

Shark cam reveals secret lives of Basking sharks in UK

Press Release

An autonomous underwater vehicle (AUV) known as the REMUS SharkCam has been used in the UK for the first time to observe the behavior of basking sharks in the Inner Hebrides. off the west coast of Scotland.

The groundbreaking technology, designed and built bv Oceanographic Systems Laboratory Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution (WHOI), is set to reveal the secret lives of the world's second largest fish — a species that little is known about, despite being prevalent in the region's waters.

The research team, which included colleagues from the University of Exeter, World Wildlife Fund (WWF), Sky Ocean Rescue, Scottish Natural Heritage (SNH), hope the stunning images captured by the AUV will strengthen the case for creating the world's first protected area for basking sharks in this part of the sea.

The team used SharkCam to track sharks once they were tagged and disappeared beneath the water's surface. The robot collects wideangle, high definition video of their

behaviour from a distance, as well as high quality oceanographic data, such as ocean temperature, salinity, productivity biological bathymetry, which shows how far the sharks are off the bottom of the

Initial footage from the innovative SharkCam deployed off the coast of Coll and Tiree last month shows the sharks moving through the water column, potentially searching for food, feeding near the surface and swimming close to the seafloor.

It is hoped that further analysis of the many hours of video footage from the AUV, as well as visuals from towed camera tags attached to the sharks and the deployment of advanced sonar imaging, will uncover even more about the underwater behavior, social interactions, group behavior and courtship of the elusive species.

Fieldwork for the project took place in July in the proposed Sea of the Hebrides Marine Protected Area (MPA) - one of four possible MPAs currently under consultation by the Scottish Government. MPAs are specially designated and managed to

protect marine ecosystems, habitats and species, which can help restore the area for people and wildlife.

The area is one of only a few worldwide where large numbers of basking sharks are found feeding in the surface waters each year. It is suspected that basking sharks may even breed in Scotland — an event that has never before been captured on film.



1 lemon, juiced

2 tablespoons hot pepper sauce

3 cloves garlic, minced

1 tablespoon tomato paste

1 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon ground black pepper

2 pounds large shrimp, peeled & deveined with tails attached Skewers

Preheat grill for medium-low heat. Thread shrimp onto skewers, piercing once near the tail and once near the head. Discard marinade.

Lightly oil grill grate. Cook shrimp for 5 minutes per side, or until opaque, basting frequently with reserved marinade.

Fhvn EEE threat upgraded to "high risk"

The Massachusetts Department of Public Health (MDPH) announced on August 2 that EEE virus has been detected in mosquitoes collected from Fairhaven, Massachusetts. They Have updated our status to HIGH RISK. The Fairhaven board of Health is requiring a restriction of all outdoor activities from dusk till dawn until further notice. Please take note of precautionary information below to reduce the risks to humans and animals.

EEE is a rare but serious illness spread by the bite of an infected mosquito. While EEE can infect people of all ages, people under15 years of age or over 50 years of age are at greatest risk for serious illness.

By taking a few, common-sense precautions, people can help to protect themselves and their loved ones:

Avoid Mosquito Bites

Be Aware of Peak Mosquito Hours
 The hours from dusk to dawn are peak biting times for many

mosquitoes.

- Clothing Can Help reduce mosquito bites. Wear long sleeves if possible.
- Apply Insect Repellent when you go outdoors.

Mosquito-Proof Your Home

- Drain Standing Water
- Install or Repair Screens.
- Protect your animals.

While the Fairhaven Board of Health continues to work closely with the MDPH and other agencies, locally we are asking residents to check their property for standing water sources, dress properly and use insect repellent. Acushnet looks to familiar names for interim TA

With the announced departure of Town Administrator Brian Noble at the end of August, the Acushnet Selectboard at their Tuesday, 8/6, meeting discussed how to proceed with an interim TA and whether or not to create a screening committee.

Kevin Paicos, who served as interim TA three years ago, attended meeting and offered assistance and resources to the Selectboard.

Mr. Paicos has 42 years' experience as a Town Administrator and had a discussion with the Selectboard on creating screening committee. He said he would be available as s resource if they chose that route.

Mr. Paicos stated he would make himself available to the town to assist recruiting Town a new Administrator at the cost of \$4,000-\$5.000 or as the Selectboard saw fit. He said that currently there are five Town Administrator jobs across the state that he is aware of and there are candidates, making the process highly competitive.

Mr. Paicos explained the process of having a screening committee made up of members of the community and have them narrow down the applicants. He said when the final candidates were chosen to be interviewed by the Selectboard, the process would become public, but until then, with a screening committee, the process would not be open to the public.

Chairperson Roger Cabral stated there had been a few discussions with an interim Town Administrator being chosen from a couple of current Town Employees. He said he believed Julie Hebert, the town's Director of Finance, would be an excellent choice for the interim TA. Mr. Cabral also noted that Fire Chief Kevin Gallagher would also be an excellent choice.

Selectboard member Desroches stated that he would like to think about it for another week and discuss with the two possible inhouse personnel regarding the position.

Selectboard member Kevin Gaspar stated he did not feel that the discussion to contract the interim

Town Administrator should be a discussion for open session, but felt that it should be in executive session.

Mr. Noble advised the board that the decision of choosing an interim Town Administrator has to be done in open session; the salary discussion can be in executive session.

The Selectboard decided to hold an open meeting on Friday, August 9, 2019 at 8:00 a.m. to finalize their decision on an Interim TA, and then would move to an immediate executive session to negotiate a contract with the chosen individual.

The Board also agreed to come up with three community leaders to be asked to be on a screening committee to choose the finalist for the next Town Administrator.

Mr. Noble's last day is 8/29.

In other business, the Selectboard agreed on the ten surrounding communities to use to gather data for their comparison communities discussion regarding the wage and classification study. The study is reviewing all town positions to classify them and bring salaries up

Day Tripping: Newport, Rhode Island

The original destination was Block Island. But when

Friday afternoon rolled around, my friend Tori and I had only decided that we wanted to leave from Newport because it's a shorter ferry ride than Fall River. We still needed to research ferry times, places to visit, etc. So, we just decided to make our destination Newport.

Good choice it turns out.

We knew we wanted to go to the Cliff Walk, but neither one of us was up for a real hike, climbing on rocks, or anything close to that. It was a hot Saturday in August, so strenuous hiking was out of the question. No problem, though, the Cliff Walk has a fantastic stretch of paved walkway that is easy for any ability, and is wheelchair accessible.

We started our day at the very impressive "Gateway" Transportation and Visitors Center. There, you can sign up for cruises and tours of all kinds. Brochures are everywhere and the people are very helpful. There is also some tourist-y wear to buy there.

Be sure to get your parking discounted while you're at the

counter. We though we were getting two dollars off, but it turns out we parked for two dollars for the whole day, instead of \$24.50. Either way, it was worth it to leave the care there and use the trolley, which is \$2 each time you get on. They take cash, paper or coin, and cards.

A very helpful, albeit somewhat impatient, man at the round desk was quick to point out that it was a Saturday in August, so the harbor cruises were mostly sold out. We managed to get booked on the Rum Rummer II for 3:30, at a different counter in the same room.

He neglected, however, to tell us that the trolley we saw out there did, indeed go to the Cliff Walk. We were about to drive there when I decided to ask the driver. The trolley does a great loop around the city and all the usual stops, including the mansions, six stops along the Cliff Walk, shopping plazas, and waterfront. Three trolleys are on a 20-minute loop all day, so you never have to wait long.

We picked up the Cliff Walk at the beginning, at Memorial Boulevard. It was a few blocks to walk from where the trolley dropped us off on Bellevue Avenue, but worth it to start at the beginning. A beautiful public beach is right at the bottom of the hill.

It's worth the trip just to get that far and use that beach all day.

But, we were on a mission.

We followed the Cliff Walk for probably about a mile. It's a 3.5 mile walk all told. We stopped at the other side of Regina Salve University, Shepard Avenue. At that point the terrain was about to change anyway and we were not about to get brave. We were too hot, and hungry, too.

Most of the section we did was wheelchair accessible, but then some steps would pop up. You can visit the

website or ask at the visitors center for which sections are accessible.

It was a busy place, but not too crowded. At Forty Steps, we could get close to the water, and a few people went in.


We took tons of pictures. The water crashing against the cliffs, the birds, boats, butterflies and just the expanse of the ocean on a hot August day were spectacular to take in.

Some homes abut the path, and the imagination gets easily stoked seeing the gated pathways lined with shrubs and flowers we did not know the names of.

For those of you who visited the Cliff Walk a long time ago, be sure to visit it again. It has undergone substantial restoration that ended in 2006. It is a National Recreation Trail in a National Historic District. There is a rest room just before Salve at Narragansett Avenue, available seasonally.

After walking for a couple of hours (we stop a lot to take pictures), we

grabbed the trolley and went back to the International Tennis Hall of Fame stop, which is near the corner that we got dropped off at the beginning. We didn't go into the HoF, but we poked our heads in and were surprised to see people playing tennis on grass. We'll have to add that one to our list

We opted for a little diner named "Annie's" on Bellevue Avenue instead of the fancy expensive place. Not that we have anything against fancy, expensive places when we're in Newport. It's just that the other places didn't really appeal to us, but Annie's kind of jumped out and Tori said, "This is our kind of place."

I got the Annie Burger, and Tori got the fried shrimp. The food was good and tasty, and priced right, too. The whole meal cost around \$35 with tip (okay, I lost the slip).

It's a funky little place, too, with wooden booths and wooden shelves, and old pictures on the wall. Definitely has not caught up to ADA standards, though. If you have mobility issues, you'll have trouble in the restroom.

The staff was friendly, though, the food was good, solid fare. They did, however, overcook my burger, but... I expected that. It's hard to find a place that will do rare these days.

At that point it was getting close to 2 p.m. Our harbor cruise was at 3:30.

We decided we did not have enough time to take the Ocean Drive "Ten Mile Drive" before the cruise, so we went back to the car, via trolley.

We cooled off in the car, rehydrated, made another trip to the visitors center, then walked to Bannister's Wharf, where the boat was docked.

We had wanted to use the Newport Harbor Shuttle, which does a 55-minute harbor loop with six stops. It's \$12 to hop on, hop off all day (\$6 for

children). Unfortunately, the shuttle was only taking people to the jazz festival. So, not only did we pick a Saturday in August, we picked jazz festival weekend, too.

We were a little early, even though they like you there at least 20 minutes before departure time. They gave us a blue ticket, to get us on the boat, so we realized the other ticket was more of a fake ticket, holding our seats, I guess.

We explored the shops while we waited to board, and found a Ben & Jerry's...just what the doctor ordered. No need to expound on the ice cream, it was Ben & Jerry's. I did notice a little place called "Sprinkles" that also had ice cream. I probably would've gone there, but we noticed it too late. The shops are a mix of the usual tourist fare, but some with a definite nautical, Newport feel, like Sea Bags, which uses donated sails to make tote bags and other items.

The 58-foot wooden Rum Runner II is truly the "real deal," said Captain Jay.

Using the head (aka the toilet, for you landlubbers) is a bit of an ordeal. You have to close the lid, and give 8–10 "steady pulls using the FULL movement of the pump handle; pause for five seconds, then continue pumping" 5–6 more times, according

(or down as the case may be), to comparable rates in comparable communities. The board has been squabbling about what constitutes a comparable community.

The ten communities that were agreed to were: Carver, Dighton, Halifax, Freetown, Hanson, Blackstone, Douglas, Fairhaven, Lakeville and Whitman.

Mr. Noble said he will begin to gather the data.

In other business, Heather Sylvia, the Director of the Council on Aging was present to ask for an exception to the most recently adopted Nepotism Policy for a van driver for the Council on Aging that was the husband of the receptionist. Ms. Sylvia stated that there were not a lot of people who applied for the position as it only works approximately five hours a week.

She said the person to receive the position is already a volunteer and familiar with the members who attend the council on aging. The Selectboard moved to exempt the hiree from the Nepotism Policy.

to the sign.

It was built in 1929 to smuggle alcohol for New Jersey mobsters. Several famous people owned Elco classic motor yachts, including John F. Kennedy and Czar Nicholas II.

Now, it motors around the harbor while Capt. Jay and his first mate Sarah tell stories of the harbor, including Jackie (Bouvier) Kennedy Onassis's childhood home; smugglers cove that the US Coast Guard finally built a station inside of (to stop smuggling or to get the first delivery? asks Capt. Jay); clingstone, named as such because a house once owned by the founders of the Wharton Business School clung to the stone and did not end up destroyed in a Hurricane; and, of course, a couple of lighthouses, including one that was staffed by the first female lighthouse keepers in the nation, and is now named the Ida Lewis Lighthouse.

And, we even got to hear a little bit of the Jazz Festival as we cruised around the harbor.

The Rum Runner II originally used three Liberty aircraft engines. Now it uses twin turbo-charged 350HP

Caterpillar Marine Diesels. Capt. Jay will be sure to show you the power of those engines a couple of times on the water. Prepare to get a little wet. It is an open boat, after all.

We ended our trip with a crusie along Ocean Drive's Ten Mile Drive. We stopped at Brenton Point State Park where people were flying kites, just as the website promised.

Brenton Point Park is an absolute gem, is completely free, and provides access across the street to a spectacular and energetic beach. It has restrooms, but they were not very well maintained. However, they were most definitely better than a hole in the ground.

The Ten Mile Drive is includes more than Ocean Drive, which takes up about a third of it. If you are not very mobile and like a good drive, this is the perfect Newport experience for you. There are places to stop along the way to look out into the ocean, or peer above the treetops and imagine the wealth of the homeowners along the drive.

Visit the website first, or get information from the visitors center

so you'll know what you are looking at.

We did not "do" the mansions this trip, although our drive, walking, and trolley trips took us past several of them.

There are 14 mansions, and the Preservation Society of Newport County offers a few different packages: \$38 for five properties; \$32 for two properties; and single property tickets, as well.

Fort Adams, which is where the Jazz Festival was held this weekend, is also a great destination, and on the list to do as a day trip all in itself.

Newport also has trolley tours, and walking tours, ghost tours, and the famed mansion tours. We couldn't do everything on our day trip, but that's a good thing. There are many things to do, some free or at very low cost, to keep you going back again and again.

All in all, Newport is about as visitor friendly as it gets, with shuttles and trolleys and many places for visitors, not just that big center, that have brochures and helpful people to make your trip a good one.
