The Buzzards Bay Coalition will welcome representatives from the town of Fairhaven and members of the public this Friday, to celebrate the opening and permanent protection of the 61-acre Carvalho Farm. This coastal property features a native grassland meadow, active agricultural field, forested wetlands, and salt marshes along the shore of Nasketucket Bay, protecting an extraordinary array of Buzzards Bay's vital habitats.

This property was purchased by the Buzzards Bay Coalition in 2017 with the support of Fairhaven Community Preservation Act (CPA) funds. Carvalho Farm is part of the growing complex of protected lands around Nasketucket Bay, helping to preserve one of Buzzards Bay's healthiest waterways.

FHS Math scores continue to improve

Fairhaven High School students had a strong performance on the Next Gen MCAS Mathematics test from last spring. The results, which only came out this October, showed Fairhaven ranked first in two areas and second in one area, among high schools from Wareham to Seekonk, according to Phil Harding, FHS Math Department Chairperson.

FHS came in first place in the percentage of students in the "exceeding expectations" category (formerly "advanced").

FHS also came in first place for overall Student Growth percentile. This category compares students statewide with similar scores from earlier grades.

Students also placed second in the Overall Mathematics Achievement Percentile, getting edged out by Apponequet.

'We're really proud of the kids because of how hard they worked to achieve these outstanding results,' wrote Mr. Harding in an email. "Also, our top students really hit it out of the park."

Mr. Harding said that being number one in the Student Growth category shows that the data analysis work done by teachers is paying off.

"Mr. Francis, Mrs. Sunderland, Mr. Joseph and our rookie sensation Ms. Girouard all put in some great performances last year with their sophomores and they deserve some credit also," wrote Mr. Harding.

But, he added, it is no time to sit back on their laurels.

"Now we have a new group to work with so we can't look back any longer if we want to finish first in all three categories next spring," wrote Mr. Harding. "We always have great kids and this year is no different. The teachers have broken down all the data from the 2019 results and new adjustments have been made. We're on to spring 2020!"

According to the Mass. Department of Education website Massachusetts students are first in the United States in reading and math and are competitive internationally. Mass. teachers educate close to 1 million public school students and 20,000 adult learners each year.

Students must earn a passing score on the MCAS tests in English Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics, and one of the Science and Technology/Engineering (STE) tests (Biology, Chemistry, Introductory Physics, and Technology/Engineering) in order to earn a high school diploma in Mass.

There two scholarship are awarded to graduating seniors based on their MCAS scores, the John and Abigail Adams Scholarship which tuition only for covers semesters at a state college or university; and the Stanley Z. Koplik Certificate of Mastery Awards, which also covers tuition for up to eight semesters. Visit http://www.doe. mass.edu/scholarships/

State to switch to mile-based exit signs on major highways

The Massachusetts Department of Transportation (MassDOT) is announcing it is taking steps to install federally-mandated mile-based exit signs on the Commonwealth's major and limited access highways, including, but not limited to, I-90, I-93, I-95, Route 3 and I-495. Public meetings will be held in the coming months to provide information to residents, business leaders, tourist attraction property owners and other community members.

The Federal Highway Administration's 2009 Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices mandated that all states establish a mile-based exit numbering system. The conversion to a mile-based exit numbering system will be implemented on a route-byroute basis, starting in Western Massachusetts and moving eastward, and is scheduled to be completed in spring 2021.

For individual routes, exit num-

bering conversion will take place east to west or north to south.

During a transition period for motorists, "Old Exit" signs will be installed at each converted exit for a minimum of two years. Installation of mile-based exit signs will begin in late summer, 2020. Signs will be installed during off-peak hours, with minimal traffic impact expected.

"The conversion to mile-based exit numbers will benefit drivers by providing an obvious and straightforward calculation of driving distances," said MassDOT Highway Administrator Jonathan Gulliver. "Massachusetts will complete installing the new signs in Spring 2021 and in the coming weeks and months we will have a comprehensive process to inform the public about the changes. Even when the new exit signs are installed, the existing exit signs will remain in place to allow travelers the time to get accustomed to the changes."

MassDOT's public meetings on the

new exit numbers will begin in December:

- Northampton: Monday, December 9, 6:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m., Highway District 2 headquarters, 811 North King Street
- Lenox: Wednesday, December 11, 6:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m., Highway District 1 headquarters, 270 Main Street
- Worcester: Monday, December 16, 6:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m., Blackstone Heritage Corridor Visitor Center, 3 Paul Clancy Way.

Additional public meetings will be held in 2020 and will be announced as they are scheduled.

The project's estimated cost is \$2.8 million, with 90% paid through Federal Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) funds and the remaining 10% through state highway funds.

Lane restrictions at Tarkiln Hill Road begin 11/22

The Massachusetts Department of Transportation (MassDOT) is announcing that in New Bedford there will be lane restrictions and then full lane closures soon at the Tarkiln Hill Road grade crossing as part of South Coast Rail Phase One infrastructure work.

Beginning at 7 a.m., Friday, November 22, and continuing through to Monday afternoon, November 25, there will be lane restrictions in the area of the Tarkiln Hill road grade crossing work zone.

Then beginning at 7 a.m., Thursday, December 5, and continuing through to 4 p.m., Tuesday, December

10, all lanes will be closed at the Tarkiln Hill Road grade crossing.

Beginning on November 22, and during the 24-hour-per-day work period ending Monday afternoon, November 25, motor vehicle. pedestrian access and access to local business establishments will be maintained. MassDOT's contractor, J.F. White, will strive to maintain one vehicle travel lane in each direction throughout this time However, the number of vehicular travel lanes through the work zone may be reduced to one lane serving alternating traffic directions during certain construction activities. Police details will be present throughout the construction period.

During the 24-hour-per-day work period beginning December 5, Tarkiln Hill Road will be closed to all traffic. A detour route will be implemented, and access to local business establishments will be maintained. Police details will be present throughout the construction period.

Members of the public traveling in the area of Tarkiln Hill Road are encouraged to allow extra time to cross through the area. Scheduled construction work is weather dependent.

3 oz. cream cheese, cubed 1 tsp. pure vanilla extract 1 c. sweetened condensed milk 2 c. heavy cream, cold Sour cream and crushed ginger

In medium saucepan, combine pumpkin, ginger, cinnamon, nutmeg, and pinch salt. Cook on medium, stirring frequently until steaming heavily, darker in color and slightly thicker, about 5 minutes.

Remove from heat and stir in cream cheese and vanilla until smooth. Transfer to bowl, then stir in condensed milk. Let cool completely.

Using electric mixer, beat cream until medium peaks form. Fold in cream cheese mixture, then spoon into 4-ounce jars. Chill until ready to serve. Makes 8 cups. Serve dolloped with sour cream and crushed ginger cookies if desired.

AAA: 55 million to travel for Thanksgiving

More than 55 million travelers are making plans to kick off the holiday season with a trip of 50 miles or more away from home this Thanksgiving. This will be the second-highest Thanksgiving travel volume since AAA began tracking in 2000, trailing only the record set in 2005. Overall, an additional 1.6 million more people will travel compared with last year, a 2.9% increase. The vast majority of holiday travelers will drive to their destinations and, INRIX, a global transportation analytics company, expects Wednesday afternoon to be the worst travel period nationally, with some trips taking as much at four times longer than normal in major metros.

More than 1.26 million Massachusetts residents will be among the travelers, with almost 1.1 million going by car, both records for this holiday.



Plan ahead: Fairhaven's Old Time Holiday is weekend of 12/14

Get into the spirit of the holidays and find an array of holiday gifts, food, music, and old-fashioned good cheer by visiting Fairhaven on Saturday, 12/14, for the 22nd annual Old-Time Holiday in the historical town center. Over the years it has become one of Fairhaven's favorite events.

In December 1998, the Fairhaven Office of Tourism first launched what

was then called the "Very Victorian Holiday," bringing together about thirty nonprofit, school, and church groups to create a weekend old-fashioned with holiday events. The weekend slate of activities has been repeated every year since, with the only change being the switch of the name from "Victorian" to "Old-Time" so that it was not bound to a specific historical time period.

This year, as always, most of the Old-Time Holiday events take place

during the day on Saturday, December 14. Both the First Congregational Church, 34 Center Street, and the Unitarian Memorial Church, 102 Green Street, will hold fairs, with church members and outside vendors displaying a wide variety of items for sale. In a similar vein, about 25 of the town's non-profit and school groups will have tables at the Town Hall, 40 Center Street. At these locations

you'll find handmade crafts, gifts, holiday greens, delicious baked goods, gift baskets, silent auction items to bid on, and more. In the Town Hall there will also be face painting and a few children's activities. All three fairs run from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

The Unitarian Church, a magnificent English-Gothic style "cathedral," will also give guided tours of the sanctuary during the day.

The Millicent Library, 45 Center Street, will hold a book fair with many local authors signing and selling their books. From 9:30 to 2:00, authors will take turns presenting short readings from their works. It is a great way to

support local writers and find great gifts for the readers on your list.

A short walk away, the lobby of the beautiful, Tudor style Our Lady's Haven, 71 Center Street, will be open from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. for visits and photos with Santa. Cookies and hot chocolate will be served.

As lunch time rolls around, food will be available at three locations. A lobster roll luncheon will be held at

the First Congregation Church. soup and sandwich luncheon will take place at the Harrop Center 47 Center Street, an Elizabethan style cottage on the Unitarian Church property. On the Town Hall lawn, Boy Scout Troop 52 will be selling hotdogs, and in the first floor banquet room of the Town Hall the North Fairhaven **Improvement** Association will serve hot soups, meat pies, spinach pies, stuffed quahogs, chips, soda

and water. There will also be cider and donuts available from the FHS Class of 2021 and popcorn from the Fairhaven Village Militia.

As you walk from place to place, you'll hear the musical sounds of the Buttonwood Brass, made up of Michael Rocha, Paul Chadbourne, and Shawn Baptista, as they stroll around the area from 11:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. The live music is supported by the vendors of Fairhaven's summertime Huttleston Marketplace.



Social Security Scams

The Inspector General for the Social Security Administration, Gail S. Ennis, and Commissioner of Social Security Andrew Saul announce the launch of a dedicated online form at https://oig.ssa.gov to receive reports from the public of Social Security-related scams.

These scams — in which fraudulent

callers mislead victims into making cash or gift card payments to avoid arrest for purported Social Security number problems — skyrocketed over the past year to become the #1 type of fraud reported to the Federal Trade Commission and the Social Security Administration.

To combat these scams, the Office of the Inspector General (OIG) will use the new online form to capture data that will be analyzed for trends and commonalities. The OIG will use the data to identify investigative leads, which could help identify criminal entities or individuals participating in or facilitating the scams. Ultimately, these efforts are expected to disrupt the scammers, helping reduce this type of fraud as well as the number of victims.

"We are taking action to raise awareness and prevent scammers from harming Americans," said Commissioner Saul. "I am deeply troubled that our country has not been able to stop these crooks from deceiving some of the most vulnerable members of our society."

By far, the most-requested title in December from those who don't have HBO will be the final season (8) of the mega-popular *Game of Thrones* (Dec. 3). On the same date, HBO will release the complete series, in both regular and collector's editions. The show was too depressing for me, but it definitely has its fans.

Other notable TV in December: Russell Crowe as Roger Ailes in *The Loudest Voice* (Dec. 10), *Doc Martin* series 9 (Dec. 10), *The Simpsons* season 19 (Dec. 3).

IT'S SHOWTIME

A surprise (if moderate) hit this past summer was Quentin Tarantino's epic *Once Upon a Time in Hollywood* (Dec. 10). If you ask how a movie starring Leonardo DiCaprio and Brad Pitt could be a "surprise" hit, I reply

that no star is a guarantee of boxoffice success any more. If you want to have a double feature, I recommend the thriller *Lucky Day* (same date), the first film in 17 years by writer/director Roger Avary, who cowrote Tarantino's *Pulp Fiction*.

Other cult favorites this month: Sandahl Bergman in the '80s action-fantasy *She* (Dec. 3), Drew Barrymore in *The Amy Fisher Story* (Dec. 17), *The Peanut Butter Solution* (not to be confused with last month's *The Peanut Butter Falcon* (Dec. 10).

ENDGAME

Each month, the Criterion Collection releases a handful of goodies foreign, classics, or just plain movies that rate your attention — so I'll try to spotlight their wares in this space. At their best, Criterion offers film school on a disc. The big one in December is Wim Wenders' 1991 sci-fi epic Until the End of the World (Dec. 10), which has never before seen a DVD release in America. Better vet, this is the full, nearly five-hour cut, not the incoherent, hacked-down 158minute version you may have seen in its brief theatrical run (the soundtrack was always more popular) or on videocassette. I for one can't wait.

Other Criterion releases in December: A restored edition of Kelly Reichardt's mellow drama *Old Joy* (Dec. 10), the 1960 Alec Guinness vehicle *Tunes of Glory* (Dec. 3), the once-scandalous 1933 classic *The Story of Temple Drake* with Miriam Hopkins (Dec. 3).

WHIPLASH

Sometimes it's amusing to see what mismatched stuff comes out on the same day. For instance, December

17 brings DVDs of Rambo: Last Blood (gee, you promise?) and the *Downton* Abbey movie. Trying to watch these back-to-back will probably give you a sprain. As if that weren't a weird enough combo, December 10 offers the horror sequel *It: Chapter 2* and the crime movie Hustlers, which have nothing to do with each other except healthy box office; for a soothing chaser there's always documentary Linda Ronstadt: The Sound of My Voice. And Christmas Eve day at least gives us a natural double feature with Renee Zellweger's Judy Garland biopic Judy and the documentary Drag Kids.

ALL I HAVE TO DO IS STREAM

If you were to subscribe to all the streaming services currently out there, you might as well just subscribe to cable. For now, though, it's useful to see which projects each service hopes to use to lure you in. Netflix, for instance, delivers the Oscar hopeful Marriage Story (with Scarlett Johansson and Adam Driver) on December 6. Hulu's original actiondrama series Reprisal bows on that day, too. Amazon Prime picked up Syfy's cancelled show The Expanse for a fourth and fifth season; season 4 will arrive December 13. And Apple TV+ has the new crime drama series Truth Be Told starring Octavia Spencer, out on December 6.






