

Veterans Day Parade

The Fairhaven Office of Veterans Services will hold a Veterans Day Parade on 11/11. Parade participants will assemble at Benoit Square at 8:30 AM and begin marching at 9:00 AM south on Main Street to Fairhaven High School. There will be a program at the High School with speakers and the Big Flag will be raised to honor our Veterans. In the event of inclement weather, a ceremony will be held at the Fairhaven Town Hall at 10 a.m.

The public is encouraged to line

the route and attend the ceremony at the high school to show support for those who have served in the military.

New Bedford

New Bedford will hold a parade on Veterans Day, 11/11. The parade will form at the intersection of Rockdale Avenue and Union Street, in Buttonwood Park, beginning at about 10 a.m. and stepping off at 11 a.m.

The parade will march east on Union Street to County Street, then turn left and head north on County Street to William Street, then turn right onto William Street and head east to City Hall,and end at the reviewing stand in front of the New Bedford Main Library, at the intersection of Pleasant Street and William Street. The address for the end of the parade is 613 Pleasant Street, in downtown New Bedford.

A cermoney will be held at the

reviewing stand following the conclusion of the parade, and all are invited to attend.

After the ceremony, all are invited to visit the Fort Taber-Fort Rodman Military Museum for light refreshments, located at 1000C Rodney French Blvd.

This year's parade Grand Marshall is Rick Martin, who joined the Air Force in 1971 as a field maintenance airman. He eventually joined the Navy and obtained the rank of Captain in the Naval Reserves.

In the case of inclement weather, there will be a service at the Fort Taber Community Center at Fort Taber Park, 1000A S. Rodney French Blvd., beginning at 12 p.m.

Fairhaven decides on search pan for interim TA

At its meeting on Monday, 11/4/24, the Fairhaven Select Board discussed the procedure for filling the Town Administrator position on an interim basis and permanently.

Assistant Town Administrator of Finance/Town Accountant, Anne Carreiro, is the acting TA in the absence of the TA, but Ms. Carreiro is going on vacation from 11/7 to 11/14, so the board had to get a little creative to fill the gap.

But the board also wanted to do more to help Ms. Carreiro until an Interim TA can be chosen.

At the outset, Ms. Carreiro made it clear she had no interest in becoming the TA or acting as Interim TA.

SB chairperson Stasia Powers said that after hearing from Town Counsel, the suggestion was to assign a board member, or two, to work with staff to "move things forward," and support staff during the transition.

The board voted for SB member Charles Murphy to be that liaison between the board and staff, and to work with Ms. Carreiro to keep things working smoothly while the search is on. He will not receive payment for the role.

The board also voted to create a three-person subcommittee to choose an Interim TA. They will discuss the process for choosing a permanent TA at their next meeting on Tuesday, 11/12.

Both Mr. Murphy and Ms. Powers noted that there have been lots of rumors going around, and both stressed that they are, indeed, rumors.

Ms. Powers said the board will work hard to support Ms. Carreiro and staff moving forward.

In his role as liaison, Mr. Murphy will meet with department heads and then staff to listen to their concerns and find out what they need.

He will also be acting TA when Ms. Carreiro is not available.

Board member Keith Silvia suggested that Public Works Superintendent Vinnie Furtado be the person to act as TA, but Ms. Powers said it needed to be someone on the Select Board.

Board member Andrew Saunders

weighed in saying that with his understanding of the TA Act, it is logical that the responsibility would be with the SB.

The board also discussed the possibility of choosing an in-house person to be the Interim. Mr. Murphy said the board should address it with staff.

Just before the vote, Mr. Murphy and the board clarified his role. He will meet with staff to see if someone is interested in serving as the Interim TA, and to assess the immediate needs of the week. He will also be authorized to sign documents as the acting TA if there is an immediate need while Ms. Carreiro is on vacation.

"I don't have to do her job?" joked Mr. Murphy.

The board also voted on two of the three members for the committee to choose the Interim TA. Ms. Carreiro and Mr. Saunders will be on that committee.

Ms. Powers said she would like Town Moderator Mark Sylvia to be

Hetty's Bedford Village

Hetty Green was born on 8th Street in New Bedford, joining a wealthy whaling family in one of the richest cities in America. Before reaching the adult age, she proved her intelligence and boldness as she entered the man's world of finance.

Hetty became the richest woman in the U.S. through real estate, railroads, mines, and money lending, and was the first successful woman trading on Wall Street.

1 tablespoon light corn syrup

1 graham cracker, finely crumbled

- 1/4 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice 3 tablespoons pure pumpkin puree
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- 2 ounces (1/4 cup) vanilla vodka
- 1 1/2 ounces (3 tablespoons) half-
- and-half 1 ounce (2 tablespoons) amaro
- 1/2 ounce (1 tablespoon) spiced rum
- 1 cup ice cubes

Spread the corn syrup on a rimmed plate. Spread the graham cracker crumbs in a single layer on another plate and sprinkle the crumbs with a pinch of the pumpkin pie spice. Turn a martini glass upside down and coat it with corn syrup and then with the crumbs, repeating in spots if needed. Place the glass in the freezer until ready to use.

Add the pumpkin, brown sugar, vodka, half-and-half, amaro, rum, remaining pumpkin pie spice and ice to a cocktail shaker. Shake until the shaker is very cold and frosty looking on the outside, about 30 seconds.

Strain the martini into the chilled glass and serve immediately.

Trump wins presidency

Former president Donald J. Trump has won the presidency again.

Just moments before sending this issue to press, the race was called, with Trump receiving 277 electoral votes and Harris receiving 224. A handful of states still have not reported results but it takes 270 electoral votes to win.

In Acushnet, Mr. Trump won 3,745 to 2,261. In Fairhaven, VP Harris prevailed, 4,768–4,601.

Closer to home, US Senator Elizabeth Warren (D) was projected to win re-election against Republican challenger John Deaton with 51% of precincts reporting.

In Acushnet, Mr. Deaton beat out Sen. Warren 3,711–2,253. Mr. Deaton also beat Sen. Warren in Fairhaven, 4,734–4,586.

Incumbent US Rep. Keating (D) beat out challenger Dan Sullivan. In Acushnet, it was Sullivan 3,282, Keating, 2,545.

Fairhaven's Mark Sylvia (D) won his bid to to fill the state representative seat in the 10th Bristol District* vacated by William Straus, who retired. Mr. Sylvia faced Republican Joe Pires (R) of Rochester..

In Acushnet (Precincts 1 & 2A only), Mr. Pires won, 1,150-833; in

Mattapoisett, the count was 2,611 for Mr. Sylvia to 2,121; in New Bedford, the two were neck-and-neck with Mr. Pires winning 1,288-1285; in Marion, Mr. Sylvia won 2,002–1,403.

Mr. Sylvia's home town of Fairhaven delivered a big win, which put him over the top, with a count of 5,278 to 3,907.

Rochester had not posted results by press time, but the Globe reported that 93.33% of precincts (14 out of 15) had reported, and so they called the race.

And Mr. Sylvia's internal numbers, that he posted on Facebook, supported that result, showing that Mr. Pires won his hometown by a very big margin, 2,358 to 1492, but not enough to put him over the top.

Adding up the Globe's numbers with the Rochester numbers from Mr. Sylvia, the *Neighb News* calculates that Mr. Sylvia received 13,501 votes to Mr. Pires's 12,227.

In the 8th Bristol District*, independent Jesse St. Gelais of Acushnet showed a valiant effort, but was in third place at press time, with all precincts except Fall River counted, according to the Boston Globe.

Democrat Steven Ouellette was squeaking out a win over Rep. Christopher Thrasher, 5,922–5,887; with St. Gelais with 4,033. In Acushnet (precincts 2 & 3), the vote was 1,870 for Mr. Gelais, the hometown candidate, and 937 for Mr. Thrasher; in Freetown, 1,165 Thrasher, 1,081 St. Gelais; in New Bedford, 311 Ouellette, 3,519 Thrasher; Westport, 3,941 Ouellette, 3,519 Thrasher.

For Bristol County Commissioner John R. Mitchell (D) came out on top with Julie Ruggiero (D) second, and Gregory DeMelo (U) third, according to the Globe. In Acushnet Mr. Mitchell received 2,690 votes; Ms. Ruggiero got 1,690; and Mr. DeMelo got 1,520.

In Fairhaven the count was Mr. Mitchell, 4,814; Ms. Ruggiero, 3,077; Mr. DeMelo, 2022.

Acushnet has 8,742 registered voters; turnout was 70%; 3,396 people voted early or by mail.

Fairhaven has 13,432 registered voters with 9,607 votes cast in this election for a turnout of 71.52%; 5,041 voted early or by mail.

The Boston Globe posted results on all the ballot questions by press time nearly 72% of precincts reporting.

Statewide question 1, to allow the Auditor to audit the legislature was poised to pass overwhelmingly, 71.5% to 28.5%; Q2 to eliminate the MCAS as a requirement for high school graduation was also looking like it

the third person, but he if he gets elected state representative, he would probably not be able to serve on the committee.

So the board decided to ask members of the public to apply to be on that committee. (See link below).

The committee will review the applications and recommend candidates for interviews with the SB although it was unclear how many candidates the board wanted to interview.

The board also briefly discussed posting a job description for the Interim TA, with Ms. Powers saying she wanted to ask for a "seasoned professional."

Mr. Saunders, however, said he had concerns with limiting the candidates who might apply. He said they can use that preference to make a decision, but he said it might prevent a good candidate from applying. The board decided to put a link to the TA Act on the application page.

The board also approved the minutes to the Executive Sessions on 9/30/14 and 10/14/24.

Submitted by Rick Trapilo, Fairhaven Planning Board member Dear Selectboard: I sent the following email to the honorable Mayor Mitchell 2+ weeks ago. The letter references a severe problem, a model solution and funding to start a design concept. I have no response to date.

I request my correspondence be recorded in your next meeting. Would you please let me know when our Fairhaven water quality committee will have its first meeting? I am the nominee to attend from our Planning Board

Dear Mayor Mitchell,

As the Mayor who has revitalized the City of New Bedford during your distinguished tenure, I am reaching out to seek your leadership in addressing a critical environmental issue: the outflow of raw sewage into Buzzards Bay.

New Bedford is a historical gem for our South Coast community, but our antiquated sewage system poses significant risks to our environment and public health. According to city data, approximately 600 million gallons of untreated waste were discharged into the Bay in 2023 alone. This year, for the first time, the Harbor swim was canceled due to water pollution, and shellfish beds continue to be closed.

I urge you to consider a proactive approach inspired by the Narragansett Bay Commission (NBC). Their initiatives have successfully reduced nitrogen waste by over 50% and are constructing tunnels to manage stormwater overflow effectively. These strategies align with your commitment to climate resiliency and could serve as a model for New Bedford.

Additionally, I would like to draw your attention to a timely opportunity for funding. The EPA is offering 150 large community-driven grants, ranging from \$10 to \$20 million, specifically aimed at projects that benefit disadvantaged communities by reducing pollution. The application deadline for the Environmental and Climate Justice Community Change Grant is November 21. More information can be obtained at ENVIRO@SRPEDD.

I am committed to collaborating with local committees that can support this initiative and would be happy to provide any further information or assistance. Together with all the communities impacted along the South Coast, and with your leadership we can secure a healthier future for New Bedford and its surrounding communities.

would pass with 58.8% to 41.2%; Q3 to allow rideshare drivers to unionize, also looked ready to pass with 53.7% voting yes to 46.3% no; Q4 to legalize use of certain psychedelic drugs, was on the path to fail, with 56.9% against the change, to 43.1%; Q5 to give tipped workers the same minimum wage as other workers looked ready to fail, 64.1% top 35.9% leaving tipped workers with the subminimum wage of \$6.75/hour.

Acushnet voted yes on Questions 1 and 2, and voted no on 3, 4, 5.

Fairhaven voted yes on Questions 1 abd 2, and no on 3, 4, 5.
