Homecoming Day Fair is so much more than that

Press Release

The setting is small town New England, and that ambience brings to mind the street fairs of our childhoods: hot and sunny, with people everywhere and all kinds of action, all of it seemingly going on at the same time.

The Fairhaven Homecoming Day Fair will be held on Center Street in Fairhaven on Saturday, June 29, 2019, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Admission is free, and only heavy rain cancels.

Now in its 43rd year, the annual fair has established itself as a popular summer kickoff event, attracting thousands of locals and visitors from all over southeastern Massachusetts, the Cape and beyond. It's as much a regional event as a local one.

"Its appeal is its variety," says Barbara Acksen, chair of the Homecoming Day Fair Committee for the Fairhaven Improvement Association, which sponsors the fair. "We strive to keep the children mesmerized, and the adults intrigued."

The tree-lined streets around the center of Fairhaven are repurposed as fairgrounds for the day. The town

hall, the Millicent Library and the Unitarian Church — all beautiful examples of outstanding architecture built in the late nineteenth century by the town's benefactor Henry Huttleston Rogers — act as both backdrops and participants in the activities. The town hall serves as the center of all the activity and the stage for the live entertainment. Every fair features a new cast of young musicians and dancers, local bands and solo performers.

"Kids' games are held on the lawn, and family members of all ages can go for rides on a full-sized antique fire engine," Acksen says.

On fair day the streets are lined with vendors' booths, some 175 of them attending from all over New England and covering a spectrum of interests. Every year it's a mix of old favorites and new vendors.

By the 10 a.m. start time, the locals are keeping one eye on the latest vendor offerings, the other scanning faces for old friends and acquaintances, because they're very likely to be there.

Out-of-towners come because

they've heard about the ambience. Or the action. Or the food.

"The food is its own reason to attend," says Sheryl Aguiar, a member of the fair committee.

In 2018 a quick count identified more than 26 food vendors at work.

"Some of them are local nonprofit organizations for which the event is a productive fundraiser," Acksen says.

Specialty dishes are the order of the day.

"I always plan to get there in time to get a cacoila sandwich from the North Fairhaven Improvement Association booth," says one regular fairgoer. "There's always a line, and they sell out fast."

Other popular dishes include the Whitfield-Manjiro Friendship Society's Japanese Yakisoba noodles, and the East Fairhaven Improvement Association's fresh and robust strawberry shortcakes. Wild Game Sausage Man offers a unique menu of gourmet wild game sausages, gator bites, fried Oreos and more, and he's an entertaining personality to boot. And Poppin Mad Kettle Corn is regularly

Rasputin's gets probation; Tim Cox gets award

The Fairhaven Selectboard closed its hearing on Rasputin's Tavern at its meeting on Monday, 6/3, setting a probationary period to September 9. The vote was 2-1, with Selectboard chairperson Charles K. Murphy, Sr., voting "no" because, he explained in a follow-up phone interview, that he wanted to keep the hearing open.

The final vote keeps in place the added security measures required from the last hearing date; imposed an eight-day suspension of license that was stayed until 9/9/19, subject to no additional violations occurring; and imposes a one-hour suspension of the license to be imposed in one-hour intervals each day from 1-2 a.m. Essentially, that means the bar now closes at 1 a.m., instead of 2 a.m., from now until September 9. If no more violations occur, then the bar will be allowed to go back to its 2 a.m. closing time.

Mr. Murphy's suggestion was actually harsher, he said than what was voted on, but his objection was closing the public hearing.

In September, if all goes well from

now until then, the bar will probably ask for the additional security measures to be lifted, since they are costly to implement.

Also during the meeting, Fairhaven Harbormaster Timothy Cox received the Shellfish Constable of the Year award from the Mass. Shellfish Officers Association.

Mr. Cox was cited for his "outstanding work ethic" and his dedication to shellfisheries in Fairhaven. He was instrumental in creating a new public safety marina at Union Wharf, built an upweller to grown quahogs from seed, and made an oyster reef in Little Bay.

"Mr. Cox is well respected among

his peers in the community for this work as Harbormaster as well as his many volunteer efforts," said the association in a press release.

The association has given the award for more than 20 years to shellfish constables who show "great initiative and hard work for their local shellfisheries."

Mr. Cox has been shellfish warden since 2007, and Harbormaster/Shellfish Warden since 2009. ●●●

Officials simulate emergency at New Bedford airport



During a training exercise on 5/30/19 at New Bedford Regional Airport, emergency officials, including police and fire departments from around the region, simulated the crash of an ERJ145 type plane. They used two SRTA buses as the plane's fuselage, and 40 students from New Bedford Vocational's Legal and Protective Services class simulated victims. It was the first drill of this type in 25 years. The airport is upgrading its status from a General Aviation Airport to a 139 Commercial Airport which requires this type of exercise once every three years. Christine M. David, PA-C, 64 years old, died on June 1 after a short but courageous and stubborn battle with cancer. Born in New Bedford, she lived in Fairhaven for most of her adult life after a childhood spending time at the same beach house she made her home. A Physician's Assistant by trade, she also spent many years teaching English as a Second Language (ESL) to adults, GED and Skills Upgrading at Bristol Community College in Fall River and New Bedford.

She was a graduate of Bishop Stang High School and Southeastern Mass. University (currently UMassD). She furthered her studies later in life, graduating from the Massachusetts College of Pharmacy and Allied Health Sciences with a BS in Health Sciences and a Master of Science in Physician Assistant Studies with honors.

Known in the neighborhood for wearing her bright yellow jacket as she walked her beloved dog Charlie on the beach near her house, Chris will be remembered as a fun-loving person who enjoyed hanging out on the beach with friends and family, cookouts, hanging around the bonfire, riding her motorcycle, and telling a good story. She adored her niece and nephews, and loved her many cousins.

Her niece and nephews fondly remember camping out in the yard, just to be scared by Auntie Chrissy. Her friends and relatives will miss her presence around the bonfire, blasting the oldies out on the deck, and singing to the stars.

She loved summer more than anything else, sunrises over the beach, sunsets over the marsh, her



Lebanese heritage, and her niece and nephews. She took special pride in taking care of the elderly at her different assignments as a PA, and long before that with friends and relatives.

Even as a young child she had a zest for life and a love of animals. She spent countless hours with the neighborhood kids searching for pollywogs, training her homing pigeons, teaching her younger siblings how to ride a bike and drive a car. She learned to drive in a ten-dollar car in the back field in the old neighborhood, and she was known as one of the kids racing horses along the runway at the airport, until they put up the fence.

She was a communicant of Our Lady of Purgatory Maronite Catholic Church of New Bedford. She is survived by her mother, Octavia (Peters) David; four siblings, Elizabeth David, Catherine David Thomas and her husband Matthew,

Anthony David and his wife Marcelle, Marie and her husband George Borges; her niece Victoria Thomas; and three nephews, Samuel Thomas, David Thomas, and Thomas David. She was the daughter of the late Thomas N. M. David.



referenced in post-fair recaps.

If that's not enough variety, hungry visitors can also find lobster rolls, tacos and burritos, bratwurst with sauerkraut, cotton candy, salads, burgers and dawgs and more.

At the fair, dozens of artisans show their wares, ranging from clothing, jewelry, carvings and soaps to nautically-themed accessories. A few of the vendors who have displayed and sold items at the fair are Chinawear by Karen J's handmade jewelry created from vintage dinnerware, Days Gone By Wind Chimes' vintage spoon and teapot wind chimes, sundresses by Sew Hooked, and Dockside Candles' clean-burning soy-blend candles. The Gateway Woodturners Club has offered a multitude of items crafted from various types of wood, as has Silvershell Musical Instruments with its harps, lyres, dulcimers and guitars.

Beyond the streets, the Unitarian Church is also a hotbed of activity at the Homecoming Day Fair. The west lawn of the church serves as the venue for the improvement associa-

tion's juried art show and the work of local artists.

Visitors can also take a tour of the church, and there's a used book sale going on throughout the day.

The Millicent Library also attracts its share of fairgoers, either newcomers wanting to see what's behind the dignified facade, or returnees recalling their escapades in the three stories of odd niches and book stacks.

"Older visitors still inquire about a display of stuffed squirrels dressed as musicians. Unfortunately, they're long gone," notes library director Carolyn Longworth with a laugh.

Over the years the Homecoming Day Fair has evolved into the core event of a busy Fairhaven weekend, which usually includes reunions for generations of Fairhaven High School grads.

On Friday and Saturday of Homecoming Weekend, free tours of Fairhaven High School will be led by Bob Foster, president of the Fairhaven High School Alumni Association. The Saturday tours start at 10 a.m. and at

noon.

On Sunday there's a car show at Cushman Park, a \$10 All-Class Breakfast Buffet at the high school, and a Hall of Fame banquet recognizing the high school's best sports teams and stars over the years, many of them coming from out of state to attend.

Be warned, street parking in the center of Fairhaven fills up very quickly on fair day, and it can be tough to maneuver through the parked cars on the narrow streets. Visitors can park at the Fairhaven High School on Route 6 and take the short shuttle ride to the fair (and visitors parking in the center of town can take the shuttle to the high school for the tours there). Free handicapped parking is available.



Hodgson's jail acts as detention camp

On February 8, 2017 and with a stroke of his pen, Sheriff Thomas Hodgson made the Bristol County House of Correction one of the first county jails in New England to have the authority to detain inmates for immigration violations under the U.S. Immigration and Nationality Act section 287 (g).

Under the agreement, section 287 (g) deputizes Bristol County Sheriff's Office (BCSO) employees as deportation agents allowing them to:

- Interview individuals to determine their immigration status;
- Search for and enter data into Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) database;
- Issue ICE detainers (or "immigration holds"), which allow the sheriff to hold a person for up to 48 hours for ICE to pick up and transfer to a detention camp, even if the charges are dropped and;
- The BCSO acts as a detention camp holding immigrants from across the country.

A review of Sheriff Hodgson's Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) reveals failings related to compliance and oversight. Four major failings include:

First, people of color — whether U.S. citizens, immigrants, or undocumented — are subjected to racial profiling, discrimination, and civil rights violations. There are a number of provisions in the MOAs for which there appears to be a lack of compliance; most notable is the requirement that 287(g) programs offer a complaint mechanism for individuals who believe they have been aggrieved in the implementation of

the program, and community oversight appears to be ignored.

Second, the sheriff is only a sheriff, a person elected to manage a jail. ICE has not established adequate oversight of State and local law enforcement agencies that are the delegated authority to enforce Federal immigration laws — and not the sheriff. The terms of oversight appear to be unnecessarily vague and confusing, and without requisite standards, measures of accountability or adequate protection for the rights of persons present in the United States.

Third, lack of notice and information about the right to file a complaint. There are no clear guidelines in the sheriff's MOA that allocate responsibility for determining the circumstances under which a complaint will be forwarded to Department of Homeland Security, Office of the Inspector General and Department of Justice. The MOA provides no direction for individual or supervisory responsibility for any part of the process, nor does it set forth a means to track the process of the complaint, as there appear to be no checks in place to ensure resolution of complaints.

Finally, the 287 (g) program is too costly for Bristol County taxpayers, let me explain.

According to the Memorandum of Agreement (MOA), Bristol County taxpayers are the ones footing the bill for BCSO personnel to receive ICE training, as well as, the "overtime" pay for those personnel performing the duties of regular employees who are away receiving that specialized training.

The MOA states, "The BCSO is responsible for personnel expenses,

including, but not limited to, salaries and benefits, local transportation, and official issue material...including overtime, of all of its personnel being trained or performing duties under this MOA and of those personnel performing the regular functions of the participating BCSO personnel while they are receiving training."

Also, taxpayers in Bristol County are on the hook "for covering all expenses at the BCSO facility regarding cabling and power upgrades...the BCSO will be responsible for covering any installation and recurring costs associated with the BCSO line...for providing all administrative supplies, such as paper, toner, pens, pencils, or other similar items necessary for normal office operations...for providing the necessary security equipment, such as handcuffs, leg restraints and flexi cuffs, etc." The entire BCSO MOA can be accessed at: <https://www.ice.gov/doclib/287gMOA/287gBristolMa2017-02-08.pdf>

Interpreter services are another taxpayer burden. According the MOA, the BCSO will provide ICE detainees "with limited English language proficiency...an interpreter. Qualified foreign language interpreters...means an interpreter who can interpret effectively, accurately, and impartially, using any specialized vocabulary." Average hourly rates for interpreters range from \$30-\$80 per hour depending on the type and location of the work. Sheriff Hodgson shows no respect for hardworking taxpayers.

With no sound, effective and rational leadership at the Bristol County Sheriff's Office, legislative oversight at the State House is highly recommended.
