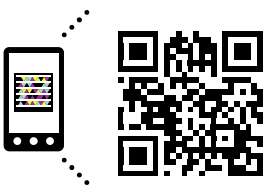

Fairhaven voters choose candidates, keep clerk elected

Fairhaven voters went to the polls on Monday, 4/1/24, to choose officials for a number of boards and to answer a ballot question.

The question asked if the town wanted to change the Town Clerk position from elected to appointed. A resounding “no,” vote came back, 1407 to 981, keeping the position elected. This means the person holding the position must live in Fairhaven and run for the office. The position is currently held by an interim clerk who will serve until the term ends in 2025. Then the position will be on the ballot.

The Select Board, which had just held a meeting before the voting ended, stayed seated in the Banquet Room to welcome the candidates, who all had a chance to address voters on camera after Acting Town Clerk Elisabeth “Lissa” Horan announced the unofficial numbers.*

In the Select Board race, which had

two seats up for grabs, newcomer to elected politics, Andrew Saunders, was the top vote getter with 1324 votes, followed by Andrew Romano

makes our democracy better when people show up to vote.

Mr. Saunders told the *Neighb News* he felt “very, very happy.”

“Surprised but humbled,” said Mr. Saunders. “It’s a long process, a necessary process. I’m hopeful I’ll do a good job.”

Mr. Romano, when he had his chance at the microphone, thanked his husband Miles, and joked that Mr. Sean Powers (who is married to Select Board member Stasia Powers) will no longer be the only First Husband in Fairhaven.

It seems Mr. Romano made history by becoming the first openly gay Select Board member in Fairhaven.

He thanked Miles who, he said, often texted him to see if they still lived together.

Mr. Romano said he knocked on many doors, and worked hard to win.’

“I feel amazing,” Mr. Romano told the *Neighb News* a little bit later, adding he should have mentioned

Mr. Saunders told voters he believed the turnout in Fairhaven was much larger than in New Bedford and other towns, with his guess being more than 20% (results were not available by press time). He said it

From the Tree Warden

Greetings from the Tree Department and happy spring. So far it's been a busy year for the Tree Department! We have completed our annual town street tree survey where we identify high risk trees and deadwood that needs to be removed. We have again partnered with Eversource to remove high risk trees near utility wires. And, on Boston Hill Road we unfortunately had to remove over 25 public and private dead Ash trees. The trees died due to the Emerald Ash Borer, first seen in Michigan in 2002. Sadly, much has been done by many to try and stop this pest to no avail.

On a much brighter note we planted 35 new trees last week and will be doing another round of planting around Arbor Day, April 26. As we have done for the last two years, a group of Fairhaven High School students will help with the planting and learn about our town's tree canopy. It's always a fun time with the students!

Over the last three years the

Fairhaven Tree Department has planted 317 new trees. Over 200 trees were paid for by donations from residents and businesses. Thanks so much!

I want to take a moment to thank my crew Dex, Gene and Ben at Grass Gone Wild for their continued hard work. They do this one day a week and it takes a lot for them to juggle their schedules to be able to do this

Acushnet grappling with budget issues

The Acushnet Selectboard has been grappling with a budget shortfall, with the town facing a sharp increase in school spending, and not much in the way of state help. Town Administrator James Kelley said the increase in school spending is more than \$1 million, but the state has only ponied up about \$35,000 more.

He said the town overall is looking at a \$900K to \$1 million deficit, with the schools being the biggest driver of the increase in spending.

"They [the state] tell us everything we have to do in the school district, and then don't give us the money," said Mr. Kelley.

The problem is statewide, he said, with a majority of school districts getting only the minimum from the

state this year.

He said he is talking to the school department to see where they can cut expenses, and talking to Old Colony to see "if they can sharpen their pencil any."

On the state side, he said they are negotiating with health insurance providers and general insurance providers to find some savings.

He has also been negotiating with the utilities to try to get some savings there.

The town is also actively looking at some regionalization with Fairhaven, hoping to save on some positions that can be shared. The two school departments are also looking at regionalization possibilities.

At its meeting on 4/2/24, the Selectboard looked at a number of the smaller budgets for the town meeting warrant.

B u d g e t s remain flat for Finance Committee, Reserve Fund, Town Moderator, Soil Board, Sealer of

Weights and Measures, Board of Appeals, Snow and Ice, Cemeteries, Veterans' Services, Park.

Legal Services has a flat line item, but Mr. Kelley told the board that there is a \$22,618 deficit in legal.

Animal Control is also flat, but SB Chairperson Kevin Gaspar noted that a union contract may be ratified which will increase that salary item.


Forestry was also up a bit, said Mr. Gaspar because a lot of tree cutting. The police details will also increase because of the tree work.

The library got split into two sections. Mr. Kelley said he wanted to pull out electric due to his negotiations with the Eversource.

The board may consider solar for the library, as its electric bill runs about \$1200/month.

The Board also looked at some changes to the Stormwater Bylaw that will be presented to Town Meeting. The board had only just received the information, so did not vote on it, but will take it up at the 4/16 meeting.

New Vineyard opens in Fairhaven

Walking the grounds brings a warm satisfying feeling entering the Nasketucket Bay Vineyard at 237 New Boston Road in Fairhaven. Happily greeting the beautiful landscape of Nicholas Christy's vision which holds an air of benign affability. There's no place like it throughout the Town of Fairhaven.

Since 2016, Nick has transformed the 52.4 acres into a fruitful oasis of greenery and biodiversity. What you'd expect to see is the vineyard growing distinct plots of grapes, while the winery produces and bottles flavorful white and red wines. What's not expected is the real spirit and soul of Nasketucket Bay Vineyard and Nick's true vision. The peaceful environment. Robust animal welfare. Unique architecture. And, the wonderful people. Speaking with Nick about those visions and where they came from: "I made wine with my grandfather. He was from Italy so his wealth of knowledge was always fun. When older, I always kept an interest in it, making small batches here and there. Owning a landscaping company had been my focus for twenty plus years, but when buying this property and walking around I felt a sense of peace here. I felt connected learning the history of milking farms throughout Fairhaven and this place used to be one. It's humbling being connected to such a historic town."

Nick quickly thought it'd be fun planting some vines, several different types from aramelo which

are aromatic and have a high potential of productivity, to brianna that are a relatively new little-known hybrid that requires full sun exposure. Perfect for an open space.

Acres of rows of vines producing bountiful grapes, along with a barrel roof winery, a fully refurbished milking barn turned into a complete wine tasting venue, outdoor patio, and a giant wooden boat still give this place a vast open space and natural feel.

A natural feel is why Nick is very careful what he puts into the ground. "We are an all natural vineyard, meaning there's no chemicals anywhere. The soil is already fantastic and we maintain it with things that only nature deems healthy, because what we put in the ground is ultimately created into the wine. Taking proper care of these grounds makes a much better product, in my opinion."

This is seen by how the grounds and the biodiversity is taken care of. Fairhaven Sustainability Committee promotes "No Mow May" every year, while Nick dedicates a few acres of land which he never mows, ever. This allows the early season

pollinators to grow and live, such as bees. Bees help combat the monocultural nature by pollinating canopy crops, fruits, and wild flowers scattered throughout the grounds.

"We needed to learn how to work well with all things living here."

All that has been seen, they do this well at Nasketucket Bay Vineyard. People will come for the wine and the scenery, but will return for the culture and environment. Turkeys taking a morning stroll, Monarch butterflies gently floating, sparrows singing.


Nasketucket Bay Vineyard opens April 6th with a ticketed event. After this weekend it is open to the public Thursday thru Sunday till late Fall with food, plenty of wine, and music. For more information go to www.peacelovevino.net for all upcoming events and hours of operation.

She said she would do her best to honor her commitment to the town and to keep the board independent and take care of the health and welfare of residents.

The Planning Board had two full term seats on the ballot, and a one-year unexpired term.

For the one year term, Richard "Rick" Trapilo won with 1003 votes, with Karyn Ferreira second with 864

Ms. Fidalgo thanked everyone for voting for her and trusting her for another four-year term. She especially thanked her mother for babysitting "all day long."

She thanked the board for appointing her to the unexpired term, getting her started on the board, and said she was very appreciative of being elected to a full term.

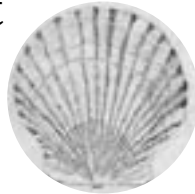
