Selectboard hears from neighbors on two issues

At a long meeting on 8/19/19 that included lots of input from the residents, the Fairhaven Selectboard heard complaints about the FY18 Community Development Block Grant project, and also discussed the navigational dredging project in the harbor, with comments on both sides of that issue.

The CDBG project is reconstructing Hedge Street from Cherry Street to the Acushnet River, and is underway now. Several residents complained about various aspects of the project.

One woman told the board that she was not at all happy with the project because they had installed granite edging around her property, which was not on the original plan.

She also complained about the way a large tree with overgrown roots was treated. She said the tree was "very, very ill" and needed to be taken down.

Mike Carter of GCG Associates explained that some minor field adjustments were made based on conditions in the street. Some

residents also complained about the cut curbs, angles and tapering on the corners. Mr. Carter explained that the specifications were to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) to make it easier for people in wheelchairs, and those with strollers, to move from sidewalk to sidewalk.

Mr. Carter said the tree in question was not dead, and they decided to save it, so they did cut the roots with a saw. He said that was a common practice.

June Peters Wylie, on Hedge Street said she thought the guys did a "fantastic job."

She said they were very helpful and let residents know when work would be going on.

Ms. Wylie said she preferred the old style curbing, but, the new style is "what we have."

She said she also has a problem with a tree near her house that has interfered with pipes underground, and suggested that the town plant smaller trees in the future.

Mr. Carter said that the current practice is to pick trees that do not grow as large as the old shade trees.

He said they use ornamental trees rather than the larger trees that line Green Street, for example.

Mr. Carter also explained that the neighborhood is densely populated, with 40-foot frontage. The street is also not as wide as some other streets, making it necessary to adjust some of the plans.

The board asked that the consultants and Paul Foley, the Planning and Economic Development Director, meet with the neighbors and possibly make more adjustments to the plan.

"My goal is to make them happy," said Mr. Carter.

The board also heard from several representatives about the Phase V dredging plan in New Bedford-Fairhaven Harbor.

The dredging is more for navigational purposes, but because it does require removing sediment contaminated with PCBs (polychlorinated biphenyls) federal and state money are helping to offset the costs.

There is currently a large dredging project in the harbor that is removing PCB contaminated sediment and



Press Release

On August 13-14, the eighth cohort of the FDA-NACCHO Mentorship Program for the Voluntary National Retail Food Regulatory Program Standards (Retail Program Standards) gathered in Washington, DC for their end-of-the-year meeting. The Retail Program Standards promote national uniformity and foster continuous quality improvement for regulatory programs responsible for retail food protection in the United States.

The peer mentorship program provides an important opportunity to (a) share best practices in food safety and (b) learn, share experiences, and acquire the tools and resources related to the Retail Program Standards.

The program pairs retail food regulatory program practitioners who are experienced in applying the Retail Program Standards with those newly enrolled and/or looking for assistance, guidance, tools, resources, and recommendations for continued success.

This year's cohort, running from December 2018 through August 2019, includes 23 local health departments from jurisdictions of varying size in 13 states.

The end-of-the-year meeting provided an opportunity for participants to expand their network beyond their mentor/mentee pairings. Many jurisdictions walked away with potential collaborations with other jurisdictions and a plan to sustain their momentum in improving their retail food regulatory program.

Participants at the meeting included mentorship program participants, NACCHO staff, and FDA representatives. During the meeting, participants networked, presented on their accomplishments, shared ideas and lessons learned, heard about FDA and NACCHO events and updates, and provided feedback on the mentorship program.

NACCHO presented all participants with a certificate of completion to recognize their achievements during the mentorship program.

Fairhaven completed their Self Assessment of the nine Standards, Passed the audit for 2 of the 9 standards. Standard 3 and 9. They will continue to work to meet the remaining Standards.

Three representatives from the

cohort scheduled meetings with their local officials in Washington D.C..

Mary Freire-Kellogg, Fairhaven Health Agent, met with representatives from Congressman William Keating and Senator Edward Markey's offices in Washington. During that meeting they spoke of Opioid abuse and addiction remediation programs and resources, hoarding disorder and lack of funding, Emergency Preparedness programs and the vital role of MRC; what can be done to help our youth population become part of solutions to society's problems instead of feeling like victims; what resources and strategies can we implement to increase and make our resources and treatment programs available to the public; increasing programs and funding to increase awareness of Food Borne illness and how to prevent and protect our residents, workers and food at home as well as in a retail setting.

What can be done to retain Local Health Dept employees. Why is the turnover rate so high?

Increasing minimum staffing levels for local Health jurisdictions due to the excessive workload and increasing responsibilities taxed to the Local Board of Health.

Have co-operative service sharing agreements with other communities. Work together while still maintaining

home town rule. Fairhaven works in this manor with Tobacco, Overdose Addiction, Community Crisis team, Mass Statewide Steering Committee on Hoarding, Fresh Start, Hoarding Remediation/Buried in Treasures programs, Textile Recovery Programs, Mattress recovery through Mass. DEP, Food Advisory Committee meetings with Mass. DPH.

Through these programs we combine resources and knowledge to reduce issues and streamline resolutions in our respective communities without taxing our local staff.

There are no secrets to success. It is the result of preparation, hard work, and learning from failure.

This letter was sent to the Fairhaven Selectboard and read by Ms. Vilandry at the 8/19/19 meeting.

We are writing you in response to the discovery of the latest plan of the MA DEP and New Bedford Port Authority to bury an additional 5,000 cubic yards of PCB sediments in another CAD cell, or unlined burial hole in the riverbed just 200 FEET away from the shoreline of a Fairhaven residential area and Oxford Village. This is proposed to be close to Fairhaven High School where rapidly developing students will be attending as well.

The risks to Fairhaven residents will be high due to the PCBs becoming airborne both while dredging the site to contain toxic PCB material and also dumping PCB material into that area when completed. Property owners in that area have already lost value in their homes and many have been unable to sell their homes being close to the only PCB dumpsite in a riverbed in New Bedford Harbor in all of the country!

We can thank Charles Murphy, BOS Chairman, who initially approved this PCB dump site back in 2010, who hastily signed a letter from the EPA without proper vetting or holding a public hearing. He spoke

on behalf of the Town of Fairhaven and its residents without their knowledge.*

We are vehemently opposed to placing even more PCB sediments in an area close to residents in the riverbed on the north side of the Route 6 bridge. Why should Fairhaven residents be victims of New Bedford's toxic waste?

Let them find another area away from Fairhaven residents for their Phase V PCB project. We are not opposed to dredging the harbor for the betterment of the community. We are very much opposed to where they chose to dump their toxic waste.



Acushnet FD responds to mulch fire, urges caution

According to a Facebook post on the Acushnet Fire & EMS page, the Fire Department responded to a mulch fire in the center of town. The resident discovered a 6x10-foot area burning with flames in contact with the vinyl siding.

The resident extinguished the fire and the FD used 125 gallons of water making sure it was out. The cause was determined to be "discarded smoking materials."

The department warns that the mulch can dry very quickly in the warm weather.

According to the state's Department of Fire Services, mulch is a combustible material that can catch fire easily from discarded smoking materials, and hundreds of fires each year are started that way.

Regulations prohibit mulch from being spread within 18 inches of combustible exteriors of buildings. Residents with six units or less are exempt, but all homeowners are encouraged to follow the safe practice.

The size of mulch piles is also limited because large piles can spontaneously combust from the heat they generate.

NB parks closing at dusk due to EEE risk

Press Release

The City of New Bedford's parks and other open public spaces will close at dusk beginning Friday, August 16, in response to the risk of Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE). Multiple positive tests of mosquitoes with EEE in New Bedford and surrounding municipalities have led the state's Department of Public Health to classify the risk level in Greater New Bedford as "critical" for EEE.

For the next four weeks, until Friday, September 13, park lights will be turned off at dusk (approximately 7:30 p.m.). Athletic leagues and other organizations utilizing the park should not continue their activities beyond dusk, due to the increased risk of EEE. In four weeks, the park closure will be reevaluated and the City will announce its plans from September 13 onward.

Ground spraying for mosquitoes will continue through the summer in the early mornings of Fridays and Tuesdays. The state is also conducting aerial sprayings.

Friday rounds of spraying will target areas including Buttonwood

Park, Brooklawn Park, Fort Taber, Hazelwood Park, Riverside Park, Clasky Common Park, Ashley Park, the Poor Farm area, Custom House Square and the downtown area.

Tuesday rounds of spraying will target the far North End of the city, including the areas surrounding the New Bedford Business Park, New Bedford Regional Airport, Sassaquin Pond, and Acushnet Avenue north of Phillips Avenue.

Spraying occurs between 2:00 am and sunrise on Friday and Tuesday morning, weather permitting. Residents in the vicinity of the targeted areas may wish to close their windows on the evening prior to the spraying.

The same precautionary measures are advised for EEE, West Nile Virus, and the Zika virus. These include the following:

Avoid Mosquito Bites

- **Be Aware of Peak Mosquito Hours**
While mosquitoes are out at all hours of the day, their peak biting times are from dusk to dawn. Consider rescheduling outdoor activities that occur during evening

or early morning. Otherwise, take extra care to use repellent and protective clothing, especially if you work or spend a lot of time outdoors.

- **Clothing Can Help Reduce Mosquito Bites.** Although it may be difficult to do when it's hot, wearing long sleeves, long pants and socks when outdoors will help keep mosquitoes away from your skin.
- **Apply Insect Repellent when you go outdoors.** Use a repellent with DEET (N, N-diethyl-m-toluamide), permethrin, picaridin (KBR 3023), IR3535 or oil of lemon eucalyptus [p-methane 3, 8-diol (PMD)] according to the instructions on the product label. DEET products should not be used on infants under two months of age and should be used in concentrations of 30% or less on older children. Oil of lemon eucalyptus should not be used on children under three years of age. Permethrin products are intended for use on items such as clothing, shoes, bed nets and camping gear and should not be applied to skin.

BPW closes parks due to EEE; discusses textile recycling

At its meeting on Monday, 8/19 the Fairhaven Board of Public Works discussed the possibility of starting textile recycling, as well as scouted locations for a new recycling center. The board first met with R & R Sons Concrete about approving them as a new driveway contractor.

Board member Keith Silvia said that they do top quality work. Board member Robert Hobson agreed saying that they are highly recommended. BPW Chairperson Brian Wotton explained that after they do their first driveway apron the Highway Superintendent will go and approve of the job.

The board voted unanimously to approve of R & R Concrete.

In another matter the board met with Steve Lisauskas of Waste Zero to discuss the possibility of adopting a textile recycling program in town.

Mr. Lisauskas explained that two years ago they did a study that revealed that 8% of trash was clothes and textiles of some kind. Mr. Lisauskas said that clothes also contaminate everyday recyclables because people try to recycle them with their regular recycling.

Mr. Lisauskas explained that there is a company in Ohio called Simple Recycling that has come up with a system for recycling textiles. He said the company mails residents two big

pink bags to be placed out on the residents' normal recycling day.

The company would come around town on recycling days in a large van collecting curbside textile recyclables that are placed outside in the pink bags. Mr. Lisauskas said that every time a bag is taken the company will leave a new bag in its place.

Mr. Lisauskas explained that recycling program costs nothing for the town to implement. He said that the town will actually be paid \$20 for every ton of textiles collected.

Mr. Lisauskas said that a lot of towns in Massachusetts have already implemented the program.

Mr. Hobson asked if they get a lot of people going through and taking clothes out of bags before it gets picked up.

Mr. Lisauskas said that it does happen but it is pretty rare and the company will still pick up a bag even if it looks like it has been gone through.

"Sounds like a pretty good deal," Mr. Hobson said.

Mr. Wotton agreed saying that the program would definitely benefit the town.

Mr. Wotton noted that the Board of Health wanted to add a textile bin at the Recycling Center. He asked if Simple Recycling could put a bin there and pick that up as well.

Mr. Lisauskas said that a lot of towns opt to have a few bins in town

and Simple Recycling will also pick those up as well.

BPW Superintendent Vincent Furtado said they will have to talk to the Board of Health and Town Counsel about the program.

Mr. Lisauskas said the program is a three-year contract and he can send it them to view.

The board agreed that the Simple Recycling would be great for the town and will continue talks to implement the program

In another matter the board discussed the Highway Union Discipline draft. They briefly looked through the draft and discussed the warnings for being late or for cell phone use.

The board also discussed whether or not a foreperson can send an employee home for disciplinary reasons or if a call should be made to the superintendent.

Mr. Furtado said the foreperson should report issues to the Superintendent and then the superintendent can discipline the employee.

The board had some issues with section three of the draft which discussed employees requesting to take old discipline issues off their record after three or more years if there's no repeat issue.

Mr. Furtado said that the employee would need to request it with the

superintendent and then the BPW would have to vote on it.

The board noted that the disciplinary issue not be removed from the record but sealed away, just so that the history is still there in case issues happen again down the road.

The board agreed to that amended draft unanimously.

In another matter the board discussed the new sewer and water rate increases.

Mr. Furtado said tier one residents are the senior citizens and single resident households. He said he estimated the increases for tier one at the highest usage for that tier.

Mr. Furtado said for water and sewer for tier one residents, the most the rates will go up is \$5 per six month billing period.

Mr. Furtado said single resident homes and senior citizens should expect their water and sewer bill to increase somewhere between \$0-\$5 per six months.

Mr. Furtado said tier includes most residents in Fairhaven, which is the average family household.

He estimated the water and sewer

increase for tier two with the highest usage for that tier as well. He explained that water and sewer rates for tier two residents will go up a maximum of \$20 per six months.

The average family household should expect their water and sewer bill to increase somewhere between \$0-\$20 per six months.

Mr. Wotton explained that the increase is not too bad and they did everything they could to help out the residents of Fairhaven. He said that the rates had to go up to help pay for the new sewer treatment plant that the town needs.

The board did not vote on the increases, but will probably vote at the next meeting on 9/3.

Mr. Hobson and Mr. Furtado briefly discussed a trip they took to Dennis, Mass. last week to take a tour of their recycling center, Mr. Hobson said he was very impressed with their facility and the people they met.

"It was a lot of fun," Mr. Hobson said.

Mr. Furtado explained that the BPW has the grants for the equipment to create their new recycling center,

but they need to find a site.

Mr. Hobson and Mr. Furtado will be visiting the recycling center in Dartmouth next week to further their research on how they would like to construct the new center in Fairhaven.

In another matter Mr. Furtado said that the Selectboard asked the BPW to change the town auction date due to conflicts. The board made a motion to change the auction date to September 28.

Mr. Furtado also said the selectboard mentioned closing the parks in town at 7:30 p.m. until the threat of EEE from mosquitoes is gone.

The board made a motion to close the parks at 7:30 p.m. The motion passed unanimously.



placing it in Confined Aquatic Disposal cells. CAD cells are buried in the harbor and covered with clean sand. The controversial method has received much criticism from environmental groups and residents who want the sediment removed completely out of the harbor.

Karen Vilandry, from Hands Across the River Coalition (HARC), read a letter to the board objecting to the latest phase (see page 10 for complete letter).

While the proponents of the project stressed the economic benefits of a deeper harbor, Ms. Vilandry focused on some familiar themes, including the dangers of the PCBs becoming airborne after they are dredged up and moved by barge to the CAD cells.

Edward Anthes-Washburn, Executive Director at New Bedford Port Authority (Port of New Bedford), said the project would result in more than 800 new jobs. The deeper harbor will allow for larger boats to enter the harbor, and allow them to dock in more places. He said some places, such as the Marina at Slocum Cove, the US Coast Guard Auxiliary, and Pease Park will greatly benefit from the dredging.

Fairhaven Harbormaster Timothy Cox said that Pease Park is "getting silted in."

The dredging will also allow the town to add moorings where it is currently too shallow to put boats.

He said the town spent a lot of money getting Union Wharf rebuilt, and they went low enough with the wall that the dredging can go deeper. He said the lobster basin is also getting shallower and the boats have been having trouble at low tide.

The dredging will be a "win-win for everybody," said Mr. Cox.

Ms. Vilandry, however, said that the EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) had disclosed that it was not planning to monitor air quality during the Phase V dredging as it had for the other dredging.

One woman said that despite the assertions that the dredging material does not get airborne, she had a lot of it coming into her house.

"When I was cleaning my kitchen sink that stuff was everywhere," she said.

Ms. Vilandry said the dredging was not the issue for HARC. She said it was the handling of the material, and

especially that it would be buried in the harbor. And the new CAD cell will be only 200 feet from a Fairhaven residence.

"People don't realize how deadly, how toxic PCBs are," said Ms. Vilandry, disclosing that she has been tested and PCBs have been found in her. She also noted that a resident complained that she could not grow tomatoes during the dredging.

"What we're saying is, find another disposal site," said Ms. Vilandry.

Selectboard Chairperson Charles Murphy directly addressed Ms. Vilandry's claim that he personally authorized the dredging plan in 2010. He said he was one of three Selectboard members who supported the plan, and as the chair, he signed it.

"I love that people think that Charles Murphy can do all these

wonderful things by himself," he said. "It's great, but not factual."

He said all the same issues came up years ago, and the EPA monitored for air quality.

Mr. Murphy noted that the current phase would go on whether Fairhaven supported it or not that night.

Mr. Washburn said that the material in the Phase V CAD cells would be much cleaner than the other cells.

Ms. Vilandry said PCBs accumulate in the tissues. She said she wished someone would follow the students who played on the football field at Fairhaven High School to see if they had children with neurological disorders.

Mr. Murphy took issue with that line of thought, and raised his voice to note that his children attended FHS and his son played football.

"If you don't agree with this, why don't you take them to court," said Mr. Murphy, adding that lots of environmental groups do exactly that when they disagree with a government action.

"You spend money," he said. "I'm not going to spend the town's money. Our tax money pays for our lawyer."

He then shut off Ms. Vilandry and moved the discussion along.

Town Administrator Mark Rees said that there was a "more extensive" meeting in New Bedford the week before when many of the same issues were discussed.

It was unclear by press time if that meeting is available online.

Fairhaven is paying 20% of the cost of dredging around Union Wharf and the Pease Park boat ramp. Town Meeting approved \$179,000 for the project, with the money coming from the waterways users fund.

Businesses and residents in the harbor also have the option of paying for dredging in front of their businesses for a discounted rate.

Fairhaven Harbormaster Timothy Cox said that the estimate is around \$100 per cubic yard for residents. He also said it would be about \$600 per cubic yard if residents paid for the project on their own.

Selectboard member Bob Espindola voiced strong support of the project.

"I am in support of this project," said Mr. Espindola. "The economic benefits are tremendous, not just good."

He said it was not ideal, that he would like to see the sediment taken away.

"I think anyone would, but that's not the reality of any options presented to us," said Mr. Espindola. "I'd rather see them buried in a CAD cell than tossed up by the tide. I'll go on record saying I'm in full support of this project."

Selectboard member Daniel Freitas expressed some concerns with how close the CAD cell is to a residence, and he said he wanted to make sure the EPA continued to conduct air monitoring.

"I work in that industry, so I don't trust the EPA that much," said Mr. Freitas.

In the end the board voted unanimously to approve the proposal on the condition that the EPA continue its air monitoring.
