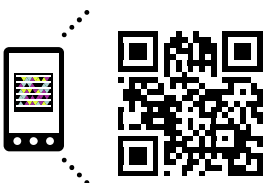

Our guest David Kagan, Ph.D., Associate Teaching Professor in Physics at UMass Dartmouth, will discuss “Quantum Computing; A Revolution That’s Sure to Teach Schrodinger’s Cat New Tricks & Change the Shape of Industries.”

A century ago, the new field of quantum mechanics was born—the study of physical properties of the microscopic world. Today, scientists & engineers are racing to develop quantum computers, devices that have the potential to dramatically increase computer speeds. Note how Google’s quantum computer Willow completed a computation in minutes that would take a supercomputer ten septillion years!

David will discuss the principles underlying quantum computing, the challenges of building these machines, the vision of quantum AI, and how technologies might be revolutionized—medicine, climate modeling, banking, to name a few. He will also provide a roadmap for distinguishing fact from hype in this rapidly evolving field. David earned his PH.D. in theoretical physics from Cambridge University.

Recipe of the Week

Apple Pie Enchiladas -

1 (21 ounce) can apple pie filling
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup white sugar
1/2 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup water
1 teaspoon vanilla
6 (8 inch) flour tortillas

Preheat the oven to 350°. Grease a 9x13 inch baking dish.

Spoon about one heaping quarter cup of pie filling evenly down the center of each tortilla. Sprinkle with cinnamon and roll up, tucking in edges; and place seam side down in prepared dish.

In a medium saucepan over medium heat, combine butter, white sugar, brown sugar, and water. Stir until the butter has melted and the sugars have dissolved.

Bring the mixture to a boil, stirring constantly.

Reduce the heat and let it simmer for 3 minutes. Remove from heat and stir in 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Pour the sauce over the enchiladas and let it stand for 45 minutes. This resting time helps to magically transform the flour tortillas into a faux pastry dough.

Bake the enchiladas in the preheated oven for 30 minutes or until golden. Serve warm.

95th OLOA Feast draws thousands to Fairhaven

The new security measures did not deter feastgoers at the 95th Our Lady of Angels feast this weekend. Opening night was jam packed, and the wait at the entrance was minimal. Volunteers checked bags in one spot and used metal detector wands to check people as they came through the entrance.

And the malasadas line stretched all the way to the end of the band stand.

Dubbed "The biggest little feast," the OLOA annual feast runs for three days over Labor Day weekend. It features Portuguese and American food and entertainment, activities for children, vendors, and lots and lots of food and drink.

Karen Diggins, Carol Medeiros, and a couple of other friends had been waiting for about a half-hour, when they finally got very close to the window.

Is it worth the wait? A resounding "yes," rang through the air.

"I'd wait five days for these," said Ms. Diggins.

Best friends, Dina Melo, Nina Desousa, and Jennifer Valente said they were not keeping track of how long they were waiting.

"It's 100 percent worth it," said Ms. Desousa.

"It's well worth the wait," said Ms. Valente.

John Souza and John Bonanca had only been waiting 15 minutes, but they still had a way to go. They both agreed, however, that it would be worth it, no matter how long they had to wait in line.

Neither one was bothered by the new security measures.

"I guess they've got to do it," said Mr. Souza. "It didn't bother me. They're doing it for the betterment of people."

"Today, you have to do a lot that," said Mr. Bonanca.

Kelly Theodore, George, and Melissa King had all been waiting for about 35 minutes, agreeing it is worth the wait.

"It's always good," said Ms. King.

She said she was not bothered by the new security measures, although she missed her short cut on Daniel Street because the entrance is on the other side.

"I feel like it's more safe," she said. "I'd rather feel safe than not safe."

Steve Nogueira, Chris DaCruz, and Rodney DaCruz have been attending the feast for years.

"The favas are the best," said Chris.

Rodney, 55, said he has been every year since he was 18 years old,

They all said they had no problem with the new security measures.

"It's all right," said Rodney. "It's not bad."

"I think everyone is doing it now," said Mr. Nogueira. "If people act like

morons, you have to."

"It's expected," said Chris.

Young Scarlet, however, was quite oblivious to the question. She has attended the feast for all of her seven years and likes the clam cakes best.

Erin Murphy snuck taking a break from the malasadas booth with her friend, Kyle. Ms. Murphy said she and her friends were in charge for the first time this year, taking over for her father, Charlie Murphy.

"The next generation is taking over," said Kyle.

In a press release, Fairhaven Police said that the enhanced security measures resulted in no complaints by neighbors of unsupervised youth in the neighborhood, a problem in the past.

Police did respond to an "isolated physical altercation" outside the grounds involving two adult men late Saturday, 8/30. One man sustained a minor injury and was transported to the hospital. A juvenile accompanying one of the men was determined to be intoxicated and was picked up at the police station by a parent.

"No arrests were made. The situation was quickly resolved and did not impact the larger event," police wrote.

People may have noticed a couple of ambulances leaving the grounds on opening day. The incidents were for medical issues not related to violence.

cars they were showing: a 1965 Plymouth Belvedere (his), and a 1967 Plymouth Fury (hers). However, he had "bought" the Belvedere for her... supposedly, said Ms. Correia.

But, she said, he kept driving it, so she got the Fury.

Mr. Correia said he "kind of brought it back from the deda," meaning the Belvedere. "When you do that, you kind of have a connection."

Everything is new on it and he'll be working on the inside, too. He's keeping the black paint, though, for that "Rat Rod" look.

"I call it the creep wagon," said Ms. Correia.

Salt Philla had his bright red 1955 Thunderbird on display. He said he owned it since he was 14 years old when his father gave it to him. He started driving it around when he got his license at 17.

"It was just a used car back then," he said.



He only went through it once, he said, to get it in the shape it is in now.

"It's an interesting piece," said Mr. Mello. "I'm the caretaker."

Fairhaven Animal Control Officer, Terry Cripps, retiring

In 2017, Terry Cripps arrived for the first day (of his second stint) on the job. On September 6th, he will leave that job for the final time. Fairhaven's longtime Animal Control Officer is retiring.

"I won't lie, I'm probably going to cry," said Mr. Cripps about leaving the Fairhaven Animal Shelter that has been such a huge part of his life over the last decade plus. "I'll probably go through withdrawals."

Mr. Cripps and his wife are moving to Texas as she has been offered a new job opportunity.

When asked if he was going to be wrangling any armadillos down there, he replied with a smile and said, "No, I think I'm going to find myself a job that I can leave at the end of the day and not be available all the time."

Animal Control Officer is no normal 9-to-5 position. It is an extraordinary commitment.

"This job is 24/7. You're always on call," said Mr. Cripps as he was actively assembling a new habitat for a small animal. "Getting an assistant really helped. Having someone to cover you if you need some relief, was a big help."

While there is no official succession plan at this time, Mr. Cripps hopes his assistant will be considered for the position due to her knowledge of what is required for the job.

"Everything I learned on the job was self-taught," said Mr. Cripps of his early days as ACO.

After a briefer stint at the position from 2013 into 2015, when Mr. Cripps discovered, "I can't work for politicians," he returned when the ACO position was placed under the control of the Fairhaven Police

Department.

"Best thing they did was putting me under the PD," he said. "Having them back me up meant everything."

"I've seen some bad and a lot of good in this town. Mostly good," Mr. Cripps said.

Recalling one of his best moments, he shared the story of when the "no kill" shelter took in two dogs, "Winter" and "Sheba". After noticing Sheba's irregular walk it was discovered that she required a \$9,000 knee surgery. "The community came together and raised the money in two days."

"It was probably my proudest day on the job," said about watching the two dogs leave the shelter after Sheba made a full recovery and they were both adopted.

Mr. Cripps is aware of the town's current financial issues and is concerned about talk of closing the shelter.

"I hope they look elsewhere. I hope the town can find the funds. I would fight tooth and nail to keep this place open. I consider the shelter my legacy," he said.

Volunteers, coworkers, friends and family gathered for a surprise party on August 25th. Many fought back tears as they shared sentiments about Mr. Cripps.

"It has been the greatest pleasure to work with Terry. I am forever sad he's leaving," said volunteer Jill Manzone.

"I hope to be half the ACO

he is someday," said Assistant ACO, Kelsey Figueiredo.

"The best ACO in the world," said Donna Motta. "He's helped me with my runaway cows! I'm happy for him but sad for the town."

"Hands down the best guy with the animals and with the people," said Joan Frye.

Volunteer Angela Gallagher joked that she'll miss hearing Mr. Cripps' famous adoption sales pitch: "I've never seen (him/her) do that with anyone but you!"

While sharing a heartwarming story about his commitment to a particular dog, volunteer Paula Coffey said: "His soul is pure. Fairhaven is losing a gift."

As he makes his way to his new Lone Star State home, Mr. Cripps leaves behind a body of work in this community that can be heard every time a child laughs playing with their newly adopted dog in the sunshine and felt each time a senior is comforted by their cuddling adopted cat on a cold winter evening. It is a feeling of connection and love between the animals and their owners that was fostered by Mr. Cripps and the dedicated volunteers at the Fairhaven Animal Shelter. To those of us who have felt it, we owe Mr. Cripps and his tireless work a great deal of gratitude.

Best wishes to Mr. and Mrs. Cripps on your new adventure! The residents of the town of Fairhaven, including the furry, scaled and feathered ones, thank you for all you've done.
