Fairhaven is not only town looking for Prop 2 1/2 override

Fairhaven Town Officials are asking Town Meeting to approve a budget with a \$450,000 deficit, which means voters will have to approve a Proposition 2 1/2 override in a townwide ballot. The Select Board is proposing two budgets for Town Meeting on 5/6. And the Finance Committee also submitted a budget.

The SB recommended budget which is contingent upon the override passing, is \$58,086,901 and will not require any cuts in service. The "non contingent" budget cuts \$450,000 from the recommended budget. It includes a \$200,000 cut to the School Department; and cuts \$250,000 from salary reserves, which is used for raises and promotions for non-union employees. The original plan had been to take \$150K from salary reserves and cut two of the four new firefighters, but the firefighter positions are restored.

The FinCom budget spreads out the cuts, but still takes \$200K from the schools and \$208,605 from salary reserves, and the rest from public works and tree department.

The cuts to the salary reserves mean that some promotions in the works will not happen, such as an upgrade for the Town Hall Custodian to become a Facilities Manager responsible for all town buildings (except schools), not just town hall.

Ms. Ellison said the deficit is actually \$750,000, but the town took \$300,000 from Other Post Employment Benefits (OPEB), to lessen the blow to taxpayers. OPEB is a retirement obligation the town has to the state. It is not fully funded, but at some point, it will have to be.

The town also could use free cash to fund OPEB, but instead used that, along with money from the capital stabilization fund, to pay for the middle school roof. The other option was to borrow the money, which still would have required a Prop 2 1/2 debt exclusion override. The debt exclusion is just for the life of the loan. The operational override is permanent.

Fairhaven is not alone in needing an override this year. A variety of factors has led to the problem throughout Massachusetts. In municipality after municipality that is asking for overrides, the mantra is the same: fixed costs, such as union raises have grown faster than recurring revenue (taxes and fees). Proposition 2 1/2 limits how much cities and towns can raise in property taxes (the tax levy).

Add to that steep inflation and the residual effects of the pandemic, and the financial situation is dire.

Taxpayers may simply say "no" and tell the town to live within its means. But that is only realistic to a point. The town cannot simply decide not to provide services, nor can it simply find a second job or get creative to raise revenue.

Revenue comes from three main sources: State aid, property taxes, and fees from building permits, excise taxes, etc. Fairhaven has raised fees, which should help somewhat for next year, but does not solve this year's problem. Property taxes are constrained by the limits of Prop 2 1/2. And state aid is decided by Beacon Hill

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
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Fairhaven announces town-wide water flushing

Press Release

Commencing May 1, 2023, The Fairhaven Board of Public Works will begin a town-wide unidirectional water flushing of hydrants.

As we have mentioned before, the process of unidirectional flushing fire hydrants is an important preventive maintenance activity which will scour the inside of the pipeline, removing and then transporting silt and mineral deposits out of the water system. These procedures are necessary to maintain the integrity of the water system.

During the flushing process, it is not uncommon for a yellow, brown or reddish tint to appear in the water. These harmless mineral deposits settle in the water mains and flushing fire hydrants stir these deposits, sometimes causing a brief discoloration of the water.

The BPW will send out a location specific Rave notice when flushing will occur in your area. In addition, we will continually update our social media and website.

Here is what you should do if hydrant flushing is taking place in your neighborhood:

• If possible, avoid using water while the hydrant flushing is taking place. By not using water from the tap (cold or hot) or running appliances that use water (dishwashers and washing machines), you can prevent discolored water from entering your household plumbing system altogether.

- If you encounter discolored water following hydrant flushing, run the cold water taps only.
- Do not use hot water taps throughout your home at bathroom sinks, tubs, kitchen faucets, etc. for 5 to 15 minutes, or until water clears.
- By not using your hot water taps, this should prevent discolored water from entering your hot water system. If you do experience discolored water on your hot side
 - Run water closest to your meter which is most likely outside
 - Call the Water Department at 508-979-4032
 - Do not dry or use bleach on your laundry if discolored
 - Use an Iron-Out product to remove stains

Exercise TigerThe City of New Bedford Veterans'

The City of New Bedford Veterans' Advisory Board will honor the 749 United States sailors and soldiers who lost their lives during the devastating April 28, 1944 attack on the United States military training operation, Exercise Tiger.

Exercise Tiger was a D-Day dry run that was ambushed by a German E-boat flotilla and resulted in America's costliest incident of World War II, second only to Pearl Harbor. The surprise attack sank two American vessels and severely damaged a third. This year marks the 79th anniversary of Exercise Tiger.

A memorial ceremony is planned to honor the service members who perished in this incident on Sat., 4/9, 1:00 p.m. at the Exercise Tiger Memorial at Fort Taber Park, 1000 Rodney French Boulevard in New Bedford. In case of inclement weather, the indoor ceremony will be held inside the Fort Taber Military Museum, also located at Fort Taber Park immediately adjacent to the Exercise Tiger Memorial.

The ceremony will include remarks by Mayor Jon Mitchell and guest speakers from the New Bedford Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps. Families of the late Louis Souza, Vincent Ricciardi, and William O'Connor, Exercise Tiger participants, will be recognized. Presenting the memorial wreath will be the family of PFC Justin Kirby. PFC Kirby was a native of New Bedford who was killed in a vehicle accident while conducting a large-scale military training exercise at Fort Irwin National Training Center in California on March 9, 2020. PFC Kirby was assigned to the Regimental Headquarters and Regimental support

squadron, 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment at Fort Irwin.

Additional participants will include the United States Army Brotherhood of Tankers, WWII reenactors, and local veterans' organizations. All veterans are invited to attend and are asked to proudly display their service insignia.

Taco Pie

- 1 (8 ounce) package refrigerated crescent rolls
- 1 pound ground beef
- 1 (1 ounce) package taco seasoning mix
- 8 ounces shredded Mexican-style cheese blend
- Optional toppings: sour cream, shredded lettuce, diced tomatoes, green onions, avocado, olives

Set oven to 350°

Cover your round or square cake pan with the crescent dough flat on the bottom. Bake according to package instructions.

While your crust is baking in the oven, heat a large skillet over medium-high heat on the stovetop. Cook the beef until no longer pink. Add the taco seasoning and combine. When the crust is done baking, add the beef to the crust and layer with cheese. Place back in the oven and bake for another 10 minutes or until the cheese is melted.

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

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What is This Override Request All About?

To Fairhaven Town Meeting members and Taxpayers

On May 6th, Town Meeting will convene to determine the fiscal future for the Town, at least for the near term. Although I have not yet seen the agenda for the Meeting, it should be obvious to all that the most important Article to be dealt with is the "2 1/2 override" Article. A "pass/fail" will dictate whether a special town-wide election will be held on this issue.

Relative to this Article, a number of very important questions should be asked and answered before votes are taken.

- How long has the Town known about this shortfall?
- When did we become aware of the shortfall and were there any warning signs?
- Wasn't the Town aware that we had contract raises that had to be met? Doesn't the Town account for those contractual obligations each year along with anticipated cost of living increases?

From our readers

- If the Article fails and budget cuts need to be made, what is the working rationale for the proposed cuts.....what departments are likely to sustain cuts and by what amount?
- As to the use of "free cash" to support ongoing operating expenses. Were the "powers that be" aware that this was going on? Did Town Meeting have any role in approving this action? Was there oversight?

These are basic questions that Town Meeting deserves to have answered before votes are cast.

Some resolutions to the problem have been proffered i.e., a vote for or against department budget cuts, use monies put aside for the possible Fire/Police safety complex. As to the "put aside", who knew? I personally was unaware that the town has been "putting aside" any money per se for this matter and suspect that the majority of taxpayers were also unaware that this was being done.

I would strongly recommend that Town Meeting members thoroughly understand all the important ramifications of this matter

Keep in mind inflation is still with us and shows little sign of abating. Our citizenry is getting older, many of whom are on fixed incomes, and our young families are trying hard to make ends meet. Unfortunately, increased taxes regardless of how seemingly small do nothing to ease this reality. They only create an added burden.

Looking to an override for operating expenses is a slippery slope. Give this matter your utmost consideration prior to voting and let us insist on establishing safeguards to prevent this issue from reoccurring.



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No charges against man with BB gun on bike path

Fairhaven Police responded to reports of an armed male on the Phoenix Bike Trail on Friday, 4/21/23, around 4 p.m. It turned out the man had a BB gun pistol and was in emotional distress.

Fairhaven Police spokesperson Lt. Kevin Kobza said the man called 911 and told police he would point his gun at them so they would shoot him.

An officer kept the man on the phone and convinced him to put the

gun down and go to an open field. Fairhaven police used a drone to locate the man in the woods along the bike path near Shaw Road.

Lt. Kobza said the man followed the drone out of the woods to meet police. He told them it was only a BB gun and took them back into the woods where it was recovered.

"We didn't rush in, we waited him out," said Lt. Kobza. "We had someone to reason with him and get him to comply. He cooperated."

He said the man is 34 years old and

from another state. His ties to the area are unclear.

Lt. Kobza said no charges are being filed, so he did not want to identify the man, who was taken to St. Luke's Hospital.

"It was a good outcome," said Lt. Kobza.

Mattapoisett Police assisted during the incident. The Phoenix Bike Trail connects to the Mattapoisett Rail Trail, and Shaw Road is very close to the Mattapoisett town line.

body," said Town Administrator Angie Lopes Ellison. "Everything municipal government does, impacts someone, some group. So you can't just say cut this, or cut that."

Fairhaven is not alone. Newton tried for a \$9,175,000 override, but it failed in the election, although voters approved two debt exclusions for school construction. The schools there have a \$6 million operating budget gap.

The town of Dudley passed a \$4,846,597 override for operational expenses for the school district and the town; Marblehead is looking for \$2 million to \$2.5 million; Hingham is looking for \$7,890,467; Brookline is looking for \$4,995,000; Athol is looking for \$895K.

Closer to home, Mattapoisett is asking for an override for a bond issue to pay for road costs, although no amount is specified on the ballot.

The upshot is that most cities and towns are having structural deficits. That occurs when recurring revenues are not enough to cover recurring costs. Some municipalities, including Fairhaven, have used one-tim money, such as free cash, to bridge the gap. But that strategy eventually fails. And that seems to be where many towns are this year.

The election for the override is scheduled for June 5.
