

From the Fairhaven Commission On Disability

Accessing Change: Updates from Fairhaven's Commission on Disability

Welcome to this new feature which will regularly update Fairhaven residents about the work of its Commission on Disability!

Established in 1997 through town meeting vote, Fairhaven's Commission on Disability is one of over 200 similar Commissions supported by the Commonwealth's Office on Disability. The mission of Fairhaven's Commission is to remove barriers in town that interfere with equitable access to services for people with disabilities. This includes addressing architectural, procedural, attitudinal, and communication obstacles.

Fairhaven's COD is focused on helping the town and its residents to design, promote, organize, and put into place services that meet the needs of people with disabilities, and to educate the community and encourage involvement. Currently, the COD consists of eight members, with the goal of adding one more soon. State guidelines recommend that the majority of members be individuals with disabilities, and these members often assume leadership roles within the Commission.

Recently, the Fairhaven Commission was pleased to have a role in securing a state grant from the Massachusetts Office on Disability for the town. This grant funds a townwide Americans with Disabilities (ADA) audit, leading to a transition plan that opens up opportunities for additional funding to address barriers to universal access in Fairhaven.

The Commission has also advocated for the use of closed captioning for all town meetings, expanded its social media presence, adopted a clear mission statement, and coordinated the availability of free seatbelt covers which notify first responders that a passenger with autism may need additional assistance or may not respond in an emergency.

It has raised awareness about the importance of keeping curb cut-outs and handicapped parking areas barrier-free and has enhanced collaboration through meetings with multiple town departments.

In addition, the Commission has participated in community events, supported the proposal to pave paths at Cushman Park, and sponsored a town-wide proclamation for Disability Employment Awareness month.

This article, and those that will follow in this regular series, are meant to keep the community informed about the Commission's work, while also encouraging town residents to share their thoughts, concerns, and ideas for specific changes they would like to see.

Tree Warden to take down four ash trees in center

Fairhaven Tree Warden Don Collasius informed the Select Board and the public that he would be removing four large ash trees on Walnut Street, between Center and Union Street. Mr. Collasius told the board at its meeting on 5/13/24, that the four trees were in an "advanced state of decline," and pose a threat.

The trees are old, he said and just outgrew their space, like a "sunflower in a dixie cup.'

The sidewalks are also regularly salted, and there is a problem with the "Emerald Ash Borer" insect, with all four trees having some evidence of being invaded by the small beetle.

He said he wanted to be transparent about removing the trees because some people have been upset with him, saying he is not transparent.

"This is an attempt to avoid that," he said, adding that he is letting as many groups as possible know about the plan.

"I hate doing it, I really do," he said. The removal of the very large and old trees will change the look of that section of street, said Mr. Collasius.

He also said he had hoped to get some Community Preservation Act funds to repair the sidewalk at the same time, but the project did not make it.

"I know they are in bad shape," said SB member Keith Silvia, adding they took a four-foot cone and shoved it right through a hole in one of the trees.

In his report to the SB, Mr. Collasius said the trees pose a "high risk to persons traveling in the public right of way and public and private property.'

Three of the trees are 75 feet high, and one is 90 feet high. The Millicent Library and residences are in the fall zone of the trees.

All the trees have had "significant effort to mitigate decline" with extensive pruning and removal of decay in the past few years. All the trees have decay and some are losing limbs regularly.

"Given the advanced state of decay of these trees with a cumulative weight of over 100 tons, and their


proximity to multiple targets that cannot be removed these trees pose a high risk and unfortunately should be taken down immediately," writes Mr. Collasius in his report.

Michael Botelho, who lives near


trees, the said he has c a l l e d several times after large limbs a v h e dropped.

"They're in terrible shape. said Mr. Botelho. adding he "supwas portive" of taking them down.

Fewer than 500 vote in Acushnet Election

Less than 6% of voters turned out for the Acushnet election Saturday, 5/18/24, at the Acushnet Elementary School, where all precincts voted. There were no contested races on the ballot, and there were three vacancies. A total of 498 ballots were cast out of 8,573 registered voters, for a turnout of 5.8%.

Kevin Gaspar was re-elected to his seat on the Selectboard with 437 votes; Francis Mello was elected Assessor with 438 votes; David Davignon was re-elected to the Board of Health with 452 votes; John Howcroft was re-elected to School Committee with 439 votes; Richard Ellis was re-elected to the Planning

Commission with 433 votes; Peter John Giampa was elected to fill an unexpired term on Planning with 425 votes; Paul Fortin was re-elected to the Cemetery Board with 460 votes; Alan Miner was elected to the Library board of Trustees with 442 votes; Chad Leclair was re-elected Park Commissioner with 443 votes; Andrew Gomes was re-elected to the Housing Authority with 439 votes;



Recipe of the Week Maple Pumpkin Pie

1 pkg. prepared pie crusts
1/4 cup pure maple syrup
1/2 cup brown sugar (packed)
1/2 tsp salt
3/4 tsp pumpkin pie spice
3 eggs, beaten
One 16-oz. can pumpkin
1 1/4 cups evaporated milk
Place one sheet of pie crust in a

deep dish pie pan. Use a leafshaped cookie cutter to punch several leaves out of the other pie crust, and use the backside of a knife to create the veining; set aside.

In a large bowl, mix syrup, sugar, salt, pumpkin pie spice and eggs. Add pumpkin, evaporated milk, and blend well. Pour into pie shell. Bake at 450° for 15 minutes. Reduce oven to 300°

Add leaf cut-outs around edge of pie, and continue to bake for 25 to 30 minutes longer or until a knife inserted comes out clean. Serve at room temperature or chilled.

The Huttleston Marketplace is held every Saturday through September 28 (except 6/29) on the lawn of the Fairhaven Visitors Center and the High School at 141 Main Street, Fairhaven, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Millicent Libary chimneys undergoing repair work

The Millicent Library is currently undergoing chimney repairs necessitating the installation of scaffolding earlier this year. The catalyst for these repairs traces back to late 2019 when water ingress began plaguing several areas of the building where the chimneys are situated. In the Youth Services section, the situation escalated to the extent that the librarian's desk had to be relocated due to leaking water and falling plaster flakes.

Consultation with an architect revealed that frequent and intense rainstorms were exacerbating the water infiltration issue. Following a comprehensive assessment of the chimneys, a detailed scope of work with cost estimates was formulated. Funding for the project was secured through the Town of Fairhaven Community Preservation Committee. Progress faced a setback with the

onset of the COVID-19 pandemic. Subsequently, a new project architect had to be enlisted, leading to the engagement of Stephen Kelleher Architects. Inc. of Fairhaven.

Following public bidding process. Folan Waterproofing and Construction was appointed to carry out the necessary repairs. Due to the nature of the terracotta material used in

the chimneys, specific weather conditions are required for the repair work to commence safely. The onset of spring marked the beginning of the repair process. Initial steps involved applying various terracotta samples to match the existing material, followed by a curing period of about 14 days. Once the suitable terracotta sample was identified, the necessary materials were ordered, and repair work has commenced.

The Millicent Library does not anticipate that the repair work will

interfere with the operations of the library. However, noise levels from the work may be elevated at times.

Upon completion of the chimney repairs, a comprehensive water test will be conducted to ensure the efficacy of the repairs. Roof shingle and flashing repairs were finalized last fall, with the restoration of the chimneys slated for completion by early July, weather permitting.

The funding for this project is made possible by the Fairhaven Community Preservation Committee through the Community Preservation Act (CPA). This act serves as a crucial tool in preserving our town's open spaces, historic resources, land of recreation, and community housing. Established in 2005, the Fairhaven Community Preservation Committee oversees the local Community Preservation Fund, which supports projects like this one. With the Committee's support through CPA, we can ensure the preservation of our town's rich history and heritage for generations to come.

approval of ADUs, did not secure passage. The Town's vote, by a margin of 60/40 against, concluded our meeting without a resolution and without a PLAN to confront our Town's housing and financial crises.

I am resolutely committed to resuming our proposal at the next Town Meeting, advocating for the approval of ADUs solely within existing residential areas. It is evident that there was confusion and apprehension regarding ADUs in commercial or industrial zones. Furthermore, I will champion the establishment of smart 40R overlay districts along Route 6, drawing inspiration from the benchmark development of the Mashpee Commons on Cape Cod as a model for our Town's growth.

My promise to the residents of Fairhaven, in seeking their trust to serve on this vital Board, was to prioritize the Health, Safety, and Prosperity of our community today and for generations to come. This year, my focus will be threefold: addressing the housing crisis, developing smart tax growth — not new taxes —and raising awareness of the daily pollution of Buzzards Bay by our neighbor, New Bedford. We cannot delay in finding and funding immediate solutions to halt this economic and environmental catastrophe affecting our coastal community.

With unwavering conviction, I affirm that our community faces imminent peril due to a housing crisis that impacts our youth and young families, who struggle to find affordable housing or rentals, as well as our elderly population, who fear being priced out of their homes by rising taxes and inflation.

Financially, our Town is in dire straits, bound by the constraints of Proposition $2 \frac{1}{2}$, which rightly limits government's ability to raise taxes beyond a certain threshold. We must not resort to stopgap measures such as fee hikes, but rather, as the Planning Board, we must innovate with housing and strategic development means to ease the tax burden without further straining our residents, especially the elderly and fixed-income families.

It is imperative that we do not permit any elected official to circumvent Prop 2 1/2. We must demand transparency from every candidate and officeholder on this critical issue. If we allow our Town government to breach this fiscal threshold, no family will be able to afford to reside and thrive in our picturesque Town.

To my colleagues on the Fairhaven Planning Board, let us be the architects of proactive, visionary solutions to address our housing and financial crises. Let us not merely react but lead with bold, intelligent decisions for the betterment of future generations.

I vow to persist in my mission to RESOLVE our housing crisis, tackle our Town's financial challenges, and combat the pollution destroying our bay, which jeopardizes our fishing and shellfish industries and endangers recreational activities in our waters. from Westport to Marion to the North facing shores of the Elizabeth Islands.

Let us work together for the prosperity of our Town. Our community is relying on our resolve and ingenuity!
