Early voting for the presidential election on Tuesday, 11/5/24 is underway in Massachusetts. Registered voters can vote at the designated times and the votes will be counted on election day.

The 11/5 ballot will include races for: president of the US, US Senator, US Congress, state senators and representatives.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. statewide.

Voter registration deadline is Saturday, 10/26. Town clerk's offices will be open until 5 p.m. that day.

Deadline to request a mail-in ballot is Tuesday, 10/29.

#### Voters facing 5 ballot questions in Mass.

In addition to voting for president of the United States, US Senator, and state offices, the voters of Mass. will face five ballot questions on November 5. Voters will vote on: giving the State Auditor the authority to audit the legislature; eliminating or keeping the MCAS as a high school graduation requirement; unionization for transportation network drivers (such as Uber and Lyft); limited legalization and regulation of certain natural psychedelic substances; minimum wage for tipped workers.

#### Question 1: Auditing the Legislature

A "yes" vote will expressly authorize the State Auditor to audit the legislature; a "no" vote will leave the law unchanged.

Arguing for passage, the Committee for Transparent Democracy states that the State Auditor is independently elected to audit every state entity. It notes that the Mass. Legislature is continuously ranked as one of the least transparent legislatures in the US, and is one of only four legislatures that exempts itself from public records laws.

Those against passage lean heavily on the argument that the law would violate the separation of powers and legislative supremacy required by the Mass. Constitution.

A majority report by the Special Joint Committee on Initiative Petitions (Committee) strongly argues against the change saying it violates the foundational constitutional principle of separation of powers.

The Committee has presented a report on each question in the ballot questions booklet produced by the Secretary of State. All voters should have received a copy, and a link to the booklet online is provided at the end of this article.

#### **Question 2: Eliminating MCAS**

Question 2 would eliminate the MCAS (Mass. Comprehensive Assessment System) test as a high school graduation requirement. A "yes" vote would eliminate the requirement; a "no" vote would leave the law as is.

Students will still have to demonstrate mastery of the skills, competencies, and knowledge contained in the state academic standards, but it would allow individual districts to determine how to certify that mastery

The Mass. Teachers Association argues for a "yes" saying that the MCAS is a one-size-fits-all exam that fails to measure other student achievement measures. Getting rid of the MCAS will allow schools to focus on the most important skills and knowledge to help students succeed in life, rather than having to focus on only those skills that can be measured on a standardized test.

The group opposing the measure (Protect Our Kids Future: Vote No on 2) argues that some school districts will just adopt a lower standard so students will graduate. They argue that it is not fair to grant diplomas to students who are not ready to graduate. The MCAS is the only statewide standard, eliminating it would give Mass. less rigorous standards that Miss. and Ala. The group also argues that the change is a "radical and untested proposal," and any significant changes to the educational system should be carefully studied.

The Committee recommends not passing the question, citing numerous education officials opposed to the change. The report notes that 99% of students are able to graduate by passing the MCAS or pursuing one of the alternative paths available.

Detractors of the MCAS say it has harmed the most marginalized students and creates a classroom filled with anxiety and stress.

Proponents maintain that elimination of the requirement will lead to more, not less inequity. They also state that the MCAS is an introduction to the world of certification and accountability for students.

The report notes that the Education Reform Act of 1993 established the current system. Prior to that, the state had no statewide curriculum standards and the quality of education varied widely from district to district.

#### Question 3: Unions for Rideshare Drivers

Question 3 would allow rideshare drivers (such as Uber and Lyft drivers) to unionize. A "yes" vote would provide drivers with the option to form a union; a "no" vote would make no change in the law. The law would require companies to bargain with unions on wages, benefits and terms and conditions of work..

United for Justice argues for the question saying that the change will give drivers the option to join a union while maintaining driver flexibility and independence. They argue that most workers have the option to join a union, but rideshare drivers do not.

Mass. Fiscal Alliance argues that the law will raise prices for all riders; allows politicians to set the rules with no accountability, and creates a "new radical labor category that is inconsistent with federal law."

They also argue that drivers already receive \$32.50 per hour with good benefits; they will have no control over leadership of the union; and the law leaves many drivers without a voice.

The Committee recommends not passing the question. The report notes that the law would only affect certain drivers, such as those working for Uber and Lyft, but not DoorDash.

The Report notes that the state is in a lawsuit to determine if the drivers should be classified as employees or keep them as independent con-tractors. There are also five initiatives in the legislature concerning that issue. If any pass, it could cause a conflict with the new law.

Members of the Service Employees International Union (SEIU) argued to the Committee that none of those initiatives should interfere with the right of drivers to unionize.

#### Question 4: Legalizing Psychedelics

Question 4 would allow persons 21 and older to possess, grow and use two natural psychedelic substances found in mushrooms, and three found in plants. They would be available for purchase at an approved location by licensed facilitator.

A "yes" vote would allow the change; a "no" vote would make no change in the law.

Mass. for Mental Health Options argues in favor of passage, saying that it would provide safe, regulated access to promising natural medicines for treatment-resistant PTSD, anxiety, and depression.

Traditional medications do not work for many people, and psychedelic drugs can help with end-of-life anxiety.

The Coalition for Safe Communities argues that a black market is inevitable; drugged driving and DUI have increased in recent years, and this will cause more

**Water Flushing** 

The Fairhaven Water Department will continue flushing water mains tonight Monday - Thursday, for the next few weeks. The flushing effort is anticipated to be conducted from 9:00 p.m. to 4:00 a.m.

Although all efforts are taken to isolate the target areas, properties outside the targeted area may be affected.

This effort is being undertaken to remove the sediment from the water system. As a result, if possible, please avoid using water while the hydrant flushing is taking place as this will draw the dirty water into your property.

During the flushing process, it is not uncommon to have low water pressure or for a yellow, brown or reddish tint to appear in the water. These harmless mineral deposits settle in the water mains and flushing fire hydrants stir these deposits, sometimes causing a brief discoloration of the water.

If you encounter discolored water following hydrant flushing, run the cold water taps only.

Do not use hot water taps throughout your home at bathroom sinks, tubs, kitchen faucets, etc. for 5 to 15 minutes, or until water clears; By not using your hot water taps, this should prevent discolored water from entering your hot water system.

If you do experience discolored water on your hot side: Run water closest to your meter which is most likely outside; Call the Water Department at 508-979-4032; Do not dry or use bleach on your laundry if discolored; Use an Iron-Out product to remove stains

#### Recipe of the Week

#### **Spooky Witches' Fingers**

1 cup butter, softened

1 cup confectioners' sugar

1 large egg

1 teaspoon almond extract

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

2 2/3 cups all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon baking powder

1 teaspoon salt

3/4 cup whole almonds

Seedless strawberry jam or red decorating gel, as needed

Place softened butter, sugar, egg, almond extract, and vanilla extract in a mixing bowl; beat together with an electric mixer until smooth. Gradually add flour, baking powder, and salt, continually beating until combined; refrigerate dough for 20 to 30 minutes.

Preheat the oven to 325°. Lightly grease baking sheets.

Remove dough from refrigerator in small amounts. Scoop 1 heaping teaspoon at a time onto a piece of waxed paper. Use the waxed paper to roll the dough into a thin finger-shaped cookie. Press one almond into one end of each cookie to give the appearance of a long fingernail. Squeeze cookie near the tip and again near the center of each to give the impression of knuckles. You can also cut into the dough with a sharp knife at the same points to help give a more fingerlike appearance. Arrange the shaped cookies on the baking sheets.

Bake in the preheated oven until the cookies are slightly golden in color, 20 to 25 minutes.

Remove the almond from the end of each cookie; squeeze a small amount of jam or red decorating gel into the cavity; replace the almond to cause the jam to ooze out around the tip of the cookie.



Acushnet Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Paula Bailey, is pleased to share that Acushnet Elementary School Principal Leah Chesney has been recognized by the Ignite Reading organization during National Principals Month.

Ignite Reading chose Principal Chesney because of her commitment to providing advanced, modern reading programs for students.

Ignite Reading is a high-dosage reading tutoring program supported by the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE). It is specifically designed to aid students within the Multi-Tiered System of Support (MTSS) framework. Students needing additional reading support participate in daily 15-minute online sessions with a dedicated Ignite Reading tutor during school hours throughout the year.

Specifically, Principal Chesney has been working with the Ignite Reading program for two years, during which time the district obtained an Early Literacy High Dosage Learning grant from DESE. This grant provided Acushnet Elementary School with 75 high-dosage tutoring spots in the 2023-24 school year and 55 high-dosage tutoring spots for the 2024-25 school year.

Throughout the district's implementation of the Ignite Reading program, teachers and administrators have met with tutors regularly and have access to data that can improve teaching strategies and provide parents with progress updates. It has proven to be a powerful tool for improving reading among many students at Acushnet Elementary School.

"It's an honor to receive recognition in an area like reading that I'm incredibly passionate about," Principal Chesney said. "'Ignite has been very helpful for our reading program and I applaud everyone involved for their commitment to benefiting our students' literacy skills."

Principal Chesney has worked in education for over 25 years and encourages other principals to create a culture where reading is celebrated, supported and carefully monitored.



incidents; the centers are not required to be run by medical professionals, and cannot provide care during adverse reactions.

The Committee recommends that the question not be adopted. Although it acknowledges the benefits of use for some mental health conditions when prescribed measured doses, there is no evidence that the "widescale recreational legalization of these substances would be beneficial, let alone safe."

### Question 5: Eliminating the Subminimum Wage

Question 5 would gradually increase the minimum hourly wage of tipped workers over five years, starting with 64% in 2025 up to 100% in 2029. The current minimum wage for tipped workers is \$6.75/hour, also known as a "subminimum" wage; the minimum wage in Mass. for all other workers is \$15/hour. The law would also allow employers to require employees to pool tips to be equally distributed to all employees, including non-tipped workers.

A "yes" vote would change the law and increase the wages of tipped workers; a

"no" vote would leave the law unchanged.

One Fair Wage argues in favor of the law saying that workers "deserve the full minimum wage with tips on top." They argue that workers in seven other states earn full wage and enjoy "robust tips" where prices are comparable to Mass.

They argue that big corporations are not paying their fair share while many small businesses already pay full minimum wage plus tips.

"Tips should be a reward for good service, not a subsidy for low wages paid by big corporations," they write.

The Committee to Protect Tips argues that he question is funded by a "radical group from California."

They argue many tipped workers earn \$40/hour with 90% reporting at least \$20/hour.

The group claims that implementing this has caused "catastrophic results" in Washington, DC, with many employees losing or leaving their jobs and the implementation of 20% service fees.

They argue it would reduce overall wages for servers, increase costs for restaurants and "skyrocket" restaurant prices.

The Committee recommends not

enacting the law, saying that it does not have sufficient evidence of the impact it would have on the restaurant industry and workforce.

It also cited a lack of evidence concerning Washington, DC, which is phasing in the change (as cited above); or Maine, which is rolling back the raise; and the impact a 2023 law has had that requires employers to make up the difference in the subminimum wage and the minimum wage if tips were not sufficient to give servers a minimum wage.

The Committee cited several competing narratives and reporting. Most restaurant workers object to the requirement that tips be pooled and shared with "back-of-house" staff who do not interact directly with customers.

## Eliminate Subminimum Wage for Tipped Workers

A newly released report from the Political Economy Research Institute (PERI) at UMass Amherst reveals the substantial benefits of eliminating the subminimum wage for tipped workers, providing clear evidence in favor of the Question 5 ballot measure. The report, Potential Impacts of a Full Minimum Wage for Tipped Workers in Massachusetts, highlights positive economic impact of the measure and directly challenges the misinformation spread by the Massachusetts Restaurant Association (MRA) and other opponents.

Among the report's top findings:

- Increased Earnings: Tipped workers in states that have eliminated the subminimum wage earn 10-20% more than those in states with a lower tier wage system, proving that this change will result in higher and more reliable income for workers in Massachusetts.
- Minimal Business Impact: Contrary

to claims by opponents, the report finds that restaurants would face only modest cost increases equivalent to a 2% price hike allowing businesses to absorb the impact without job losses or drastic price increases.

 Addressing Wage Theft and Inequality: The subminimum wage disproportionately impacts women and workers of color. Eliminating this system would reduce wage theft, improve job quality, and promote economic justice.

This new research provides a datadriven counter to the misleading narratives promoted by the MRA, which has claimed that Question 5 would hurt the restaurant industry. The findings show that implementing a full minimum wage with tips on top for tipped workers would not only improve their financial well-being but also benefit businesses by reducing turnover and stabilizing the workforce.

"It's important to understand that tipped workers are typically from vulnerable social groups — they're disproportionately women, people of color and earn low wages. These workers are concentrated in the restaurant and hotel industry, which we find to have relatively high levels of worker complaints related to wage theft issues," says Jasmine Kerrissey, associate professor of sociology and Labor Center director. "Although the restaurant and hotel industry accounts for less than 6% of employment, it accounts for nearly 14% of all worker complaints."

On the exaggerated claims that ending the subminimum wage will increase costs for consumers. Wicks-Lim. Jeannette research professor at PERI added, "We find that eliminating the subminimum wage will only modestly raise business costs. This is because Massachusetts tipped workers already typically earn around \$12\* an hour as their base pay (without tips) and because they won't get to the full \$15 minimum wage for five years (i.e., by 2029). The average Massachusetts restaurant should be able to adjust to their increased costs by raising prices about 2%. A \$50 meal would go up to \$51, for example. Past research has found that minimum wage hikes

linked to cost increases of this size do not produce measurable job losses but have raised workers' earnings."

As the Yes on 5 campaign continues to gain endorsements from community leaders, civil rights organizations, and worker advocacy groups, One Fair Wage is urging Massachusetts voters to support Yes on Question 5 this November.
