



Fairhaven to pursue Prop 2 1/2 override

At its meeting on 3/20/23 the Fairhaven Select Board discussed possible dates for a special election to be held after Town Meeting for a ballot initiative to override Proposition 2 1/2, which limits the amount of money municipalities can raise through the tax levy (property taxes).

To override Prop 2 1/2, Town Meeting will have to vote for the override, and then the issue will have to pass with the voters in townwide ballot.

Town Clerk Linda Fredette explained some of the logistical problems with waiting too long after TM, which is on 5/6. The measure will have to pass before the end of the fiscal year on 6/30.

SB chairperson Stasia Powers expressed her concern with the 5/22 proposed date for the special election. The language on the ballot needs to be in place 35 days before the election. Her concern was that Town Meeting might make a change to the language, then the whole process would have to start over gain. She said they should just wait.

Other board members agreed, although it makes the schedule very tight to get it all done before the FY ends. The earliest date for a special election on a Monday would be June 12. The board did not make a decision on Monday, but tabled the discussion until the 4/18 meeting.

If Town Meeting does not vote for the override vote, then the matter ends there.

"We're back to square one," said Town Administrator Angie Lopes Ellison.

The board also discussed the flag/banner policy, which regulates who can display a flag or banner on town hall.

The Belonging Committee requested that the Progress Pride Flag be hung at town hall during June, which is LGBTQ Pride month. The Progress Pride Flag is a more inclusive version for the iconic Pride Flag. It includes the rainbow colors of the traditional pride flag with the

added colors of a triangle on the left made of black and brown to represent people of color, and pink, white and baby-blue stripes which represent transgender individuals.

The new colors create an arrow shape leading to the right "to confer forward movement while purposely being along the left edge, pointing to the fact that progress still needs to be made," wrote Jessica Fidalgo, Chair of the Belonging Committee in her request to the SB.

The board realized the flag policy as it stands only allows for one flag or banner to be flown at once. The Homecoming Day Banner is traditionally displayed on town hall for the month of June.

At first the board was going to split the month, flying the Pride Flag for two weeks, and the Homecoming banner for two weeks.

Ms. Ellison ask that the board reconsider the policy, saying that it is not inclusive. June is pride month, she said, and splitting the month in favor of Homecoming "sends a different message."

SB member Keith Silvia agreed

• **Wednesday, March 29 Charlotte Perkins Gilman, "The Yellow Wallpaper," and Postpartum Depression** Charlotte Perkins Gilman became famous as a lecturer and writer about political economy, particularly the importance of women's work. Much of her thinking grew out of her experience of severe postpartum depression and the popular treatment—complete rest, no work, and no reading—that nearly cost her her sanity. Her barely fictionalized account of her breakdown—"The Yellow Wallpaper"—made her a feminist icon in the mid-twentieth century.

Cornbread Casserole

- 1 cup cornmeal
- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 1/2 tablespoons sugar
- 1 (16-ounce) bag frozen corn, thawed & drained
- 1 cup milk
- 1 cup sour cream
- 6 tablespoons butter, melted
- Freshly ground black pepper, to taste
- 8 ounces bacon, cooked until crispy, diced
- 1-2 jalapeños, minced
- 1 1/2 cups grated cheddar cheese, divided

Preheat the oven to 350° with the rack placed in the center position. Grease a 9x13-inch baking dish generously. Set aside.

In a large bowl, whisk the cornmeal, baking powder, flour, sugar, and salt together.

Add in the corn, milk, and sour cream, stirring to combine.

Mix in the butter, black pepper, most of the bacon and jalapeños, and 1 cup of the cheese until just combined.

Pour the mixture into the prepared baking dish. Smooth the top and drizzle with the remaining jalapeños, bacon, and 1/2 cup of cheese.

Bake for 40-45 minutes, or until golden brown.

Acushnet has two contests in election

The town of Acushnet will have two contested races on the ballot this year, with two candidates running for one seat on the Selectboard, and three candidates running for two seats on the School Committee.

Eric Chew is challenging incumbent David Wojnar for a seat on the Selectboard. Mr. Wojnar served on the SB from 1998 to 2016. He returned to the board in 2020 and running to retain his seat. Mr. Chew is new to the SB, but not to town government. He serves on the Finance Committee and is involved in other volunteer activities in the town. Mr. Chew's signatures had not been certified by press time.

The School Committee has two seats up for election. Incumbent Ronald Houde, Jr. has returned papers to retain his seat. Melissa Cordeira and Ebony McGlynn have also returned papers for that committee.

No other races are contested.

The election is on Saturday, 5/13.

The last day to take out papers has passed. The last day to return papers is Friday, 3/24. The last day to withdraw a nomination is 4/11, so the names on the ballot are not yet final.

Town Clerk Pamela Labonte has taken out papers for her seat, but as of press time she had not returned them.

Other races include: Moderator, with incumbent Leslie Dakin running for re-election; Board of Assessors, with new candidate Robert Brown not yet returning his papers; Board of Health, with incumbent Robert Medeiros running for this seat; Library Trustee, with incumbent Joan Howland running for her seat*; Cemetery Board, with Joanne Cioper running for re-election; Park Commissioner, with incumbent Michael Matton not yet returning his papers; Planning Commissioner, with incumbent Bryan Deschamps not yet returning his papers; Planning Commissioner unexpired term with candidate Steven Boucher not yet returning papers; Tree Warden, with incumbent Norman Fredette running

for re-election.

Commissioner of Trust Funds has two vacant seats with no one taking out papers for them;






