Nomination papers available in Fairhaven

Nomination papers for all townwide elected positions and Town Meeting memmbers are available in Fairhaven.

Candidates seeking to be elected to office need to take out papers from the town clerk's office and return them with the required number of signatures from registered voters.

Town-wide offices require 50 signatures; town meeting requires 10 signatures from the precinct in which you are running.

Call the town clerk's office, 508-979-4023, ext. 3, for more information on how to run for office in Fairhaven.

Select Board has two seats up for election, held by Leon Correy III and Robert "Bob" Espindola; School Committee has two seats up, held by Donna McKenna and Colin Veitch; Board of Health has one seat held by Kevin Gallagher; Commissioner of Trust Funds has one, held by Colleen Silvia; Board of Public Works has two seats, held by Robert "Hoppy" Hobson and Travis Rapoza; Planning Board has two seats up, held by Jeff Lucas and Jessica Fidalgo; Housing

Authority has one seat on the ballot, Anne Silveira.

School Committee will also have one seat for an unexpired term on the ballot, currently held by Nicole Pacheco, who was appointed to fill Kyle Bueno's seat.

Planning Board will also have an

unexpired term to fill, currently held by Diane Tomasett, who was appointed to fill David Braga's seat.

Precincts will also choose their Town Meeting representatives. All six precincts have 23-25 seats up for reelection and several other vacant seats.

Select Board members, Leon Correy and Bob Espindola, and BOH member, Kevin Gallagher, have all announced publicly that they do not intend to run for reelection.

Monday, 1/22/24 is the last day for Town Meeting member incumbents to file written requests for reelection with the town clerk.

The last day to obtain nomination papers is Monday, 2/8/24. The last day to return papers is Monday, 2/12.

You may register to vote Monday–Friday, from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. The last day to register to vote for the town election is Friday, 3/22/24. The Town Clerk's Office will be open from 8:30 a.m. to 8 p.m. on that day.

Mail-in Voter Registration Forms are available at the Town Clerk's Office, the Millicent Library and State and Federal offices. Monday, 3/25, is the last day to submit vote-by-mail applications to the Town Clerk.

The election will be held on Monday, 4/1/24. Polls will be open from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. All six precincts vote at the Fairhaven Recreation Center, 227 Huttleston Ave. (near Stop & Shop).

Store owners advocate for rescinding nip ban

The Fairhaven Select Board heard from several liquor store owners at its meeting on 12/4/23, asking the board to delay implementation of the Nip Ban bylaw that goes into effect on 1/1/24. Town Administrator Angie Lopes Ellison told the board that they do not have the authority to delay the bylaw that was passed at Town Meeting. She said the town can help business owners meet the deadline in a variety of ways, including by being "creative" in selling supplies.

The owners said they have a lot of inventory that they have deeply discounted, but some things just do not sell that quickly.

Mark Riley, who owns two liquor stores in Fairhaven called the Nip Ban a "sneak attack."

He said in Mattapoisett they asked how it would affect businesses before they voted and that is how Fairhaven should have done it.

Mr. Riley said it would take about \$1 million from businesses in town.

He said they will not be able to exhaust their inventory before January 1. For some, he said, it will be nine months. They could not buy less, he said, because they have to buy in bulk to make money.

He said the town asked how removing plastic bags would affect businesses, and they should have done that with the nip ban.

"It was a sneak attack," he said, because they just wanted the ban.

SB Chairperson Leon Correy told Mr. Riley he got off on the "wrong foot" by making accusations. The vote happened in May, he said.

Mr. Riley apologized and said alcohol cannot be bought on consignment. He said if they knew ahead of time, there were options they could have pursued. He said a bill in the state legislature would put a deposit on nips, as with soda cans.

He noted that it was a close vote. If the owners had been given some time to get their information out, he said, it might have gone differently.

He said the owners were asking for two things: first, to delay implementation of the ban; second, to vote again.

"There is a solution besides just banning," he said.

Mr. Correy asked if there was a way to delay it, but Ms. Ellison said Town Counsel had already weighed in and said only Town Meeting can change it. She said enforcement of the ban, was by the police department.

Mr. Riley asked if a violation would go before the SB.

Ann Richard, who is the chairperson of the Sustainability Committee, said she was concerned that they seemed to be discussing the possibility of not enforcing the bylaw.

She said she wanted to be sure that as of January 1, all liquor stores would not be selling nip bottles.

"Yes, that's what she said," said Mr. Correy.

"Just making sure," said Ms. Richard. Later, during the public comment period, another liquor store owner reiterated what Mr. Riley had told the board. He said they were selling at a loss to get rid of inventory, but they needed more time.

"What do we do as a store to take on this loss," he asked. "That's all we really need is more time. Just banning

it just harms the businesses."

Mr. Correy suggested he speak to Ms. Ellison to figure out next steps.

Also during the public comment period, Patrick Carr, an Associate Member of the Zoning Board of Appeals, took the podium to again advocate for the board to reconsider their vote to make Andrew Romano a full time member of the ZBA instead of Mr. Carr.

Mr. Correy reminded him he had two minutes to speak during public comment.

Mr. Carr responded that his comments would take more than two minutes.

"This is important," he said.

He asked SB member Stasia Powers why she recused herself from the vote at the previous meeting.

Ms. Powers said that Mr. Romano

and she both raise funds for the same nonprofit.

Mr. Correy told Mr. Carr that public comment was not supposed to be interactive.

"I need to establish exactly what happened at this meeting," said Mr. Carr and also the June 5 meeting, and that involves Ms. Powers recusal. He asked her if the fundraising was before June 5.

"Am I on trial," asked Ms. Powers.

Mr. Carr said that "these things have to be known."

Mr. Correy and Mr. Carr went back and forth a bit. Mr. Correy told Mr. Carr that he asked to be on the agenda, and he would be on an agenda, not necessarily the next meeting. Mr. Correy said it was a full agenda, noting it was ten o'clock.

"There's a degree of patience," said Mr. Correy. "And there's a degree of like, this entitlement in this town is getting ridiculous."

He said just because someone says so is not how it works.

"If you want it to work that way, then you can run and get on this side," said Mr. Correy. "Otherwise you can just be patient like anybody else who has ever asked to be on the agenda."

He said he had told Mr. Carr he would be on the next agenda.

"I'm not going to lie about that," said Mr. Correy. "You can't come in public comment and start interrogating members of the Select Board. That's not how public comment works."

Mr. Carr said none of that was ever explained to him. He was told he would be on public comment.

"I never told you that," said Mr. Correy.

"You didn't tell me that. You didn't tell me anything," said Mr. Carr, explaining he got an email from staff telling him. "So I'm not here trying to take over your meeting at ten o'clock at night, and I'm patient."

He asked when he could bring it up again.

Mr. Correy said it would be on the agenda at the next meeting.

Mr. Carr is also an elected member of the Planning Board. In his candidate statement in the 3/23/23 issue of the *Neighb News*, Mr. Carr wrote, "Please note, if elected, I will resign my positions on the ZBA and EDC and concentrate solely on the planning board."

Rum Balls

A classic holiday treat. Store in the refrigerator for several days for an even better flavor!

3 cups crushed vanilla wafer cookies

3/4 cup confectioners' sugar 1/4 cup unsweetened cocoa powder

1 1/2 cups finely chopped pecans 1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract

3 tablespoons light corn syrup

1/2 cup spiced rum

In a large bowl, stir together the crushed vanilla wafers, 3/4 cup confectioners' sugar, cocoa, and nuts.

Drizzle in vanilla, corn syrup and rum.

Scoop and shape into 1 inch balls or larger, about two level scoops from a small OXO cookie scoop.

Add small amounts of crushed wafers or more rum as needed to get the perfect texture.

Roll Rum Balls in additional confectioners' sugar, cocoa, sprinkles or whatever strikes your fancy.

Store in an airtight container in the refrigerator for several days to develop the flavor.

I am sure your parents are proud of you, but it doesn't mean they love your brother any less. Good parents understand their children have different strengths and weaknesses.


The Christmas presents from your parents are their way of saying they love you and your brother the same and for who you are. It's time you follow their lead and work on becoming a more compassionate brother.

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

Matthew Rodriguez and other fallen heroes remembered

Marine LCpl Matthew Rodriguez, 19, was killed in Afghanistan on December 11, 2013, ten years ago. His family struggled this year to find a fitting way to mark the milestone. His mother, Lisa, said she saw an email announcing the "Remembering Our Fallen" exhibit would be at Gillette Stadium for the Army/Navy game. She wondered how she could get in to see it. She shot off an email and one thing led to another, and she managed to mobilize her crew to get the exhibit to New Bedford.

They got it together in 3–4 weeks, a monumental task.

The exhibit consists of 33 tribute towers with more than 5390 names of service members who have died since the 911 attacks. It includes those killed in action, those who died later from wounds they sustained in combat, those who died in training accidents, and those who succumbed to post traumatic stress and died from suicide.

Ms. Rodriguez said she called the people who will call anyone and ask for anything: Michael Knabbe and Hank Turgent.

"The rest is pretty much history," she told the crowd at the ceremony on Monday, 12/11, at a hangar at the New Bedford airport, flanked by Marines, fire and police color guards, the Patriot Guard Riders, and amid the tribute towers.

"I'm pretty sure it was Matt who



made sure I saw that email and the gave me courage to ask for something so amazing," she "You see, said. Matt had pretty high standards. One of his favorite sayings was, 'Only the Best.' I think we were all able to deliver that for him today!"

She talked about Matthew a bit: "My Matthew

was beautiful," with his big sparkly blue eyes, infectious smile, big heart, and "a sensitive soul which he tried to hide."

He loved baseball and hockey, history and camping, and being a goofy uncle.

She said he was wise beyond his years and a mechanical wizard.


He often argued just for the sake of arguing, which was infuriating.

"That's when he knew he got you, and then that damn smile would make you laugh," she said.

She told the crowd that Matthew wanted nothing more than to be a Marine and to be deployed, to be the "tip of the spear."

"I do take comfort in knowing that Matthew gave his life doing exactly what he wanted to be doing," said Ms. Rodriguez, adding he chose to serve with "deep thought and understanding, love of country, and a profound pride and purpose."

She said when you lose a child, you grieve not only for them and the hole in your heart, but for the life they did not get to have. His sisters lost their



his chief tormentor."

"And our hearts will always break for Matt's fiancee Julia who had every plan for her future ripped from her at far too young an age," said Ms. Rodriguez.

The best way to honor Matt, she said, is for all to live their lives well.

"Anything less would be an insult to his love for us, and his sacrifice."

A fellow Gold Star mother told her it does not get better, it gets different, she said.

"She was right," said Ms. Rodriguez. "And just different is okay, because to grieve means you loved and you remember. Matthew was so very loved, by so many. He will be forever missed and he will always be remembered. He is our hero."

Others who spoke about Matthew said he was a person of values and integrity.

Fairhaven Select Board member Bob Espindola, who coached Mat-

thew in Little League baseball, and whose niece was engaged to him, said Matthew had values even as a 12year-old.

Even though we appreciate the sacrifice of those who served and died, when it is someone close to you, "It takes on a whole new dimension," said Mr. Espindola.

Whenever the National Anthem is played, he thinks of Matt. The fun fund-raisers they hold and the memorial playground at the airport also serve to remind people of Matt.

He said his parents used to take them to the airport to watch the planes take off, a simple thing. Now, children can use the playground while they do that, and someday they will understand the meaning of the words on the entrance to it.

New Bedford mayor Jon Mitchell said Matthew was the kind of kid any parent would want. He had values and he lived those values.

Matthew was not "required" to be there, said the mayor. We have an all volunteer military. He could have been doing something "far more ordinary."

"But he knew for himself, he had to be there," said Mayor Mitchell, adding Matthew was the kind of person "our country has needed since the founding of the republic."

State Rep. Chris Markey also addressed the crowd, saying he was sorry that this is where the family is and sorry that they have given something that we take for granted every day: our children.

He said the photos in the exhibit show that they are mostly kids. The pictures show them with their cars and doing other fun things.

"May you reflect a lot more on the value of life, on the value of virtue, on the value of goodness, on the value of trustworthiness, on the value of courage," said Rep. Markey. "And the need for all that every day in your life. I hope my kids do that."

Mr. Markey credited Matthew's family and community with helping him become who he was. He said people promoted him, gave him a chance, saw potential in him.

After the ceremony Matthew's brother Adam, 27, said he helped set up the exhibit, taking time to grieve, as always, when he needed to.

"You get through it. You take your time to grieve, when it's done. You say, 'not now, in 10 minutes. I'll cry later. Now I have to get through it," said Adam. "I've gotten good at it over the years."

"I'm all right," said Matthew's niece Katelyn Webber. "These events make me nervous, but I'm always here to support my family. It's always a little hard."

She said walking through the exhibit was not easy.

"It's bittersweet," said Matthew's sister Lauren Webber. "It's hard to believe it's been 10 years. But days like today remind us he'll never be forgotten."

His sacrifice is not in vain, she said, and the family is surrounded by "awesome people who love us and loved him."

"It's a reminder that freedom comes at a cost," said Matthew's sister Lisa Doherty, and these service

members and their families paid that cost

with their lives. "It's a visual reminder of how very lucky we are to live in this country. So awesome."

Gilly Rebello and his son, Troy, made their way through the towers, looking at the names.

Gilly said it was "fantastic. There should be more of it."

He said all the names he had seen had been 19–24 years old.

"You see the names and the faces," said Troy. "It creates a heck of an impact. It's emotional."

Sage, 19, and her mother Tracy also wandered among the towers, looking at the pictures.

They were there to "pay tribute," said Tracy, noting her father was in Korea.

"A lot of kids my age are on there and it's terrifying to see that," said Sage. "It's not right."

"It's very said," said Tracy.

On the website of the exhibit, it says "A Gold Star family's greatest fear is that their Fallen will be forgotten."

The Rodriguez family is determined to make sure that never happens around here.



Acushnet Police contract still not approved by SB

The Acushnet Selectboard met for more than three hours in executive session on 12/5/23, but still failed to agree to the terms worked out by negotiators for the police contract.

Police have been working without a contract for more than two years. SB member David Wojnar was assigned as the board's liaison in the negotiations. At some point, the negotiations went to the labor board which assigned mediators to work out a deal.

The two sides finally agreed to terms and the union has voted to approve the contract.

No details were provided as the board has not voted. It is all still an executive session matter.

Before going into executive session to discuss the contract, SB Chairperson Kevin Gaspar warned everyone in the room that it would be a long time. About 10 members of the police department were at the meeting and planned to wait it out

After about three hours, the board took a break and Mr. Wojnar announced that they were not going to vote on the contract that night. He said they were still going over details and had some questions for the finance department.

The matter will be taken up at a future meeting.

open session, the board discussed the property at 7 Eileen Street. Mr. Gaspar read three letters, one from the building inspector, one from the health agent, and one from the conservation/stormwater agent.

The letters detailed ongoing issues at the property with work being done without permits and possibly wetlands or bordering wetlands.

Conservation/Stormwater Agent Patrick Hannon issued a cease and desist order on 11/21 for work done the on property including filling and grading; any activities in the wetlands or buffer zone; any work at all until wetlands have been delineated.

As we provide children with superhero capes, masks, and bears to help them feel less alone, Friends of Jack also pays for the salary and all associated costs of child life specialists at local hospitals throughout the South Coast and Providence.
