

More scholarships announced

Its scholarship season! Time for students to get some help with the next phase of their education. Here are some opportunities for local students to win scholarships for college and other programs. We have been running updates for the last few weeks, so be sure to check back issues at www.neighbnews.com under archives.

Fairhaven Historical Society

The Enrique Goytizolo Scholarship, awarded by the Fairhaven Historical Society annually, recognizes a Fairhaven-resident graduating high school senior planning to pursue post secondary education at an accredited institution of higher learning. The scholarship, a one-time grant of \$1000, is given in honor of Enrique Goytizolo's dedication to preserving the history of the Town of Fairhaven and his vital role in leading the Fairhaven Historical Society for many years.

Any graduating high school senior who resides in Fairhaven, Massachusetts, and plans to matriculate to an accredited institution of higher learning in the fall is eligible. Applications are available from high school counselors and should be submitted digitally to historialsociety fairhaven@gmail.com.

The application deadline is April 1.

SC Community Foundation

The SouthCoast Community Foundation, the largest provider of scholarships in southeastern Massachusetts, has opened its 2024 online application (https://southcoastcf.org/ receive/apply-for-scholarships/), with a March 1st deadline. Students complete just one application - no FAFSA (Free Application for Student Aid) is required this year - and applicants are automatically matched eligible scholarship with all opportunities. More than 100 scholarships totaling over \$700,000 will be awarded to high school seniors and college students in 2024.

Scholarships include: the Manuel S. Pina Scholarship (up to \$10,000), offered to area students of Cape Verdean descent; the BankFive scholarship (up to \$40,000), open to any college-bound senior in Bristol County, MA and Bristol and Newport Counties, RI; the Lipsky-Whittaker LGBTQ Scholarship (up to \$5,000) for students who identify as LGBTQ+ or have been raised in an LGBTQ+ household; and the Jacobs Family Scholarship (up to \$35,000) for New Bedford students going into science, math or engineering fields.

The Community Foundation is offering a virtual information session on February 13th at 5:30 pm. Students will learn about the application process, what scholarships are available, and how applications are evaluated. Registration is available at southcoastcf.org/scholarships

Fairhaven Select Board hears from department heads

The Fairhaven Select Board heard from several department heads at its meeting on 1/22/24.

Recreation Director, Kelley Ramirez told the board a new staff person started that day, which will allow the department to expand services and outreach.

The winter program has more than 900 participants, a "significant" jump from last year of more than 100.

The Rec Center is currently enrolling for the summer "Kool Kids' program, and they are adding new activities. She said they are hoping to get the kids outside at the local parks this year, where they will be able to offer lunch to the participants and to the community, using the federal lunch program.

The Rec Center averages about 120 people a day, said Ms. Ramirez. They are also renting out the facility for private parties, and are completely booked.

More and more people are becoming aware of the programs they offer, said Mr. Ramirez. Select Board member Bob Espindola asked about revenue from program fees.

Ms. Ramirez said they generally generate about \$200,000 in revenue, which is about half of what they need torun the department.

She said an after school program would boost revenue, and they are trying to restart it.

Council on Aging Director Martha Reed told the board that her department has been successful in getting grants for a variety of programs, including computer literacy for seniors.

Ms. Reed said the grant allowed them to buy touch screens and smart boards, which make it easier for seniors to learn how to use computers.

They also have equipment and software to livestream programs so people who are still hesitant to be in groups can join remotely.

Ms. Reed told the board that the social day program and lunch services are serving up to 80 people each day. They are helping up to 500 different people a month for services.

The department is also aware of other needs and concerns of older residents, such as food insecurity a housing issues.

At the senior center, staff can help people fill out forms for housing authorities other affordable housing complexes, and private listings that accept Section 8 vouchers.


The third major area of concern is transportation. The senior center/ COA takes 170 to 200 people each month to a variety of destinations in town, including medical appointments and shopping.

Fairhaven has an aging population that is giving up their licenses, she said. The center has also arranged to have a safe driving course by AARP that will be offered in April. Drivers who take the course could get up to 10% off their car insurance.

The center also partners with Everybody's Hands to provide sign language for the hearing impaired.

Ms. Reed said the Social Day program is not yet back to five days a week, but they have applied for a grant to expand it. The program is

The Rotch-Jones-Duff House & Garden Museum (RJD) is welcoming visitation from Fairhaven residents by offering free admission for the month of February 2024.

Upon arrival, individuals are asked to produce proof of residency with a piece of current mail, or I.D. For more information about hours of operation and current exhibitions, visit the Museum's website, rjdmuseum.org.

The historic house, now the site of The Rotch-Jones-Duff House & Garden Museum, was built in 1834 for whaling merchant William Rotch Jr. This Greek Revival mansion, located on a full city block of formal gardens, is a National Historic Landmark, one of only 2.500 in the nation. The period rooms of the house chronicle 150 vears of the economic and social evolution of the City of New Bedford, as reflected in the residencies of the Rotch, Jones, and Duff families and their domestic staff.

The Museum is located at 396

County Street, New Bedford. It is open Wednesday through Saturday, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Advance booking for admission is encouraged, but not required. Admission is \$8 for adults; \$6 for AAA members, seniors and students; and \$3 for children (age 7-17). The Museum is free for RJD members, as well as for EBT, Connector-Care, WIC, and Wunderfund cardholders.

The RJD gardens are open to the public at no cost and available to visit from sunrise to sunset, seven days a week. Visitors are urged to go to rjdmuseum.org to book their Museum visit and to review the most current information on hours and programs.

Recipe of the Week Stuff Full Casserole

- 2 cups elbow macaroni, uncooked
- 1 pound ground beef
- 1 (14.5-ounce) can diced tomatoes, drained
- 1 (8-ounce) can tomato sauce
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon garlic salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 cup sour cream
- 3 ounces cream cheese, softened
- 3 green onions, chopped
- 1 cup cheddar cheese, shredded
- Preheat the oven to 350°Grease an 11x7-inch baking dish.

In a 6-quart stockpot, cook the macaroni to al dente according to the package directions.

Drain the water and return the macaroni to the pot.

While the pasta is cooking, in a large skillet over medium heat, cook the beef until no longer pink, about 6-8 minutes.

Stir the tomatoes, the tomato sauce, the sugar, the salt, the garlic salt, and the pepper into the cooked beef. Transfer meat mixture into the prepared baking dish.

Stir our cream, cream cheese, and green onions into the pasta. Spoon the pasta mixture over the beef mixture, spreading evenly.

Sprinkle the casserole with the cheese. Bake, covered, until the cheese is melted and bubbly, about 15-20 minutes.

Acushnet's fire Chief Tom Farland gets accreditation

Press Release

The Massachusetts Fire Service Commission granted accreditation to Chief Thomas J. Farland of the Acushnet Fire & EMS Department on January 18, 2024 who has demonstrated the required fire service experience, education, and certifications for accreditation.

This accreditation is granted through the Massachusetts Fire Service Commission, a gubernatorial appointed board that has established a process for uniform credentialing for the level of fire chief.

Reading Fire Chief Gregory Bums, who serves as chair of the commission says, "The program establishes requirements based on education, training, and experience in areas relevant to serving as fire chief. It establishes benchmarks for training in fire and emergency service management so that chiefs may be better prepared to serve their department and their community."

The applicant's documentation is reviewed by a subcommittee of the Massachusetts Fire Service Commission to determine if the individual has

attained a minimum level of credits for education, training, and experience.

State Fire Marshal Jon M. Davine said, "This program allows chief officers to document their efforts to develop and maintain the skills to be an effective leader and manager in today's fire service. The process provides an equal opportunity for the volunteer, call, or full-time fire service leader to meet the minimum criteria for achieving fire chief accreditation."

Chief Farland said, "Over the course of my almost 24-year career, l have been dedicated to providing the highest level of service to this community and have worked hard to continue my education and experience to bring a high level of professionalism to this position. I appreciate that this accomplishment recognizes my dedication to be the best fire service leader I can be for this community. I look forward to furthering that education in the future in hopes to continue to hold this Fire Chief Credential."s

Credentialed participants will be required to renew their credentials every three years. The program is

open to all members of the fire service in the Commonwealth serving as chief of department. Additionally, any person holding the rank of Lieutenant or above in that department is also eligible to apply for credentialing. Participation in this program is voluntary and all eligible personnel are encouraged to participate.

Union Wharf project getting close to end

The rebuilding of the bulkheads at Union Wharf in Fairhaven is in the final phase. The east, west and south sides have been finished. Construction crews are now working on the north side.

The work consists of driving 50foot steel sheet piles into the ground; then connecting them with an ibeam; then using a tie-back anchor system to backfill the sheets; and capping it all with concrete.

The wharf is closed to the larger commercial boats that use pier, but it is open to the small lobster boats on a portion of the east side known as the lobster basin.

Fairhaven Harbormaser Tim Cox

said this phase closed down the wharf in November, and it should be reopened in April.

The project has cost more than \$7.5 million so far, with the current work on the north side costing about \$2.5 million. The town has been successful in getting grant money to fund the project, which started about eight years ago.

half funded by fees and half funded b the town.

The center offers a variety of programs every day and some evenings, including a singles supper club and an LGBTQ supper club.

Veterans Services Officer Michael Jenney told the board that his department administers the program that helps veterans pay for rent, fuel, medicines, and other expenses. He said they are towards the end of recertification for people in the program, which they need to do twice a year.

He said it is a "lengthy process," but they only had "one or two stragglers left.

His department also participated in Wreaths Across America, placing wreaths on or near the graves of veterans in Fairhaven cemeteries, with the help of volunteers. He said funds were a little short this year, but they are in good shape for next year and should be able to place wreaths on the grave of every veteran in Fairhaven this year.

The VSO is also getting ready for the Memorial Day parade, which requires permission fro the state to close Route 6 at the high school intersection.

Mr. Jenney said the parade committee has already been meeting. They want to "build the town spirit up," he said.

They would like to see more people in the parade and more people watching along the route.

Mr. Jenney, who started in the position in November, said he has been getting out and about meeting people. Veterans are realizing he is there and available to help, he said, citing an "uptick" in people going into the office.

He said they are on the right track getting people the help they need and deserve.

One piece of big news, he said is

the acquisition of a wheelchair van. He said he worked with the New Bedford Disabled American Veterans chapter. The Veterans Administration in Providence donated a van for the use of the town. It will be housed in New Bedford.'

He said they will have 15 volunteers to drive people to appointments.

"Which is a huge, huge win for the veterans," said Mr. Jenney, adding that a lot of times disabled veterans cannot get to appointments because they need a special vehicle.

The VSO is also working with the police department, which got a grand for opioid addiction, to help veterans with substance abuse problems.

Mr. Jenney said veteran Bill Kligel was instrumental in getting the van. Mr. Jenney also credited former VSO Brad Fish with still being available for questions.

"I have backup," said Mr. Jenney,

He noted that Jane Bettencourt has been in the office for years and knows the ropes.

Acushnet students adopt a cow


