard and Curran has completed Phase II of the inflow/infiltration study on Acushnet's water and sewer lines. The Selectboard heard from W&C's Carol Harris at its meeting on 1/8/19.

The I/I study identifies how much and where the town's water and sewer system is being infiltrated by ground water. The infiltration of ground water from rain and sump pumps costs the town money if the additional water goes through the sewer system; and pollutes local waterways and marshes if the pipes are draining into local waters.

Acushnet buys its water from New Bedford and has its sewer treated in New Bedford, so the less that goes in, the lower the costs to the town.

Ms. Harris told the board that Phase I was completed in 2016, and consisted of an assessment of the sewer system and further inspection of specific areas, including flow isolation, access hole inspections and inspections using cameras (CCTV).

Phase one assessed the flow in all 43,332 linear feet (LF) of sewer pipe; inspected with CCTV 10,068 LF of pipe; inspection of 34 of the 220 access holes.

Phase II, completed in 2018, included inspection of 49 access holes; another 8,202 of CCTV inspection of pipe.

Both phases of the study found a variety of defects that were corrected, saving the tow approximately \$23,600 for a six month period.

Future investigations will include identifying and reducing I/I and reducing operating costs; and inspecting an additional 8,500 LF of pipe and 45-50 access holes per year.

Department of Public Works Director Dan Menard told the board that the town still had a problem with residents pumping water from basements into the catch basins on the street.

Ms. Harris said that Mr. Menard had been very productive in fixing the problems that the studies found in the system. There is still significant work to do. Selectboard member Roger Cabral asked why the town could not allow residents to tie into a sewer main that runs to the schools. He said that when he was on the building committee, they decided to make sure the line could accommodate the extra homes tying in, but now he was being told that it was not possible.

Mr. Menard and another representative from W&C told Mr. Cabral that the problem was the kind of pumps that each home would require. They said the line could not handle it.

Another option would be to replace the town's pumping station in that area so residents could use traditional pumps.

The board and W&C representative discussed a variety of options.

Mr. Cabral asked if they could tie in at least some of the homes.

Some homes might be able to tie in with a gravity system, some might be able to use traditional pumps.

The board asked W&C to evaluate the line and the homes and advise them on the possibilities to try to give homeowners a chance to tie in.

The shelter's gift account is used for a variety of items for the shelter and the animals, including food and other daily needs.



International co. acquires Wing Lane solar project in Acushnet

Press Release

CVE North America, an independent renewable energy producer based in New York, has recently acquired a 650kW solar power plant in Acushnet, MA. The installation, Rockett Solar LLC, was built in 2017 on a site located on Wing Lane and has been producing clean electricity ever since.

The project will be the first solar installation owned and operated by CVE NA in the United States and will serve as their first community solar project providing solar credits and energy savings to local communities.

This acquisition represents an important step for CVE who recently applied for 36MW of projects under the Solar Massachusetts Renewable Target program (SMART) and has 30MW of projects in development in New York State.

solar installation deliver energy to the grid, subscribers receive solar credits that offset their electricity bill. Renters, people living in apartments, or in houses unsuitable for solar can contribute to the transition towards cleaner energy while saving money.

CVE's community solar offer will be available to local eligible electricity users in the first quarter of 2019.

"CVE is committed to delivering locally produced clean energy and making solar accessible to all communities. The Acushnet project is a first step to enter the community solar market, a fast-growing segment in the solar industry." Thibaut Delespaul, Vice President North America.

The closing represents the first phase of CVE's community solar efforts on Wing Lane in Acushnet. CVE is also under contract to develop an additional 3.5 megawatts of clean power across the street from this site.

CVE North America is the American subsidiary of the international independent renewable power producer CVE Group. CVE NA's core business is to develop, operate, maintain and own solar installations focusing in the states of New York and Massachusetts, while looking to expand to other Northeastern states. CVE currently has 10 projects in development in Massachusetts totaling 45 MW. Among those, 7 projects totaling 36MW were applied as community solar projects under the SMART program. CVE also has over 29 MW in development in New York state.

In addition, they have done fantastic work on Fairhaven High School, another of the Rogers buildings. The study begins this month.

In the meantime, this past year we have implemented several repairs to the roof and other areas that have had significant impact on the issues referred to in the letter. Several committees composed of our Church membership continue to work effectively to address the structural and repair needs of our cathedral.

Historic preservation is costly. The planning process is already underway for our capital campaign which we will launch in 2020. We welcome the financial support from the community. It really is an exciting time in our church as the membership moves forward with solutions to our challenges.

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Royal employee charged with taking nude photos of residents

An employee of The Royal of Fairhaven Nursing Center, a long term care facility that also has beds for short term rehabilitation, has been accused by police of taking photos of two residents and posting them to Snapchat: a man who was nude from the waist down, and a woman who had soiled herself.

Snapchat is a social media platform favored because posts are deleted after they are reviewed by the intended recipients. However, recipients are able to view posts more than once, before posts are deleted. The platform also saves posts on its server for up to 30 days, depending on how they were posted.

According to court records, Deeshawn Venegas, 27, of 4 Penniman Street, New Bedford, was an employee at the Royal and allegedly took a video of a male rehab patient who was walking in the hall with no pants or underwear on. A racial slur.

"N__a" was superimposed on the video.

According to court records, Ms. Venegas also allegedly posted a video of woman who had soiled herself, and whose hand was covered in feces from trying to clean herself. The word "Heated" was superimposed on that video. The audio of that video said, "Ah geez, I'm really not about to f___g do this right now bro! What the hooo!"

The resident had an "elder emoji face" superimposed over her face, according to court records.

A recipient of the Snapchat posts informed the Royal of the videos and said they had been posted on 10/22/18. The woman told officials she was Ms. Venegas's cousin.

According to court records, the facility and the police obtained a copy of both videos.

According to court records, Ms. Venegas was fired, along with Zuleika Lobo, another employee who knew about at least one of the videos and

did not report it.

Ms. Venegas did not appear in court on 12/4/18 as ordered. A default warrant was issued on 12/5, she was arrested on 12/18, and appeared in court on 12/19/18. It is unclear if she was in custody overnight.

Ms. Venegas was charged under Mass. General Laws Chapter 272, Section 105. The charge is for photographing a person who is nude or partially nude when that person has a reasonable expectation of privacy, and for disseminating the image. She faces up to 1 1/2 years in the house of correction and/or a fine of up to \$5,000.

She was released on \$1,000 bail, with \$500 paid in cash, and ordered not to have any contact with the elderly in an nursing home setting. She is due in court on 1/17 for a pretrial hearing.

Court records indicate that the facility immediately notified police and took action against the two employees.

Mail-in voter registration forms are available at both Town Clerk's Offices, the Millicent Library in Fairhaven, and state and federal offices throughout Massachusetts. You may also register to vote online at https://www.sec.state.ma.us/ovr/

After picking up nomination papers at the Town Clerk's office, candidates must gather the proper number of signatures to appear on the ballot. In Fairhaven, to vote at Town Meeting, you must be a member. You must get nomination

papers and gather 10 certified signatures from YOUR precinct only.

Acushnet has an open Town Meeting, where any registered voter can vote.

For Townwide Offices

In Fairhaven papers for townwide office require 50 certified signatures.

In Acushnet, papers for townwide office require 43 certified signatures.


