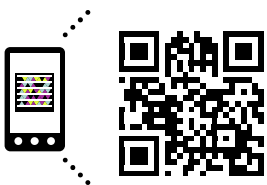

Carr deliberates on container bylaw, owns container company

Fairhaven Planning Board member Patrick Carr owns Seaspray Container Company, which supplies shipping and storage containers to businesses and residences. The PB has presented a series of bylaws changes, including one pertaining to shipping containers.

In response to an email asking Mr. Carr if there was a possible conflict of interest, attorney Gregory J. Koldys of Koldys & Kelleher, responded by email saying that, "Mr. Carr takes his ethical obligations very seriously."

In the letter, Mr. Koldys says that his "understanding" is that the PB changes only add a definition of "shipping containers" to the bylaw. He says the proposed change was to "limit the use of shipping containers, as defined, to industrial zones."

However, the Use Regulation Schedule included for 198-16 in Article 20 adds three areas not previously included in Fairhaven's bylaws: Health care including medical, dental offices and clinics; Shipping Containers; Storage Units. In

that use schedule, Shipping Containers are allowed in industrial zones, which are in a variety of areas all around Fairhaven. In that same graphic, Storage Units are allowed in both business and industrial zones.

Currently, neither one of the uses is allowed in Fairhaven's zoning bylaws. The units that are currently in a few places in town are there as an accessory use to existing businesses.

In addition, the definition in the bylaw is: "Shipping container" means a unit originally used for the transport, shipping, or hauling of materials or goods by land, sea, or air; capable of being moved or mounted by rail, truck, or boat. This definition includes steel sea or oceangoing containers marked with the American Bureau of Shipping's emblem or meeting the International Standard Organization's standards which can be detached from a trailer, chassis or frame, and which were formerly used for transporting sea or oceangoing cargo. This definition includes the terms 'portable moving/storage unit/container/pod' and 'cargo/oceangoing/transport con-

tainer.['] In addition, this definition applies to any structure designed to imitate the look of a shipping container."

According to that definition, "storage unit" is included; and, according to the bylaw, storage units are allowed in business as well as industrial zones. It is unclear if this means that both will be allowed in both zones.

These changes seem to clearly add "Shipping Containers" and "Storage Units," as new uses, because they were not included in the code before. Here is the link to the current uses: <https://ecode360.com/10399656#10399673> (scroll down to "Industrial Uses")

Yet, there are conflicting interpretations of the article, with PB chairperson, Cathy Melanson, writing in this week's issue (see page 11) that only a definition of Storage Containers is being added; and former PB member Wayne Hayward insisting in an op-ed two weeks ago that the use is a new one (see 4/18/24 issue, "Fairhaven has an easy choice").

Fairhaven Town Meeting to tackle 26 articles, \$60+M Saturday

Fairhaven Town Meeting will be presented with a balanced budget on Saturday, 5/4/24, though the process has been painful to close a \$2.2 million shortfall. The town worked hard to close the gap through a variety of cuts and increased fees, although not without controversy. At the urging of town hall, the Board of Public Works instituted a trash fee of \$100/year, to be billed quarterly. It will raise about \$700,000.

The BPW also reduced staff by not filling some vacant positions; and some town departments will be sharing administrative staff.

According to the Finance Committee's letter to TM Members, the School Department, "was able to secure funds to close the remaining \$447,000 deficit."

Police, Fire and Highway Departments all saw a reduction in overtime funds.

FinCom also notes that the town has the smallest general fund capital budget of the last seven years and "includes the smallest expenditure on roads in memory."

"With expenditures still outpacing revenue, our financial situation will need to be closely monitored," writes the FinCom. "It is possible there will be more difficult choices down the road."

The General Fund Operating Budget includes a side-by-side list of last year's actual budgeted amounts and this year's proposed FY 2025 amounts for departments adding up to a \$60.1+ million operating budget. The School Department's FY 2025 budget is \$24,702,183, up from \$23,53,641 last year; plus \$2,626,000

for New Bedford Voc-Tech; and \$310,100 for Bristol County Agricultural High School; for a grand total of \$27,638,283 for education.

The Public Safety budget, which includes Police/Animal Control, Fire/EMS, Building Department, Marine Resources, and Weights & Measures is \$9,929,993, an overall increase of \$423,715. This reflects an increase in the salary and wages line item of \$532,080 and a decrease in the operating expenses of \$108,365, from last year.

The BPW administration (office) took a hit in salaries and wages, presumably not filling some vacant positions. Last year's salaries and wages line item was \$223,502, this year is \$86,615, a \$136,887 reduction. Highway, Parks, and Tree departments all saw increases in the salaries line item.

Overall, the BPW budget is \$4,379,011 for FY 2025, up from \$4,305,068 in FY 2024, an increase of \$73,943.

Community Services, which includes the Council on Aging, Veterans Services, Millicent Library, Recreation Department, Tourism, and some smaller boards, had an overall reduction, totalling \$2,129,289 for FY 2025, down from \$2,265,793 for a difference of \$235,504.

The COA salary line item took the biggest hit there, going from \$189,296 last year to \$153,873 this year, a difference of \$25,423. Veterans Services also saw a reduction in salaries, going from \$98,592 in FY 2024 to \$92,433, a difference of \$7,159.

The total for all departments is \$60,196,998, up from \$58,355,901 last year for a difference of \$1,841,097.

The town's revenue comes from

three main sources: property taxes, state aid, and local receipts.

Property taxes are estimated at \$35,117,531. Local receipts come from excise taxes and fees, such as building permits, licenses, etc. The budget includes \$9,869,098 from local receipts, which is about 92% of the expected revenue.

The state has not finalized state aid to municipalities yet, so the town has estimated aid at \$13,262,920 based on a variety of sources, including the house budget and the governor's budget. In any case, about \$9.7 million of it is Chapter 70 funds, which have to go to the school department; and about \$2.7 million is unrestricted funds.

Town meeting will be asked to authorize the BPW to use Chapter 90 funds, which are from the state for road work, but a dollar figure is not in the article.

In addition to the operating budget, Town Meeting will be asked to vote on a number of other spending articles, including appropriating funds from the various enterprise funds, such as sewer and water. That money comes from fees and is restricted for use in those departments, e.g., sewer fees go into the sewer enterprise fund and are used to fund the sewer department.

This year, the water enterprise fund will use \$3,765,381 for the water operating budget; the sewer enterprise fund will use \$4,784,497; \$240,144 for the Town Cable TV; \$156,903 for the School Department Cable TV.

Additional spending articles include \$1,328,206 in free cash for capital equipment in a variety of

- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 (1-lb) box light brown sugar
- 2 eggs, well beaten
- 2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 cup pecans, finely chopped

Stir the chopped pecans into the batter.

Using a teaspoon, drop the dough onto the prepared cookie sheet about 2 inches apart from each other. Grease and use another baking sheet if needed. Bake until just set, about 10 minutes.

Planning Board explains proposed bylaw changes

Dear Fairhaven Residents, The Planning Board is an elected, volunteer board. The members are here to further enhance the prosperity, livability, and resiliency of the community. We are here for you and to ensure compliance with Mass General Laws.

The Master Plan 2040 is a guiding document as the Town plans for its future.

There have been two master plans, 1996 and 2018 recommended by the townspeople to provide more flexibility and incentive within the Accessory Dwelling Unit bylaw.

In 2024 the Planning Department is focused on following these goals and recommendations.

**Addressing the following
 regarding ADU's 198-32
 Affordable Housing options and
 supportive environments for
 elderly residents**

1. Minimum lot sizes are dependent upon Town Zoning districts. They must follow Massachusetts General

Laws (M.G.L. 48(1-a) according to building codes. This is not in the purview of the Planning Department. The Planning Department is seeking to remove this from a Planning Board special permit.

2. Unsewered lots, Section 198-32.1 (d)(4) specifies that proposed units shall be permitted only by the Board of Health. Those connected to municipal sewers would proceed to the Department of Public Works. This is not in the purview of the Planning Department
3. A separate entrance either directly from the outside or through an entry hall or corridor shared with the principal dwelling sufficient to meet the requirements of the state building code for safe egress. MGL c.40A 1A (i)
4. Dwelling conversions are of existing buildings. Eligible buildings must meet acreage density requirements. New construction goes through the Building Department, not within the purview of the Planning Department.
5. The Planning Board does not approve new construction, the

Building Department is the approving entity.

6. By-right means your existing dwelling does not need a special permit, it must go through the Building Department
7. Campers, seasonal RV's, boats etc. are personal items, not real estate, through the Building Department.
8. The changes that are proposed are to make previously approved ADU's by special permit to now be By-right. All others remain the same. The Planning Department is not zoning.

The mission of the Planning Department change request, is to remove the special permitting process for conversions of pre-existing buildings. Property owners must go directly to the building department for all permits and approvals. There are specific regulations that relate to all matters ADU's.

Fairhaven Community TV was on hand to record the event, and some of the Junior Tree Wardens spoke to the

camera to explain why they were participating.

Sam said we need to take care of trees or there would be none left. Trees are very good for the environment. Without them, we would have less oxygen and less shade.

Lena trees help the planet and they create oxygen.

"I love the world," said Lena. "Trees are good for the planet."

Oh, and she likes to climb trees, too.

Like Wool Over the Eyes Bylaw changes? What?

I wholeheartedly agree with Wayne Hayward's article in last week's Neighb News (4/25/24 issue). In short, "Planning process should involve lengthy study followed by vigorous PUBLIC debate."

I visited the town hall last week to try and make heads or tails out of all the listed bylaw changes. I did not receive any further clarity. In fact I left with more unanswered questions on bylaw changes, especially in regards to ADU's (Accessory Dwelling Units, aka in-law apartments), than when I got there.

The reason I went to the Town Hall in the first place, is because some of our Fairhaven residents, including some small business owners, were telling me that they really don't understand what the bylaw changes are involving, or how they will affect the community in the future. There is no "clarity." Without clarity how can any changes be made? No Clarity Equals no Transparency.

FYI: The Massachusetts open meeting laws are to ensure transparency in the deliberation on which the public is based. The definition of deliberation is Long and careful consideration.

I had inquired how these changes would affect other already in place Short Term Rental (STR) bylaws, which at the current time have not been adhered to over the last couple of years. It was reported over a year ago at a Select Board meeting, that we are over the STR cap amount in the town of Fairhaven.

Let's take an honest look at what is happening here. We have STR bylaws not being adhered to, and we have bylaw changes being considered, that many Fairhaven residents don't clearly understand. No in depth study has been done as to how these changes will affect our community and or natural resources in the future, and made clear to the public eye. No zoning/planner expert.

I have seen in the past how just one bylaw zoning change can make null and void other important zoning bylaws.

At the current time the town of Fairhaven is without a Town Planner, and with an interim Building Commissioner. But, we do have two new real estate agents/realtors who

are part of the Board's decision-making process, as per what was conveyed to me by one of the town hall employees. Might that be a conflict of interest?

FYI: The Conflict of Interest Law in Massachusetts Chapter 268A, was provided to prevent conflict of interest and public duties, foster integrity in public service, and promote the public's trust and confidence in the service by placing restrictions on what municipalities may do on the job. Paid or unpaid, appointed or elected, full-time or part-time, from having a financial interest, directly or indirectly, in a contract made by an agency of the municipality in which he serves.

I'm not a planner/zoning expert, and God knows we need an expert. These bylaw changes appear wooly, is the most honest way I can describe it. And not just to me, but to other residents as well.

What I Meant To Say Was...

I had intended to address my concerns during the Public Comment time at the 4/22/24 Select Board meeting but that would have been at the earliest 9:30. I couldn't stay past 9 because of severe pain in my bum knee.

New Board members and folks reading this, if you are not familiar with me, I tell folks that I'm not so much famous, rather I'm Infamous. I have been a Registered Voter and a Town Meeting member for the better part two decades. As an Agitator/Activist I will keep your feet to the fire so expect to hear from me as often as I feel needed.

Right now, I do have a few concerns that I need to address. My first concern is regarding the two rules of public comment given to a citizen at the April 8th meeting. The Select Board has set a precedent allowing the comment to last five minutes and 20 seconds, well beyond the two-minute limit, plus there was interaction between the citizen and the Board, thus breaking both rules.

And again with all due respect, if the Chair did not perform her duty I would expect the other board members to call it to your attention. I am not one to bitch and moan without providing a possible solution

so I ask that the Board take into consideration extending the time to four minutes. I'm sure that many others who have stood at that podium feel that two minutes is not enough time to get one's point across in a cohesive manner.

My second concern is that this meeting (4/22) is being held on the first night of Passover which will commence at sundown. That was at 7:33 p.m. For practicing Jews the first night of Passover is the most significant of the eight nights. Should a Jewish citizen wish to participate in a public meeting but also wishes to be home with their family, it's simply impossible because I've never known a Select Board meeting to wrap up in 45 minutes.

I am 100% positive that a public meeting of any board or committee would not be scheduled on Christmas Eve, the Eve of Thanksgiving, Good Friday or any Monday holiday.

I insist that this Board and others take into consideration the practicing of other religions and cultures. After all isn't that one of the pillars of DEI (Diversity, Equity, Inclusion)? So this is also an issue that our Belonging Committee should address as well.

And lastly, there is an IT issue preventing citizens to reach their elected and appointed officials by the e-mail links on our Town's website. Over the past 15 years I've been told that it is not permissible for a citizen to e-mail a government official directly without including the entire board or committee as well as our Town Administrator.

I have the ability to write a document and print it out, then bring it to Town Hall, but many, many citizens do not. This is an issue that MUST be addressed immediately.

There are a minimum of eight (8) state and federal agencies and five (5) town departments that must approve a dock prior to construction. The Planning Department does not provide any decision nor real estate expertise within these expert entities.

Clearing of Trees

In any case, Mr. Koldys writes that he believes Mr. Carr has a right to participate in the deliberations.

"My understanding is that there is an exemption under Chapter 268A which provides that a person could act as a planning board member on a determination of 'general policy'

which affects a substantial segment of the community's population the same way. I believe that exemption would apply to these circumstances," writes Mr. Koldys.

He also notes that Mr. Carr has contacted the State Ethics Commission.

"Finally, I trust that you will not gratuitously publish allegations or imply that Mr. Carr violated any conflict of interest obligations," writes Mr. Koldys in conclusion.

departments, including \$300,000 for a tub grinder for the recycling center, \$400,000 for vehicles in the BPW department, and \$125,000 for road work; \$185,000 for gear equipment and \$69,900 for a bucket truck for the fire department; \$140,306 for police department cruiser replacement.

Other free cash expenditures include \$300,000 in retirement payouts for next year, with the town expecting a lot retirements across town departments; a grant writing consultant (\$60,000); zoning bylaw consultant (\$25,000); maintenance/repairs to town facilities (\$50,000), and the Recreation/Senior Center building (\$17,780).

The BPW will ask town meeting to borrow \$1,000,000 for maintenance of the Sconticut Neck Road water tower.

Capital projects for the sewer department include \$250,000 for an inflow and infiltration study, \$500,000 to replace the South Street Pump Station; \$75,000 for a pump.

Article 11 asks to borrow \$20,645,527 for a town-wide Fiber Optic Internet System, petitioned by the Broadband Study Committee. The Select Board has recommended passing over the article. The FinCom has not made a recommendation, saying in its letter that it expected the article to be modified, and they would make a recommendation at TM.

Article 12 seeks approval to appropriate \$1,182,800 in Community Preservation funds for 13 projects, including repairs to Fairhaven High School (\$92,700 for boiler room roof), Millicent Library (\$385,700 for electrical upgrades), Town Hall (\$150K for east retaining wall), Anthony Haven (\$100,000 window replacement). The expenditures also include \$277,000 for the Macomber

Park BMX track; \$110,000 for the town to purchase a Conservation Restriction on the Buzzards Bay Coalition's Carvalho Woods (\$80K), and to create public access enhancements (\$30K).

Town Meeting will also be asked to change the time period for assessing new construction. This one time change will allow the town to reap the benefits of an extra six months of new growth for this budget cycle. After this year, assessments will go from June to June, instead of January to January.

Article 17 asks TM to increase most Fire Department fees.

Article 18 makes changes to Chapters 87, 206, and 405 of the bylaws regarding "Animals." The article includes 14 pages of changes, including the addition of a lot of definitions and changes to enforcement. The article was petitioned by the police department and animal control officer.

The Planning Board has recommended a number of changes to the bylaws in Articles 19, 20, 21, and 22.

Article 19 makes extensive changes to the stormwater management bylaw, deleting large portions and adding large portions.

Article 20 makes zoning changes, including language to allow Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs), commonly known as in-law apartments. (See 4/25/24 issue for related op-ed, "The Unfinished Bylaw: Accessory Dwelling Units.") The change would make ADUs by right instead of requiring a special permit.

Article 20 also recommends changes to Chapters 198, 65, 306, 316, and 322. The zoning changes require a 2/3 vote, but the state has carved out an exception for ADUs, allowing for a simple majority.

offices, shipping containers, storage units; and changes to tattoo parlors, and artist studios; makes private docks by-right in all zones.

The same article (20) also makes changes to the fence bylaw; solar farm bylaw; adds a section, 198-33, that defines six uses, including shipping container.

Article 20 also changes the eight-member Planning Board's election cycle from two members every four years, to two members every three years, which would allow for half the board to be replaced every three years.

The article also removes all language requiring applicants to pay fees at the time of application. The whole section, 306-1 is crossed out with no language replacing it.

Article 21 creates a Flow Neutral bylaw, which will regulate connection to the town's sewerage system. The article was petitioned by the BPW.

Article 22 amends, Chapter 76: Tree Warden, striking some language and adding other language pertaining to the tree warden's qualifications.

Article 22B would create a new bylaw, Chapter 88 regulating public shade trees. It is petitioned by the BPW, Conservation and Sustainability, Planning and Tree Warden.

Three Citizens Petitions are also on the warrant.

Article 23 asks for a street light on a pole at Bass Creek Road on West Island.

Article 24 asks TM to allow Southcoast Pickleball to seek a restaurant/all alcohol license from the state.

Article 25 asks TM to rescind its vote from last year banning nips in liquor stores, and asks that it be put to a town-wide vote.

The article proposes extensive changes in a variety of areas, including adding uses, such as health and dental
