Fairhaven introduces new town planner

Fairhaven Town Administrator Angie Lopes Ellison formally introduced the town's new Director of Planning and Economic Development, Paul DiGiuseppe, at the Select Board meeting on 8/21/23.

Ms. Ellison said he has "many, many years of planning and economic development."

He comes to Fairhaven from Middleborough, where he was Director of Economic and Community Development. He has also worked in the planning departments in Norton, Mass.; Austin, TX; and Tallahassee, FL

Mr. DiGiuseppe said it was a honor to be there and appreciated being in Fairhaven. As of that evening, he had been on the job for one week, and people have been "so friendly," he said.

He has been "exploring," he said. "This is as good as it gets."

Mr. DiGiuseppe told the board he was looking forward to working with the small businesses in town, looking at the Route 6 study, 40R zoning ideas, and at areas that could see redevelopment.

He noted there is not much vacant land in Fairhaven, but he had some ideas on how to get some of the vacant commercial spaces in town occupied by businesses again.

He emphasized that it was important to build personal relationships with people.

Ms. Ellison also made a point of thanking Cathy Melanson, chairperson of the Planning Board, who stepped in to help while the planner position was vacant.

"She cleaned up that office to the point that a new planner is in a good

spot," said Ms. Ellison, adding that Ms. Melanson "kept that department afloat."

"Well, I'm not done yet," said Ms. Melanson via Zoom.

The board also discussed a change in how emails to the board are processed. For awhile, SB office staff were answering emails or the chairperson would answer emails addressed to the whole board. SB member Bob Espindola had asked that any emails to the board's general email address on the website be forwarded to all board members.

Ms. Ellison said she wanted to go back to the way it was because the current process was "cumbersome."

She said she "literally" has no sense of how emails area being managed. Emails get forwarded to her and she has no idea what they are about.

Ms. Ellison said any emails that go to the general SB email should go to her office and staff will have the board on the distribution list.

Mr. Espindola said he would agree with a change, but did not want it to go back to the way it was when he was not receiving emails. He said if an email is meant for the board, it should

go to the board members.

SB chairperson Leon Correy said the office would respond and the board would get a copy of the email.

Ms. Espindola said he wanted it to be clear that the answer was coming from the TA's office and not the board.

SB member Stasia Powers said she did not believe individual board members should be restricted from responding.

Ms. Ellison made the distinction of an individual answering an email to him or her vs. a member answering for the board as a whole.

That is an important distinction, said Mr. Espindola, but wanted to make sure it was clear on any emails sent.

The board voted for the change.

The board also discussed a change to the name and charge of the Bikeway Committee.

Committee member Will Gardner told the board the committee's scope has changed.

"We're not just about the bike path," he said. "We are about promoting alternative transportation."

The proposed name is Fairhaven Livable Streets Committee.

Although board members general supported the idea, the details got them bogged down a bit.

Ms. Ellison said she was concerned that the propsoed change was too broad. It might interfere with the work of other committees and departments.

The board decided to table the item so Mr. Gardner can meet with the town planner to decide on language that would expand the scope of the committee's work without complicating matters for other departments.

Old Stone Schoolhouse

After a brief hiatus, The Old Stone Schoolhouse, located at 40 North Street in Fairhaven, MA, will reopen to the public on select Saturdays through the rest of 2023. Opening hours will be 10:00 am to 1:00 pm on the following dates: September 2nd, 16th, and 30th; October 21st, November 4th & 18th, and December 2nd, 2023.

“We are extremely pleased to be able to once again open The Old Stone Schoolhouse to the public,” said Michael Kelly, a member of the Fairhaven Historical Commission. “This is a hidden gem that made a remarkable contribution to the history of the region, and we look forward to welcoming visitors from near and far.”

The Old Stone Schoolhouse is a one-room schoolhouse built in 1828 at a cost of \$520.01, and served as the first public School in Fairhaven, operating until 1896 when the nearby, and much larger, Oxford School opened.

Manjiro Nakahama, a fourteen-year-old Japanese boy who was rescued by a New Bedford whaleship after being shipwrecked on a small island in the Pacific Ocean, attended classes at the Old Stone Schoolhouse. Upon returning to Japan many years later, Manjiro Nakahama would play a role in the negotiations between Commodore Matthew Perry and the Empire of Japan.

He was invited by Capt. William Whitfield to obtain his first schooling ever in the USA. The school involved is the

Old Stone School in Fairhaven which is part of the Manjiro Trail.

We of the Whitfield-Manjiro Friendship Society have been hosting visitors from around the world to the Captain's home (now museum) and the Manjiro Trail. Recipe of the Week

Stuffed Cinnamon Rolls

- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 1 tablespoon ground cinnamon
- 1/4 cup butter, melted
- flour, as needed, for dusting a work surface
- 1 can refrigerated crescent dinner rolls
- 8 large marshmallows

For the glaze topping:

- 1/2 cup powdered sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 3 teaspoons milk
- 1/4 cup pecans, chopped

Position a rack to center of oven. Preheat to 375°. Spray a medium-size muffin tin with cooking spray.

In a small bowl, combine the granulated sugar and the cinnamon.

Add the melted butter to another small bowl.

Lightly dust a work surface with the flour. On the floured surface, separate the crescent rolls into 8 triangles. Dip the marshmallows into the butter and then into the sugar mixture, ensuring all sides are coated.

Place 1 of the coated marshmallows onto each of the dough triangles, roll them up and pinch the seams to tightly seal, ensuring the marshmallow is covered.

Roll each of the marshmallow rolls into the butter and then into the cinnamon sugar and place them into the prepared muffin cups.

Bake the rolls until they are golden, about 12-14 minutes. Allow the rolls to cool in the muffin tin for 2 minutes.

Use a butter knife or offset spatula to transfer the rolls onto a cooling rack covered with wax paper and let them cool slightly.

In a bowl, combine powdered sugar, the vanilla, and the milk and beat until the sugar has dissolved.

Transfer the rolls to a serving platter and drizzle them with the glaze. Sprinkle the rolls with the pecans. Serve warm.

Fairhaven filmmaker Alyssa Botelho is starting another project. And with a \$10,000 grant from New Bedford Creative, she's well on her way to making it a reality.

"Sweet Freedom" is a 25 minute film based on local historical figure Mary "Polly" Johnson, a prolific 19th century abolitionist and confectioner from New Bedford. The story follows Polly as she prepares for the largest party of her career while fighting to protect the fugitive slaves in her home.

Ms. Botelho held a "Film Soiree" in the Fairhaven Town Hall auditorium on Friday, 8/25/23, which featured 10 short films, from two minutes long to 24 minutes long.

Admission, snacks, and refreshments were free, and the 50 or so patrons had a chance to buy raffle tickets for a variety of services and products donated by local businesses.

Ms. Botelho said she is co-producing this latest film with a team. In addition to the \$10K from NB Creative, she needs to raise another \$15-20,000. The funds will be used to compensate cast and crew, secure local and historically accurate locations, pay for equipment costs, meals, lodging, etc.

Lionel Jeffries, who is part of the production. He said he expected to see some good films during the night.

His companion, Claire Sorti, said she was not sure what to expect specifically.

"Just a lot of creative people showing off their stuff," she said.

At intermission, Bill Farrell said they were good so far.

"I liked some better than others," he said.

Friends and crew members Elsie, Bianca, Claudia, Kaitlyn, and Emma said they wanted to support the movie and Alyssa.

"I love all of them," said Claudia about the Soiree films.

Barbara Acksen of Fairhaven said she attended to show support to Ms. Botelho and other local talent.

"They're quite good," said Ms. Acksen during

intermission. "Interesting. And I love the dancing," she added, referring to the film "After Closing."

The final film of the evening was Ms. Botelho's last short film, "To Dust All Return," which has won a number of awards. Ms. Botelho is working on a full length film based on the short.

Liam Sivertsen wore his best old-time Hollywood attire, complete with suit and fedora. He won a tour for 10 at Westport Winery in the raffle. A self-described "budding filmmaker," Mr. Sivertsen said he believes the area will have more movies being filmed here.

"This area needs more filmmakers," he said.

"It went very well," said Ms. Botelho at the end of the night. "It's awesome to see the community get together to support local film," she said, adding it helps all local filmmakers.

Ms. Botelho said she has done some traveling related to her film work, and it reinforces that this is a special area, a special community where people want to support the arts.

After the event, Ms. Botelho said they evening raised \$1148.

Acushnet recognizes Purple Heart recipients

The town of Acushnet recognized individual Purple Heart recipients at a ceremony on 8/26/23 at the American Legion in Acushnet. The event was originally planned to take place at the Veterans Memorial, but was moved indoors due to the threat of rain.

American Legion Commander Mike Jenney emceed the proceedings, telling the approximately 30 people there that August 7 is Purple Heart day, created by President George Washington for those killed in action. It was expanded to include anyone injured.

Cmdr. Jenney said without the service of our military, we would not enjoy the freedoms we enjoy today.

Selectboard chairperson Kevin Gaspar kept it short, saying he was honored to be there.

"Thank you very much for your service and your sacrifice to our country," said Mr. Gaspar.

Veteran Bill Kligel said the coin being presented was presented in the field, so there is a secretive way to hand it over. He said the presenter would put his thumb over the coin so no one could see it if they were watching from afar, and then he would shake hands with the recipient, who would take the coin, drop it in



his pocket and then salute.

He presented the coins in that manner to the Purple Heart recipients in the room including Roger Fredette, Mike Janson, and Patrick Robitaille.

Cmdr Jenney admitted they did not even know the number of Purple Heart recipients in Acushnet.

"We're asking for information from the public," said Cmdr. Jenney, adding he did not want anyone to be forgotten.

"Veterans take care of veterans," said Mr. Kligel, encouraging anyone who knows a Purple Heart recipient to let them know, even if they are not Acushnet residents.

"We are all brothers and sisters of

the same cause," said Mr. Kligel. "Let's not forget each other."

Gil Mastera, a veteran who drove from New Hampshire to be there, reminded everyone that 22 veterans a day die by suicide.

Deven Robitaille, the commander at the Acushnet VFW said she loved hearing about traditions she did not know about.

"I hear your traditions," she said to the older veterans in the room. "It is my duty to pass on your traditions."

She said 22 veterans is too much.

Louise Quintin, who is a Gold Star sister, said her brother was killed in Vietnam, so she was there for him.

"If he wasn't killed in Vietnam, he'd be here," she said.

Rick Janson, who received a coin, said it "means a helluva lot to me."


"Huge thank you to Leon Correy for Fairhaven Select Board, and all of the sponsors for today's event!" wrote the

He served in Operation Desert Shield from 1990 to 1991, a peace-keeping mission in Bosnia from 2000 to 2001, and Operation Iraqi Freedom from 2003 to 2004. Mr. Lawrence has served the community as a New Bedford police officer for over 20 years.

with college sports teams, creating a long-term, life-changing experience for everyone involved.




