When he was using the fire department hose to cool down the kids, I made a reference to the 1960s and Black protesters getting knocked down by fire hoses by police. In my mind it was a we've-come-a-long-way moment.

It was not. It was beyond insensitive.

Leon's wife sent me an email a couple of weeks later, and I was mortified to the point of nausea. I could not understand how I could be so insensitive and, plainly, stupid. She didn't ask for a public apology or I would have done that. I should have done that anyway. It's been bubbling under the surface and that serves no one.

In my answer to her, I promised to self reflect, and I have been doing that.

I still do not understand how I could be so blind to how hurtful the comment would be. The word "apology" falls woefully short.

All I can do is try to be better.

I will read the book, "White Fragility," that our Town Administrator recomended. And I will do my best to recognize my own biases and, simply, to get better.

The Fallen Warrior Memorial will be in New Bedford, and there will be a special ceremony for Fairhaven native Marine Lance Cpl. Matthew R. Rodriguez on the 10th anniversary of his death in Afghanistan, on Monday, 12/11 at 3 p.m. at the airport. See page 4 or details. Young Matthew, just 19 at the time of his death, was known as the smiling warrior because of his infectious smile. If you can make it on Monday, please do. It's only in New Bedford, for a native son.

We also have some meeting coverage for you. See page 4 for Select Board.

Juvenile in Custody for Concealed Firearm

Lt. Kevin Kobza reports that the Fairhaven Police Department has taken a juvenile into custody after police discovered he was carrying a concealed firearm inside the Seaport Inn.

The juvenile, age 17, of New Bedford, was taken into custody and charged with: Misleading Police, Resisting Arrest, Unlawful Possession of a Firearm.

On Saturday, Dec. 2, at around 8 p.m., Fairhaven police officers responded to the Seaport Inn looking for a suspect in an unrelated attempted break-in case when they observed a male juvenile concealing a firearm in his waistband on surveillance cameras.

When officers confronted the juvenile, he fled on foot from the Seaport Inn. He was taken into custody a short distance away without incident.

Police located what is believed to be the concealed firearm, a loaded handgun, in the same hotel room where police had confronted the juvenile.

The male, who was identified as a 17-year-old juvenile, was later turned over to the Department of Youth Services. His name will not be released due to his age.

FPD Seeking Individual Who Fled

Lt. Kevin Kobza reports that the Fairhaven Police Department is seeking to locate an individual who was attempting to gain entry into a residence before fleeing from police last weekend.

On Saturday, Dec. 2, at approximately 6 p.m., Fairhaven officers were called to a residence on James Street by a homeowner who reported an unknown person approaching their house.

An unidentified individual was captured on a surveillance camera attempting to gain entry into the same residence five days prior, prompting the homeowner to quickly notify police.

As Fairhaven officers approached

the scene, the individual fled on foot and managed to avoid being captured.

Just over an hour later, police observed a vehicle picking up an individual who was on foot in the same vicinity as the residence. The vehicle drove a short distance before the two occupants switched seats.


When police attempted to stop the vehicle, it fled from the area. The vehicle was located a short time later on Francis Street, just south of Bridge Street. The operator, later identified as 23 year-old Bryce Williams-Devlin, who is known to police, fled on foot and was unable to be located. His last known address is 1049 Pleasant St., New Bedford.

Fairhaven Police asks that anyone who may have information on Williams-Devlin's whereabouts to contact the Department at 508-997-7421.

Charges against William-Devlin are still pending, and the case remains under active investigation by the Fairhaven Police Department.







Fairhaven sets tax rate for FY24; fines NFIA for shed

Patrick Carr and Andrew Romano were again on opposite sides of an issue at the Select Board meeting on 12/4/23. Mr. Romano represented the North Fairhaven Improvement Association asking for leniency over a shed that was built on the town property that the organization uses in Benoit Square. The NFIA did not get permission from the town. They got a permit for the electrical work, but did not get a permit for the shed itself.

Mr. Romano told the board that they got incomplete information, but it was unclear if it was from a member's mistake, or an error by the previous building commissioner.

Current Building Commissioner Randy Bassett told the board that they could have the shed removed, or they could fine the group. He said under normal circumstances at a residence, it would be a \$100 fine, but because the town is the owner of the property, it is more complicated.

SB Chair Leon Correy said it was "part of the ongoing culture" in Fairhaven for some organizations to get away these kinds of actions.

Town Administrator Angie Lopes Ellison noted that two parking spaces were lost due to the shed. She said Town Counsel needs to work with the board and the nonprofits that seem to think they have rights to municipal property.

Mr. Romano said it was a grassy area and was not used for parking

Mr. Correy told Mr. Romano it was not personal, and he asked for a motion to remove the shed from the property.

SB member Keith Silvia made the motion, but there was no second.

"Okay," said Mr. Correy. "I'm not surprised."

Discussion revolved around parking, the lack of following proper procedure, and the historical status of the property.

Mr. Carr said it had nothing to do with what the NFIA stands for.

"It's procedure," he said, adding there is a "whole list" of things that need to be done before a shed can be built. "This is

town property and historical property."

He said anyone knows they need to go before the board.

"This isn't like, oops," said Mr. Carr, adding they knew what they were doing, decided to put the shed there and then ask for forgiveness.

He said if anybody else in town did it, they would be instructed to take the shed down.

"This needs to be corrected," said Mr. Carr.

Brian Messer said he believed the building is used by the Fire Department in emergencies, and asked if the fire chief had been consulted.

The board discussed some details around the parking in that spot. Mr. Romano said they still have four spots behind the building; the but the side was not used for parking.

Ms. Ellison also asked who owns the shed? If it is on private property, there is no question. So is it a town shed that the NFIA can use?

"They should pay us," said Mr. Correy.
"That can be part of it," said Ms.
Powers, noting that it was a grassy area,
not parking and not accessible from the
street.

Mr. Silvia said the spots were there and now they are not.

Mr. Correy said it bothered him that the target moves a lot based on personal preference.

Mr. Romano said they got bad information. They thought they had followed procedure.

SB member Bob Espindola agreed with the procedure argument, but said he did not see a problem with the project itself. He said maybe they can work out some sort of lease agreement.

SB member Stasia Powers said she felt they NFIA had done some "self reflection," and the town is going to look at its processes, too. She said she was disappointed they were put in the situation, but the NFIA does great work for the community, so if they can work out something to keep it from happening again, they should.

Mr. Correy said that Mr. Bassett was talking about a situation of building on their own property, but if a resident had "crossed the line" and built on their neighbor's property, it would be different.

"This is not their property," said Mr. Correy. "It's on our property."

"In this town, it's always easier to ask forgiveness," said Mr. Silvia.

Ms. Powers added that they should have a lease negotiated that includes clarity on who owns the shed.

"We were never under the impression that we owned the shed," said Mr. Romano.

Ann Richard asked if there was a complaint and if it was a direct neighbor, wondering why it has come up now. Ms. Ellison said they do not disclose complaints.

The shed has been in place since early summer.

"One thing I think the board is forgetting," reiterated Mr. Carr. "This is historical property."

He said there are processes to go through that include the state, when building on historical properties. He said he did not understand how it could be allowed to happen.

In the end Mr. Espindola made a motion to alow the shed to remain in place and to fine the NFIA \$100, if the Fire Chief is okay with the shed remaining there, and the town does research on the historical requirements. Ms. Powers seconded the motion. The vote was 3–2, with Mr. Correy and Mr.Silvia voting "no."

The board also voted to keep the tax rate shift at 1.75%, which means that commercial properties and businesses pay more than residential homeowners. The new tax rates are \$9.23 for residential; \$18.37 for businesses. Last year's tax rates were \$9.95 and 18.78. But with the increase in property values, the average homeowner will still see an increase. The rate is per thousand of value. For example, if a house is assessed at \$300,000 the total taxes would be \$2,769 (300 x \$9.23).

Remembering Our Fallen is a traveling photographic memorial that honors our country's Fallen from the War on Terror (9/11/2001–8/30/2021). The memorial includes both military and personal photos.

The memorial will be on display and open to the public on Sun., 12/10 from Noon to 6 p.m.; Mon., 12/11,

from 9–6 p.m., with a special ceremony honoring Fairhaven native Matthew R. Rodiguez, who was killed in action on 12/11/13; Tues., 12/12 from 9 a.m. to noon.

The special ceremony for LCPL Rodriguez will be held on his anniversary date, Mon., 12/11, at 3 p.m.

Old-Time Holiday this weekend

Old-Time Holiday

Get into the spirit of the holidays and find an array of holiday gifts, food, music, and old-fashioned good cheer by visiting Fairhaven on Saturday, 12/9, for the annual Old-Time Holiday in the historical town center. Over the years it has become one of Fairhaven's favorite events.

Twenty-five years ago, December 1998, the Fairhaven Office of Tourism first launched what was then called the "Very Victorian Holiday," bringing together about thirty non-profit, school, and church groups to create a weekend filled with old-fashioned holiday events. Previously, independent groups had held fairs. bazaars, concerts. luncheons, sing-alongs, and other activities over the course of several weeks between mid-November and Christmas. What was different in 1998 was that most of those events were moved to a single weekend and promoted as one big, holiday package, wrapped in a Victorian theme, with the public able to walk from location to location in the center town. Tourism Christopher Richard credits Millicent Allen and Helen Radcliffe with first suggesting the idea.

"The idea really caught on," Richard says, "and now people come from quite a distance to attend. We regularly see people visiting from the Cape and Rhode Island for the Old-Time Holiday"

This year, the Old-Time Holiday events will take place during the day and early evening on Saturday, December 9 and also includes a December 10 event the following day.

Craft & Vendor Fairs

On Saturday, both the First Congregational Church, 34 Center Street, and the Unitarian Memorial Church, 102 Green Street, will hold fairs, with church members and

outside vendors displaying a wide variety of items for sale. In a similar vein, a number of the town's non-profit groups and a few commercial vendors will have tables at the Town Hall, 40 Center Street. At these locations you'll find handmade crafts, gifts, holiday greens, delicious baked goods, gift baskets, silent auction items to bid on, and more. In the Town Hall there will also be a few children's activities. All three fairs run from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

The Unitarian Church, a magnificent English-Gothic style "cathedral," will also give guided tours of the sanctuary during the day.

Book Sale & Reindeer Food

At the Millicent Library, 45 Center Street, there will be live music, treats, a book sale and a drop-in craft activity for children. The used book sale will be held in the downstairs auditorium, sponsored by Friends of the Millicent Library. Upstairs in the children's room, kids can stop in from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. to make Reindeer Food for Santa's eight tiny reindeer with Miss Allie. The library will be open during its regular Saturday hours of 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

Santa's Sweet Shop

Also on Saturday is "Santa's Sweet Shop" at the Northeast Maritime Institute, 32 Washington Street. The Institute will team up with Dorothy Cox's Chocolate to bring the building alive with holiday cheer. They will have a hot cocoa bar and chocolates with Dorothy Cox and family, fun crafts, and most importantly.... Santa! Stroll on over, sip some hot cocoa, take a picture with Santa, grab some delicious Dorothy Cox's chocolates and be merry! Santa will be there from 11:00 a m. to 2:00 p.m. for pictures.

Lunch

As lunch time rolls around, food will be available at three locations. A

lobster roll luncheon will be held at the First Congregational Church. The Cove Surf and Turf restaurant will be catering the luncheon, and all proceeds will be going to the church. Along with the 1/4 lb. lobster rolls, there will be chowder, stuffed quahogs, and hot dogs. Across the street at the Town Hall, Boy Scout Troop 52 will be set up on the front steps selling hotdogs, and in the Town Hall Banquet Room the North Fairhaven Improvement Association will serve hot soups, meat pies, spinach pies, soda and water. There will also be popcorn available from the Fairhaven Village Militia. And at the Harrop Center of the Unitarian Memorial Church, there will be a Soup and Sandwich Luncheon from 11:30 to 2:00 p.m.

Sing-Along

At 6:00 p.m. on Saturday, the day will wrap up when the Fairhaven Improvement Association hosts its annual Sing-Along on the steps of Town Hall. There will be caroling and the arrival of Santa on a fire engine. Then hot chocolate and snacks will be available inside in the auditorium.

Youth Vendor Fair

On Sunday, December 10, a new event will be held. There will be a Youth Vendor Fair at the Fairhaven Recreation Center, 227 Huttleston Ave., Route 6, from noon to 4:00 p.m. Kid entrepreneurs up to 18 years old will be setting up shop to offer a variety of items for sale. The event includes Santa's workshop, food, music and more. Admission is free.

The memorial includes 34 Tribute Towers with military and personal photos of almost 5,391 of our nation's military Fallen from 9/11/2001 to 8/30/2021. This memorial was unveiled nationally at the steps of the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, D.C. in late 2017.

Organizers are still asking for help in contacting Gold Star families to

include every single American who has died between 9-11-2001-8/30/2021 in The War on Terror. There is no cost to families. They may visit the web site: www.RememberingOurFallen.org and provide basic information and two photos for their Fallen loved one.

This national memorial also includes Tribute Towers that recognize our servicemen and women who died from training accidents or attacks while stationed stateside or on overseas bases. Those who return from war with the invisible wounds of Post-Traumatic Stress and succumb to suicide are also included to recognize the tragedy of PTS.

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

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
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

Correy says he will not run for re-election due to racism

Nomination papers are now available for all positions in the April 2024 election in Fairhaven.

Select Board Chairperson Leon Correy III has publicly announced that he will not run for reelection because he and his family have had to endure countless racist comments while he has been in office.

In a Facebook post on 10/28, Mr. Correy said he did not call out many acts that were racist as he ran for office or served in office, even when others did.

"There is a man and a family on the other side of the words, threats and insults you so cowardly cast from behind your screen," wrote Mr. Correy. "As you punch away at your keys with passion and anger because 'how dare you try to come in and change our town,' there are people at the other end of those words."

He said the town embraced him until he became a "visible figure."

"The truth is that the town of Fairhaven isn't ready for a person of color to be a visible leader in the town," he wrote.

He also wrote about racist comments aimed at Town Administrator Angie Lopes Ellison.

In a phone interview this week, Mr. Correy said nothing has changed since he made the post on 10/28.

He said some people have reached out and said they understand and respect the decision. Others have expressed "a degree of remorse."

"That's been great," he said, but added that the reality is it has gone

too far.

"The town has a lot of growing to do, but first it has to recognize that it needs to," said Mr. Correy.

He said he was not sure it was worth taking time away from his family, "and then to go through what we've gone through."

"By me saying Fairhaven has an issue with racism is not me saying everyone is a racist," said Mr. Correy. "And that's how people are taking it."

It's just a lack of experience, he said. The town has had women and LGBTQ people in leadership roles, but never leaders of color.

"So it's a crash course."

He also said people have accused him of making it up or having a thin skin

"Being called a n——r in the parking lot is not making it up," said Mr. Correy.

"It's a sad place to be," he said. "I really like Fairhaven. The people of Fairhaven have been great to me."

He added that he has been happy with the things he has been doing, but feels he was not given a chance.

He said no one knew his brother had played in the NFL until he asked him to speak to the Fairhaven High School football team before they went to the Super Bowl last week.

He said it was not something he talked about, but not something he kept secret either.

"Nobody even bothered to get to know me. It would have come up in a conversation of some sort," said Mr. Correy. "I'm actually an interesting person who has lived an interesting life if anyone had bothered to get to know me."

He said he did not mention any names in his post because he did not want it to be about the people who said things.

In his post he said he could pack his bags and move, something he has not decided yet.

"It is certainly something we're thinking about," he said. "It's not out of the question."

There are, of course, other factors involved, including that he has two children.

"The genie is out of the bottle," said Mr. Correy. "Can we actually live a quiet life in town at this point?"

Ms. Ellison said that she, too, has experienced a lot of "simple microaggressions," comments that let her know it's code for her being a person of color. One person joked that they were going to an event she would be at and they would get their KKK cap. Her judgment is questioned: when



she hires someone, will she hire a person of color? When she walks into the room and they tell her they are waiting for the TA, and she has to tell them she is the TA.

"They're expecting someone not looking like me to be the Town Administrator," she said.

Ms. Ellison said she also gets the

"double whammy" of gender in addition to race.

She said people need to be an ally and understand what that means, or tell people where you're coming from.

"You can't claim not to see color when you do," said Ms. Ellison. "And part of my identify is being a person of color."

Ms. Ellison has suggested that people read "White Fragility: Why It's So Hard for White People to Talk About Racism" by Dr. Robin DiAngelo.

"Read the book if you want to know how to be an ally."
