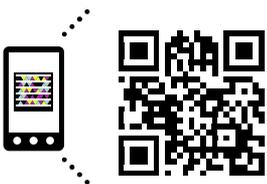

Select Board discusses police details for OLOA feast

The Fairhaven Select Board spent a bit more time than usual at its 7/17/23 meeting discussing police details for Our Lady of Angels Feast, which will be held at the OLOA feast grounds September 2-4.

Lt. David Sobral of the Fairhaven Police Department told the SB that he felt there needed to be two more police officers on the paid detail during certain hours of the feast. He said the last two years, especially last year, there had been problems with younger feast-goers spreading out into the neighborhood and causing a nuisance. Lt. Sobral said if they had two more police officers, they would be able to walk farther away from the gates to keep the troublemakers from loitering in front of houses.

Lt. Sobral said the two officers would be able to walk along Jesse and Daniel Streets at night. One problem is people driving around the barriers and parking in front of driveways.

Lt. Sobral said they are not looking to stop the feast in any way, but it is in a residential area, and residents have a right to access their homes. They should have protection, too, he said, noting that most neighbors are "pretty cooperative" and like the feast.

If people do block driveways, they can be ticketed or towed, but if an officer is there, it should alleviate the problem, he said.

Neighbors have parties, too, noted Lt. Sobral, it is a "highly traveled area" during the feast.

John Barboza, president of OLOA, said it was not just parking, it is kids "hanging around the street."

Mr. Barboza said the problem is

that the officers working the feast are not Fairhaven officers and they are not doing what they should be doing. He said they all stay at the gate and do not walk the grounds or the surrounding area.

"Why should I be responsible for something that's not on the feast grounds," said Mr. Barboza, adding he does not mind so much paying for one more officer, but two is a high cost. "It's just taking money away from these charitable donations."

SB member Keith Silvia said it

seemed to be escalating a little bit more each year. The people who complained to him, he said, did not want to stop the feast, they just wanted more police presence.

Mr. Barboza countered that he would be paying for two more police officers to stand around at the gate "with the other guys."

He said he cannot make them do anything.

Lt. Sobral said he worked the feast one day last year and it was a mix of Fairhaven officers and outside officers. He said he told them what to do, but he could not be there the

whole time. They try to get local officers, he said, but it is not always possible.

Town Administrator Angie Lopes Ellison suggested coordinating a meeting with the detail officers to tell them what they should be doing.

In the end the board voted to require the additional officers during the hours that Lt. Sobral requested.

SB member Charlie Murphy recused himself from the vote because he is an officer of OLOA.

In another matter, the board set a Special Town Meeting date of 11/14

Public Works Superintendent Vinnie Furtado said the cost of the upgrade to the Wastewater Treatment plant is significantly higher than the original estimate of the \$50 million that Town Meeting already appropriated. Due to new federal regulations, the town needs to upgrade the plant by December of 2025.

Mr. Furtado said he will ask TM for an additional \$20 million.

He also said that the town has about \$5 million in loan forgiveness; and Mattapoisett, which owns about 20% of the plant will pay a share; and ARPA

funds will also be used for some. In the end, the town will not use the whole \$70 million he is looking for.

Ms. Ellison explained to the board that Mass. General Law does not allow for the town to enter into a contract unless all the funds are there.

The lowest bid was \$62 million, said Mr. Furtado, adding that he expected costs to go up even more due to inflation and the Build America Buy America Act. He said he expected a 10-40% increase.

The item will be on the warrant of the STM in November.

Fairhaven Police received multiple 911 calls at about 11:05 a.m. on Monday, 7/31/23, stating that a male had shot himself and was not breathing, at Fort Phoenix, near the cannons.

According to FPD spokesperson Lt. Kevin Kobza, police responded and found the injured male and a female who was not injured.

Lt. Kobza said the man was taken to St. Luke's Hospital where he was pronounced dead.

The man, who had just turned 21 a few days before and lived in New Bedford, has not been identified.

It was a beautiful day at the fort, so there were many people who heard the shot.

Recipe of the Week Freezer-Friendly Homemade Garlic Bread

You can freeze this bread before you bake it or after baking.

- 8 tbsp salt butter softened
- 1 1/2 tbsp granulated garlic powder or finely minced fresh garlic (more or less to taste)
- 1/2 tsp dried parsley (Optional: basil, oregano, dash red pepper)
- 1/2 cup grated parmesan cheese
- 1 cup shredded mozzarella cheese
- 1 loaf of Italian bread 14 ounce (French bread, baguette, sourdough...any bread you want)

Pre-heat oven to 375°. Line baking sheet with parchment paper; set aside. Slice bread loaf in half, lengthwise.

In a bowl, combine the softened butter, garlic powder, parsley, parmesan cheese, and mozzarella cheese. Mx well.

Spread mixture evenly on each slice of bread. Bake in the pre-heated oven for 10-12 mins until golden brown and cheese is melted.

PJ Keating hosts Christmas in July

PJ Keating treated a few vanloads of senior to a tour of the quarry, including the famed “lookout” area, a BBQ, and some time with Santa to celebrate Christmas in July on 7/27/23. PJK teamed up with the Acushnet Council on Aging to transport people from the senior center to PJK’s lookout at the quarry.

Then everyone went to the front of the property for a cookout.

Santa was there handing out gifts, including a gift bag with fun stuff. Everyone who wanted one got a bright yellow/green safety vest, too.

Sarah Fitzgerald narrated the tour, telling participants that the hole is two miles long by one mile wide and is 400 feet deep. It has 35 feet of water in it, now, she said, because the quarry is not being mined while the town and PJK work out the details of the permit. Usually, she said, the company will pump out the water as

they mine the hole.

Ms. Fitzgerald said the hole has been mined for 120 years, although not as PJ Keating for all that time.

They have pictures, she said of donkeys being used in those early years.

“It’s pretty cool,” she said. “Really impressive.”

Rick Pavao, the manager for the south area, pointed out the different levels along the quarry walls.

The company recently moved the asphalt plant to the front of the property, a controversial move that still does not sit well with residential neighbors, so it can mine to the east.

Mr. Pavao said they have gone as deep as they can go, now they need to widen/lengthen the hole.

The van rode by the different bins with different size stones, from sand to larger rocks, that are created from the material mined from the quarry.

Joanne Thibodeau said she remembers playing near the quarry as a kid,

and ice skating in a field alongside the property.

Paul Lecuyer said he joined the tour because he had never been inside, and he is a neighbor. He looked it up on Google Earth.

“It’s not the same,” said Mr. Lecuyer. “It’s a lot bigger than it looks in the pictures.”

As a neighbor, he said, “I’m not pleased with the quarry.”

He said the dust is the biggest problem, more than the noise, and he is not looking forward to its re-opening.

“The main thing is the asphalt plant so close,” said Mr. Lecuyer.

The idea for the day started in the winter, when PJK teamed up with the COA for a holiday event. Mr. Pavao said they have more events around the holidays and decided they should do something “in the middle.”

“So, we made it into a thing,” he said.

Fairhaven PD rolls out Blue Envelope program

The program alerts officers that an autistic driver or passenger is in the car

The Fairhaven Police Department rolled out a new program at the town's DisABILITY Pride Event on Sunday, 7/30/23.

"The Department has launched a Blue Envelope program to help us better/safer serve people with autism," PD spokesperson Lt. Kevin Kobza.

The envelopes are designed to be used to hold vehicle paperwork, such as the vehicle's registration. In the event that an autistic vehicle operator, or autistic passenger in the vehicle encounters police during a vehicle stop, MVA, or DMV, when they are asked for their paperwork, it will be in an immediately identifiable blue envelope.

The purpose of using the blue envelope is to alert the Officer that someone in the vehicle is on the autism spectrum. That way if they are exhibiting abnormal behavior, or poor social skills, it is most likely a result of their autistic condition as opposed to being furtive, aggressive


or otherwise suspicious.

"An autistic person can sometimes be triggered into an episode by flashing lights, loud noises, sirens, etc.," said Lt. Kobza. "The front of the envelope has a list of instructions for the autistic person, and the back of the envelope has important information for the Officer."

Contact information cards also have helpful information to make the encounter easier for both the officer and the drivers and passengers.

The program was unveiled at the DisABILITY Pride event and was "received by the public with great enthusiasm," said Lt. Kobza.

The department has already started disseminating the envelopes to the public, and they are available in the Fairhaven Police station lobby.


