Emma Jean's to be sold; Fairhaven free cash is \$6+ million

The Fairhaven Selectboard approved a liquor license transfer, and received updates on grant money and other funds, at its meeting on 9/23/19.

The board also heard from Police Chief Michael Myers and other members of the Police Department leadership announcing the certification of the department by the Massachusetts Police Accreditation Commission (see page 7 for related story).

Chief Myers explained that the process took seven years, and is still just a step on the way to accreditation. He said it took a long time and a lot of hard work, and credited Lt. Kevin Kobza with working "extremely hard" on the process.

Lt. Kobza said it was a "department-wide initiative," that could not be completed without support from the top. He said the department met 159 standards to meet the certification, and has 98 to go to for accreditation.

Town Administrator Mark Rees said the department was being

"proactive," not just avoiding problems, and that they were bringing the entire town "into the modern age."

Selectboard Chairperson Charles Murphy said the recent changes at the department made it stronger. He thanked them all for their work, and said he was not only proud as a town, but that the family was very proud, reminding everyone that he and Lt. Kobza are cousins.

The board also approved a liquor license/package store transfer for Emma Jean's to Stephen Ward, who currently runs a food service organization on the Cape.

Attorney Andrew Upton told the board that the company has an experienced manager to run the liquor store at the location on Huttleston Avenue. He said they look forward to hosting wine tastings and other community events.

The new owners are buying the building along with the license and plan on extensive renovations to the property.

Board member Bob Espindola noted to the new owners that the

liquor license is tied to the address. Cathy Melanson, who currently owns the property told the board that she was very happy to have Mr. Ward as a buyer.

"I couldn't find a better person than Mr. Ward to sell it to," said Ms. Melanson. "I feel very comfortable selling my place to Mr. Ward."

There was no other public comment and the board approved the transfer unanimously, 2-0. Board member Daniel Freitas was absent.

Mr. Rees informed the board that the town's preliminary free-cash figure as of July 1, 2019, is more than \$6 million: \$4,393,392 for the general fund; \$1493,516 in the water enterprise fund; and \$1,196,392 in the sewer enterprise fund.

Mr. Rees also told the board that the town received a \$174,535 Green Communities grant to fund energy management systems, lighting other improvements at the Senior Center/ Rec Center, Fairhaven High School and Hastings Middle School.

The town also received a CDBG grant of \$577,000 to continue the Hedge Street project.

Fairhaven Police Department receives state certification

Fairhaven Police Dept. Press Release

Chief Michael J. Myers is pleased to announce that the Fairhaven Police Department achieved State Certification from the Massachusetts Police Accreditation Commission (MPAC) on Tuesday, 9/10/19.

The department was recognized for its achievement during an awards ceremony at The Connors Center in Dover.

Certification is a self-initiated evaluation process by which police departments strive to meet and maintain the highest standards of law enforcement, and is considered the best measure of a police department against the established best practices around the country and region.

"Being certified through MPAC is a great achievement for our department and highlights the high standards that we have at the Fairhaven Police Department," Chief Myers said. "I want to commend the officers who worked hard through the certification process and we look forward to working toward earning full accreditation."

The certification process is long and rigorous. It involves both an

internal self-review and an external assessment by the Commission's team of subject matter experts.

The MPAC program requires that departments meet all 159 mandatory standards.

These carefully selected standards include: Jurisdiction and Mutual Aid, Collection and Preservation of Evidence, Communications, Working Conditions, Crime Analysis, Community Involvement, Financial Management, Internal Affairs, Juvenile Operations, Patrol Administration, Public Information, Records, Traffic, Training, Drug Enforcement and Victim/Witness Assistance.

Earlier this year, the department was evaluated by a team of

Commission-appointed assessors who found the department to be in full compliance with all of the necessary standards required for certification.

Wisconsin Bratwurst

2 lbs. fresh bratwurst sausages
2 onions, thinly sliced
1 cup butter
6 (12 oz) cans or bottles beer
1 1/2 tspss ground black pepper
10 hoagie rolls

Prick bratwurst with fork to prevent them from exploding as they cook. Place in a large stock pot with the onions, butter, and beer. Place pot over medium heat, and simmer for 15 to 20 minutes.

Preheat grill for med-high heat.

Lightly oil grate. Cook bratwurst on preheated grill for 10 to 14 minutes, turning occasionally to brown evenly. Serve hot off the grill with onions on hoagie rolls.

Serve with brown mustard on substantial hoagie rolls, never on hot dog buns. Mustard is important and must always be stone ground. Add warm sauerkraut and ketchup, if you like.

In her 30's she took calligraphy lessons from Susan Moore, an art she continues to use.


A few years ago she started taking water coloring lessons from Susan Cabral in Dartmouth. Recently she has been combining the two arts.

Acushnet hears plan to put veteran housing at former library

At its meeting on 9/25/19, the Acushnet Selectboard saw a presentation by Michael Gagne, Town Administrator of Mattapoisett, who is also president of the non-profit organization, Partners in Housing.

Mr. Gagne presented the Selectboard with architectural plans for renovating the Russell Library into a regional veterans housing facility.

He explained it would be a joint venture with the Town of Mattapoisett. There would be 13 units, at approximately 600-700 square feet each.

Mr. Gagne stated that Dartmouth has been very successful with their veterans housing facility located in the old police station. He said it would have to be under the direction of the Acushnet Housing Authority.

Mr. Gagne also explained that there are grants that may be available for the project and CPC funds could also be utilized.

Selectboard member Kevin Gaspar stated that Acushnet desperately needs more senior housing and veterans housing.

Board member David Desrochers expressed his concerns on the financial picture. He said he agreed with the concept but was not sure of the financial burden.

Mr. Gagne stated that he would be requesting permission to move forward from both the Mattapoisett and Acushnet Selectboards.

Selectboard chairperson Roger

Mr. Gagne stated that Dartmouth has been very successful with their veterans housing facility located in the old police station.

Cabral asked if Mr. Gagne would be willing to put together a written proposal and return for more discussion on the project at a future meeting. Mr. Gagne agreed.

In another matter, the Selectboard reviewed their Standard & Poor's credit rating with financial consultants from Hilltop Security Advisors. The consultants advised

that Acushnet has gone from AA to AA+, stating that the conclusion is that the Town of Acushnet is "doing everything right."

Interim Town Administrator Julie Hebert reported that the Town has received \$171,494 in a Green Communities Grant that will be used for LED lighting at the town schools.

She also reported that the Comcast license agreement ends in November and the committee will be meeting soon to review it.

Mr. Cabral asked that one of the Selectboard members consider being an appointee for SRPEDD. He stated that SRPEDD meets once a month, usually on a Wednesday, and that he would be interested if neither of the other board members wanted to do it.

Mr. Cabral also stated that he is having a casual meeting with the Mayor of New Bedford, the health agent and conservation agents from Acushnet to discuss the Lake Street Pond, as it is owned by the City of New Bedford, but is located in Acushnet.

"It's just a mess over there," Mr. Cabral stated.

Beached whale at Hoppy's Landing is euthanized

A 17-foot juvenile minke whale washed up on shore at the southernmost tip of Hoppy's Landing on Tuesday, 9/24/19. Fairhaven Harbor-master Tim Cox, Animal Control Officer Terry Cripps, and other officials arrived on scene in the morning and worked to keep the whale alive. Officials from the International Fund for Animal Welfare

(IFAW) arrived on scene and assisted. IFAW personnel determined that the whale needed to be euthanized "due to suspected illness and stress," according to a press release from the Fairhaven Harbor-master's office.

Olivia Guerra, an IFAW spokesperson said on scene that: "There is an unusual mortality rate for these minke Whales."

The whale, which is believed to be about one year old, was removed

from the water with assistance from West Island Marina personnel and equipment. The whale will be autopsied to determine the nature of the stranding.

"I would like to thank everybody that came out today to help and try to save the whale," wrote Mr. Cox on Facebook. "My deputies, Fairhaven Animal Control, Fairhaven Fire, Fairhaven Police, Fairhaven TV, IFAW, and West Island Marina."

BPW discusses water and sewer abatements

At its meeting on Monday, 9/16, the Fairhaven Board of Public Works discussed water and sewer abatements, town meeting articles and the encampment event at Fort Phoenix.

The board first met with Jean Canastra about a water and sewer abatement issue. Ms. Canastra explained to the board that she had a water and sewer bill that was over \$2000 when her normal bill is usually around \$200. Ms. Canastra said the town put a pink slip on her door to notify her.

Ms. Canastra said that her toilet had to be fixed and was running without her knowing it for a few weeks. She had a plumber fix it.

Ms. Canastra said she filed for an abatement, but it was denied. She then went to court with Superintendent Vincent Furtado and the court suggested she meet with the BPW to discuss the issue.

BPW Chairperson Brian Wotton asked if Ms. Canastra had the plumber's bill and she said she did not but could get it.

Mr. Wotton explained that once the water goes through the meter it is the resident's bill unless the water meter is faulty. He asked if her water meter has been normal since and Ms. Canastra said yes.

BPW member Keith Silvia said the plumber's bill and pictures of the leak could be helpful.

Mr. Wotton suggested that Ms. Canastra bring those items to the board and also have a plumber go by and check all water in the house and report the findings.

Ms. Canastra agreed and said she would try to get all that done for the next BPW meeting.

The board also met with Allan Rego about a water and sewer abatement. Mr. Rego explained that his bill was \$1159 and was usually around \$300.

Mr. Rego explained that he had a plumber go out three times, and an employee from the water department, and both said there were no leaks anywhere.

Mr. Wotton said that the board could work with the sewer abatement but not the water.

Mr. Hobson suggested possibly

helping Mr. Rego out with the difference from the normal sewer amount to the large bill.

Mr. Wotton explained that if the hose was leaking outside their house the BPW could help with the extra sewer cost.

Mr. Wotton said it sounded like there was no leak in the house, so it must have been a leak outside. The BPW can help with outside leaks especially because Mr. Rego provided documented evidence that the plumber saw no leaks.

Mr. Wotton asked Mr. Rego to bring in three of his previous sewer bills and the board will come up with the average and calculate the difference between their average bill and the current large bill and refund them the difference.

The board voted to table the issue until the next meeting.

In a related matter, the board discussed drafting a water and sewer abatement policy. Mr. Furtado said there is currently no policy and that abatements should go directly to the
