Every municipality in Massachusetts has a Veterans Services Officer who can connect veterans with resources, services, benefits they are entitled to because of their service to this country. All veterans have earned the right to those benefits. Please, please, please take advantage of them.

George's picture graced the pages of this newspaper often over the years. He was a well-known character in town because of his business, because of his involvement with veterans' issues, and because of his big personality.

He was my mechanic, and he was my friend for more than 30 years. He was also a big supporter of the paper. I will miss him. And so will many others.

Fairhaven police busy with car crashes, neighbor incident

Bicyclist Injured by Pickup Truck

Fairhaven Police Press Release

Lt. Kevin Kobza reports that the Fairhaven Police Department responded to a collision involving an off-duty Fairhaven police officer and a bicyclist on Monday afternoon.

On Monday, July 29, at approximately 3:15 p.m., Fairhaven police responded to a report of a crash at the intersection of Rt. 6 and Narragansett Boulevard. Officers arrived to discover a 35-year-old man had been struck by a vehicle. The motorist, an off-duty Fairhaven police officer operating their personal Ram pickup truck, remained at the scene and was cooperative.

An on-scene investigation indicated that the cyclist rode in front of the Ram on Rt. 6 when the Ram struck the bicycle. As a matter of policy, both due to the fact that the bicyclist suffered injuries and because the crash involved an employee of the Fairhaven Police Department, the department contacted the Massachusetts State Police Collision Analysis and Reconstruction Section (CARS)

to conduct an investigation.

The bicyclist was taken to St. Luke's Hospital by ambulance. The motorist was uninjured. The crash remains under investigation.

Car Crash Ends in Fatality on Main Street in Fairhaven

Lt. Kevin Kobza reports that the Fairhaven Police Department responded to the scene of a fatal accident on Saturday night.

On Saturday, Aug. 3, at about 7:11 p.m., officers responded to reports of a motor vehicle crash involving a Chevy Silverado truck and moped on Main Street in the area of Riverside Cemetery near the Route 195 overpass.

The driver of the moped was seriously injured. Fairhaven Fire Department paramedics transported the moped driver by medical ambulance to St. Luke's Hospital, where they were pronounced dead.

The Chevy Silverado's driver left the scene.

A preliminary investigation determined that the moped and Silverado both were traveling southbound at the time of the crash.

The moped driver, later identified as Alexis Alvarez, 29, of Brockton, was rushed to Saint Luke's Hospital and later pronounced deceased.

In an update on 8/6/24, the Bristol County District Attorney's office said that Ryan Almeida, 35, of Fairhaven was arraigned on charges of Leaving the Scene-Death Resulting and Assault and Battery with a Dangerous Weapon-Substantial Injury.

At the arraignment, Assistant District Attorney Russ Eonas described the crash as a road rage incident. Mr. Almeida was released on bail.

The crash was investigated by the Fairhaven Police Department, State Police Crime Prevention and Control (CPAC) Unit, and the Bristol County District Attorney's Office.

Governor signs "ambitious" law to address housing costs

As the Fairhaven Planning Board gets ready to hold a public hearing this week about the proposed 40R overlay district that would allow for denser housing and commercial units in some areas of town, Gov. Maura Healey has signed The Affordable Homes Act, supporting initiatives to increase home building and help homebuyers.

The bill will support the production, preservation and rehabilitation of more than 65,000 homes statewide over the next five years. It is the largest housing bond bill ever filed in Massachusetts, at more than triple the spending authorizations of the last housing bill passed in 2018.

According to a press release, the historic legislation authorizes \$5.16 billion in spending over the next five years along with 49 policy initiatives to counter rising housing costs caused by high demand and limited supply. Key spending authorizations and policy changes include allowing accessory dwelling units, unprecedented investment modernizing the state's public housing system, boosts to programs that support first-time homebuyers and homeownership, incentives to build more housing for low to moderate-income residents, support for the conversion of vacant commercial space to housing and support for sustainable and green housing initiatives

The new law allows accessory dwelling units (ADUs) under 900 square feet by right on single-family lots. The units can be attached or detached from a single family home in a basement, attic, a cottage in the back yard, or a bump-out addition to a home. By-right means that the ADUs can be added without the need for a special permit or variance. They are still subject to local building codes.

The administration estimates between 8,000 and 10,000 ADUs will be built across the state over the next five years.

The Act authorizes \$2 billion for repair, rehabilitation and modernization of the state's public housing portfolio. Massachusetts has the largest public housing portfolio in the U.S. with more than 43,000 units, but it has been underfunded for decades.

The bill povides assistance for first time homebuyers, including down

payment assistance, mortgage insurance, and other programs.

The act also provides funds to specific housing authorities and nonprofits across the state to create housing or opportunities for first-time home buyers.

The bill also creates additional opportunities to develop vacant or underutilized commercial space into housing through the creation of the Commercial Property Conversion program and the Commercial Property Conversion Tax Credit.

Other programs receiving dramatic increases in authorizations include \$800 million for the Affordable Housing Trust Fund, which doubles the previous authorization, an increase in the Housing Stabilization and Investment Fund to \$425 million and \$275 million for sustainable and green housing initiatives, which is more than four times the previous authorization. The Historic Rehabilitation Tax Credit – a key component for repurposing historic properties for housing – is doubled to \$110 million with this law.


Family came from five different states to celebrate this incredible landmark.

3 large zucchini, finely grated 1/2 teaspoon salt

1 large egg

4 tablespoons Parmesan cheese

George Brownell, well known veteran, dies tragically

George Brownell, 73, of Fairhaven, died tragically by his own hand on Thursday, 8/1/24. Mr. Brownell was a well known Vietnam era veteran who was active in many veterans organizations. He helped organize the Veterans Day Parade and the Memorial Day Parade, and often emceed the ceremonies at those events for many years.

Mr. Brownell was also a mechanic who owned and operated Auto Diagnostics in Fairhaven.

He was well known for helping many people who needed a hand up, especially veterans.

He will mostly be remembered as someone who helped veterans, and helped save the VFW in Fairhaven when it suffered from financial difficulties that almost resulted in its closure.

"Well, I don't know what to say," said Jeff Cardoza, Commander of the VFW in Fairhaven. "But George was a great guy. He worked with me from the beginning at the VFW. Many years ago we kept the VFW open when it was going to close. He did all the Fairhaven parades: Veterans and Memorial Day. He was always looking sharp."

According to Fairhaven Veterans Services Officer Michael Jenney, Mr. Brownell served three years in the US Army and was honorably discharged. "It's a sad loss for all the town's veterans," said Mr. Jenney.

Several people on social media commented when the news broke.

"My good friend and awesome business associate," wrote Jerry Bettencourt. "There was never a time he would not stop what he was doing and help me to solve a problem. He was a book of knowledge, and one of the smartest men that I know...I know he will find peace now, I also know that I will miss him for sure. God bless and rest my friend."

Born in New Bedford, George was the son of the late George and Lillian (Lawton) Brownell, and lived most of his life in Fairhaven where he graduated from Fairhaven High School. He was an active member and Sergeant at Arms at the VFW Post 2892.

He is survived by his wife Cheryl A. (Viens) Brownell; step daughters, Allison Pike of Norwood and Hailey Stevens of New Bedford; two step granddaughters, Sophie and Claire Pike; George was the brother of the late Peter Brownell and Lauren Clark.

National Night Out welcomes community

Fairhaven Police and Fire held a National Night Out event on Tuesday, 8/6/24, welcoming the community to meet officers and firefighters, witness some cool demonstrations, play a few games, and explore police vehicles, including a cruiser and ATV (All Terrain Vehicle).

The event, held on the lawn of Fairhaven High School, was part of a national program to promote police-community partnerships, bringing police and neighbors together under positive circumstances.

Fairhaven's own K9 Blue gave a demonstration of how he finds narcotics and signals his handler, Officer Jillian Jodoin, that he has

found something. Children had a chance to throw the ball around for Blue as a reward for him after his hard work.

Two K9 Handlers from the Bristol County Sheriff's Department also gave K9 Robika a chance to demonstrate how he latches onto a suspect, with Officer Josh Wunschel donning a protective sleeve while Robika's handler Filipe daSilva gave the commands.

Officer Jodoin told the crowd the telltale signs that Blue exhibits before he sits, signaling that he has found narcotics.

"When dogs are working, the really do turn into a different dog," said Officer Jodoin.

Officer daSilva said Robika is a "bit

of a goof" when he's not working. At home, the kids can play with him and have fun with him. But, as the demonstration showed, when he is working, it's a different story.

Police also demonstrated the capabilities of the department's drone. Officer Ryan Benoit sent the drone high above the high school and then turned its camera all the way to the hurricane barrier in New Bedford, and zoomed in on people on the ground at the high school.

He explained to the children crowded around him that they use the drone to search for suspects and lost people.



Wind Turbine debris close to Fairhaven waters

"With the current sea and wind conditions, debris likely will be washing ashore at West Island (if it hasn't already) before the day is out," said one fisherman on 8/5/14, who brought the foam to us and wished to remain anonymous.

Chunks of foam in a massive debris field were spotted by several fishermen less than four miles off shore and headed towards Fairhaven beaches and West Island. A strong southerly wind almost makes impact inevitable.

Foam debris chunks brought in a bucket (upper right inset of photo) to The West Island Weather Station showed the tell-tale identifying marks of foam from the offshore turbine blade mishap.

Debris continues to be spotted from Westport to Nantucket beaches after a 351-foot long turbine blade apparently snapped off and splashed to splinters in the ocean on July 13, 2024.

Several news outlets have reported that GE Vernova said "a manufacturing issue" led to the Vineyard Wind turbine blade failure, and that there were no indications of an engineering flaw.

Most of the 70ton blade's 350foot section fell into the ocean with debris wash-

ing ashore on Nantucket, between July 13 and the 18th.

The project was halted as a Federal probe continues. Important questions include, if this was an isolated


