

Selectboard discusses Town Meeting articles

At its meeting on Monday, 4/8, the Fairhaven Selectboard discussed the upcoming Annual and Special Town Meetings on May 4th, and made their recommendations for articles.

The board chose to adopt quite a few articles including Article 4 for the Sewer Capital Fee and Article 5 to amend fiscal year 2019 budget to accommodate for temp work, police and fire department overtime, as well as gas for their vehicles.

The board also supported Article 8 to accommodate funding for HVAC systems at the high school and the senior and recreation center.

The board also adopted Article 10 to transfer money for the sewer treatment plant upgrade to the West Island Treatment Plant.

The Selectboard had a discussion and some disagreement regarding Article 12, which states the need for an increase in salaries and stipends for elected town officals such as the three Selectboard members, Town Clerk, Moderator, Tree Warden, and the Board of Health members.

Board member Robert Espindola

immediately disagreed with the article stating he did not believe an increase in salary for the Selectboard members was necessary.

Board member Daniel Freitas said that he was the one that talked to Town Administrator Mark Rees about increasing the salary. Mr. Freitas explained that they, as Selectboard members, pay for a lot of things out of pocket. Mr. Freitas also said that the yearly stipend for the Selectboard of \$5200 has not been increased in 30 years.*

He said being on the Selectboard is more than a part-time job, it is being on the phone, answering emails, and visiting people's homes all the time.

Mr. Freitas said going from \$5200 a year to \$7500 a year is not asking for too much.

Chairperson Charles Murphy agreed with the increase.

Mr. Espindola explained that no matter what it is, it will be less than minimum wage, and the money is not the reason he is on the board. He said the board makes around the average salary already.

The Selectboard unanimously agreed to adopt the article for the

increase in pay for all the town officers except the Selectboard.

The board approved that one on a 2-1 vote, with Mr. Espindola opposed.

The Selectboard than discussed and voted on articles for the Special Town Meeting, also on 5/4.

The first four articles will create a budget and enterprise funds for the three public access TV stations (PEG): Public/Community Access channel 95, Education channel 9, and Government channel 18. The funding will still come from the same surcharge on Comcast cable bills, but now specific budgets must be created for each channel, with the money coming from the enterprise funds.

The Selectboard also approved Article 5 to allocate \$32,000 for engineering, architecture, and services for the treatment plant.

The board also discussed Mr. Espindola's article requiring that all town meetings be televised or recorded. He said that it was important that town officials and committees be transparent with the public.

Come enjoy the Lloyd Center property and its diverse bird life. Forest songbirds, shorebirds, raptors including the osprey and owls, and waterfowl are all potentially seen on these walks (series of three). For each walk participants will traverse a variety of habitats including maritime forest, freshwater wetlands including vernal pools and a kettle pond, salt marshes and estuaries, and a bird feeding station. These habitats support the high avian diversity present on the property. Attend each walk to see changes in number and variety of species occurring over a short timeframe.

On this walk, songbirds are arriving as the forest slowly springs to life. Shorebird migration is well underway with nesting birds having arrived, waterfowl which wintered over are still abundant, and first ospreys are arriving, making the estuary particularly lively during this walk. Keep your eyes peeled for the Lloyd Center's resident barred and great horned owls, which may have young!

Participants should wear footwear for light trail walking and bring binoculars and a bird guide if they have them.

New Nonfiction Release from Cape Cod Author: *Deep Sea Dominoes* by Richard Hughes ISBN# 978-1-64438-623-1. A Waquoit author, Richard Hughes, has written a nonfiction book entitled Deep Sea Dominoes. From the sinkings of the El Faro and Andrea Doria and dozens of other modern maritime casualties, vague explanations of "human error" have been given as the real causes. *Deep* Sea Dominoes challenges that widespread contention and makes a strong case that ship conditions, too tight scheduling, and the decisions of many others, safely ashore, may be the true culprits. A common mixture of greed, hubris, and miscalculation — falsely leveled at the officers and crews alone - could be the primary reasons for many if not most maritime disasters.

The decline of the safety professionals in American management; the concern of new, highly indulged Generation Z mariners entering the profession; and ship end-of-life working conditions are also explored.

4 cloves garlic, sliced 2 tbsps fresh rosemary salt to tast ground black pepper to taste 5 pound leg of lamb

Mr. Rees began discussion on an article that would prevent part-time elected officials from utilizing the town's health insurance. The Town Administrator and Town Clerk will continue to be eligible for health insurance because they are full time.

Mr. Rees explained that currently the Selectboard decides who receives health insurance. He said the article would remove health insurance for elected officials, except the Town Clerk, as well as people who currently are utilizing the health insurance who will be grandfathered in.

Currently, Selectboard members, Moderator, Board of Health members and Tree Warden can also utilize town employee health insurance.

The article also removes the authority and responsibility of the Selectboard to choose who gets health insurance. Under the article the Selectboard would no longer make those decisions.

Mr. Freitas said that he did not like the Selectboard's authority getting taken away from them, and that he did not agree with decisions being

taken away from the Selectboard.

Mr. Espindola agreed and explained that it was a lot of new information. He said that he thought they

needed more time to think about it.

Mr. Rees noted that there is not much time left.

Mr. Freitas said that during the election many residents stated they do not want any more authority taken away from the Selectboard.

What if, 10 years down the road, they want health insurance back, he asked, and the board will not have the authority to make that decision.

Mr. Freitas said that he did support the policy of removing the health insurance, but not the Selectboard losing authority.

Mr. Rees said that the board can discuss creating a different policy.

Mr. Murphy suggested they come up with a new policy before Town Meeting.

The board decided not to vote on the article.

All articles must be approved by Town Meeting members in order to be enacted. The warrants are available at https://www.fairhavenma.gov/board-selectmen and choose "Town Meeting Warrant Archives."





This racket entails prolonged periods of shrill electronic buzzing and beeping, frequent baritone wails that crescendo and and occasional decrescendo. rhythmic bell ringing.

I know it gets annoying at times. I feel it too after he's made a few of his rounds that take him around the park and down Bridge Street. But then again, I've gotten so used to it that often I don't even hear it anymore, and hopefully you find that happening for you, as well.

Many of the good people of this

town know my son Diego, who is now a freshman at FHS and very visible in the community, whether he's riding to the fort with his mate Scott running behind him (sometimes with our two dogs, sometimes without). standing in front of our Route 6 house pumping his arm hoping for you to beep your horn, or marching with the FHS Band playing the bells during football games and parades. A lot of you are aware that Diego is Autistic and that his experience in our community is unique to him. Many know him as a delightful, friendly, polite young person and have come to accept that he too has a place in this community. Some of you have even come to appreciate him.

As Diego rides past your house, past you walking your dog in the park, or crossing in front of your vehicle in the crosswalk, his imagination is fully engaged in the moment as he pretends he is a train engineer and his scooter or bike is his train. It's his favorite thing to do.

It being Autism Awareness Month, I know my neighbors and those who live along the route he takes to the

fort and back are definitely aware of Diego. And most have progressed to the level of acceptance. I can only hope that all of us together can reach the next level — appreciation — for the joy that Diego experiences out there doing what he loves, and perhaps even the joy that he brings to the ones who see him out enjoying uninhibited happiness while unabashedly just being himself without fear of being judged by others. I think that's something to be admired, something we all wish we had inside us — the freedom to be who we are. to do what makes us happy, to make a little noise in the world.

I do hope that you can view Diego through that lens of appreciation as I do, or at least with eyes (or ears, rather) of acceptance when you hear him. And if you see him, I hope you'll wave at the engineer as he whizzes by whistling his train horn at you as a way of saying hello, or, "Watch out, 'cause here I come!"
